THE New York Football Giants are steadily forging to the lead in the National Football League, which is represented by twenty cities this side of the Mississippi River. After early setbacks by the Providence Steam Rollers and Frankford Yellow Jackets, the Giants, under the coaching of Bob Folwell, who formerly coached at Lafayette, Washington and Jefferson, University of Pennsylvania and the United States Naval Academy, have improved at great strides and their execution of offense and defense has been a revelation to local football fans.

The New York Eleven, flashing a brilliant passing attack, triumphed over the Cleveland Bulldogs, 1924 League champions 19 to 0.

Walter Koppisch, former Columbia captain, and his Buffalo Bisons, were the next victims in a hard-fought battle. The score was 7 to 0.

The Giants continued their winning streak at the expense of the Columbus Tigers in a game that was played in a steady downpour of rain and on a gridiron that was a quagmire. This encounter was marked by intense rivalry and bitter playing and the Giants emerged victorious by the score of 19 to 0. Then the Giants defeated Rochester and their standing now shows four victories and three defeats.

In the opinion of Coach Bob Folwell the Giants in "Hinkey" Haines, "Heinie" Benkert, Jack McBride and "Dutch" Hendrian now have the strongest backfield in the National League.

"Hinkey" Haines, who has been the chief scoring ace for the Giants, is performing with the speed and brilliancy that made him an All-American figure at Penn State and is rapidly cinching the honor of being the greatest individual star in the league, which is formed of some of the most famous stars that ever played on college gridirons.
