



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

### 'Till We Meet Again

NO one is more disappointed than the Giants that the National Football League's Eastern Conference title is not at stake in today's 1957 finale against the Cleveland Browns.

It would have been had it not been for the funny bounces the football took in the Giants' last two games against San Francisco and Pittsburgh. Fumbles cost the Giants dearly in both these contests, which could have been won if the ball had been handled cleanly.

However, that's water over the dam now. Coach Jim Lee Howell, his staff and the combatant Giants take the field today with heads high in pride of accomplishment and with renewed determination to maintain their status as one of the dominant powers of football's fastest company.

Despite the loss of their world championship, this was by no means a bad season for the Giants. They come to the mark today with a record excelled by only the Browns among the twelve clubs

Anyone who has followed the Giants, here at the Stadium and by television on the road, can attest that they again were a sound, balanced, spirited club that played entertaining football—win, lose or draw.

The outlook for 1958 and the years beyond is bright. The nucleus of this fine squad that has finished three-one-two in the East in the last three campaigns still is young.

New playing strength will be

added and next summer, relieved of the obligation of rushing their regulars into playing condition for the All-Star game in August, the Giants will be able to devote more attention to the development of rookies.


They acquired the priority rights to three crackerjack collegians in the first rounds of the draft a couple of weeks ago. Phil King, the Vanderbilt halfback who was their No. 1 choice, is a fast, hard-hitting 215 pounder who gives every appearance of measuring up to pro specifications. So do Frank Youso, a 250-pound tackle from Minnesota, and Don Caraway, 220-pound linebacker from Houston who already has had a taste of pro football in Canada.

There will be further acquisitions in the later rounds of the draft in January and, perhaps, more of the astute trades which Howell and Wel Mara engineered in building the Giants to championship stature.

You can depend that the Giants will not stand still. This is a dynamic, forward-looking Giant organization that will not rest until the Giants are back on the top of the National League heap.

With this pledge, the Giant front office, Coach Howell and his aides, Captains Kyle Rote and Bill Svoboda and all the Giants thank you sincerely for your loyal support and extend their best wishes for a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.



### They're All Specialists



ROOSEVELT BROWN

THAT old Chic Sale number, "I'm A Specialist," should be pro football's theme song. Every pro football player is a specialist, in several different specialist lines.

You think of pro football as two-platoon football. That's true. All pro teams use separate and tightly compartmentalized offensive and defensive platoons.

But that's only the start. By some wondrous alchemy of numbers, each club also squeezes out of its 35-player roster five other special purpose eleven-man platoons.

There's the kick-off platoon, the kick-off return platoon, the punting platoon, the punt returning platoon and the place-kicking platoon. In the case of the Giants, there's an extra eighth platoon—the goal-line defense platoon.

Each platoon is carefully recruited from the available manpower pool with an eye to special talents adapted to the particular function of the unit.

It's quite a chore to organize these groups. Swarms of Giants trot purposefully into position when the team kicks off, punts, receives those boots or tries for an extra point or field goal only as the result of meticulous staff work.


Line coach Johnny Dell Isola is the Giants' special events director. He sets up the special units and each Saturday before a game head coach Jim Lee Howell checks his efforts by calling for this or that platoon to take the field, barking the "on station" commands with machine-gun rapidity.

Only by such constant, concentrated rehearsals are the Giants able to swing unfalteringly into action, within the thirty-second time limit, for kicks and kick returns.

With allowance for attrition and injury, here's how the Giants' special units line up, from left to right and front to rear:

Kick-offs (called the Kamikaze unit, because all members are hell-bent dedicated to destruction of the enemy) — Livingston, Brown, Beck, Epps, Martinkovic, Chandler (kicker), Stroud, Tunnell. Spinks, Filipski, Crawford, with Nolan, Austin and Svare in reserve.

Kick-off returns—Livingston. Austin, Beck, Stroud, Robustelli

Punting—Beck, Brown, Stroud. Wietecha, Austin, Martinkovic and Livingston (line), with Yowarsky and Beck in reserve; Crawford and Filipski (slots); Triplett or Epps (blocker); Chandler (kicker).

Punt Returns — Livingston, Modzelewski, Huff, Yowarsky, Robustelli (line), with Beck in reserve; Svoboda and Svare (linebackers); Hughes and Nolan (interceptors); Filipski and Patton (receivers), with Tunnell in reserve



#### 1957 ALL-AMERICA TEAM

FOR the last couple of weeks, every agency that could find an excuse for doing so has rushed into print, picture or sound with its 1957 college All-America football team.

For reasons of politics and circulation, there are certain ground rules that the conventional media follow in picking All-America teams. For instance, there must be reasonable geographical balance and the season's top teams should have representation.

Within these limits, the selectors do a conscientious job and are no more deserving of opprobium than anyone else who ventures a definite opinion in a highly controversial area of discussion.

However, we submit that the All-America team least vulnerable to criticism is the one that evolves from the National Football League preliminary draft of two weeks

In making their draft selections, the pro clubs pose only one question: "Is this boy good enough to play football in football's big league?" Under this criterion, the


The accompanying breakdown of the pro draft list into first and second All-America elevens brings to light some interesting differences of opinion between the pro talent scouts and the agency se-

Several of the most glamorous college stars-there's no point in naming them here-were downgraded and some relatively unfamiliar names pop out on the list-you be the judge of which names they are.

In fairness to some of the players omitted, it should be mentioned that the pros cannot draft a sophomore or junior unless his entering class will be graduated in June. Also, the pros canvass college eligibles to see whether they are interested in post-graduate football.

Another point to keep in mind before going overboard in rating players on their order of selection in the draft is that the pro clubs make their choices in the inverse





Sam Huff (70) has followed an outstanding freshman season with an outstanding sophomore season. The babyfaced West Virginian, an All-America tackle in college, is one of the key links in the Giant defense at middle line-backer. It's an ideal spot for Huff because he's as quick as a cat on his feet and a crisp, decisive tackler. Sam, whose square name is Robert Lee Huff, is married and has one son.


Dick Modzelewski (77) came to the Giants fom the Steelers as the result of a four-way trade before the start of the 1956 season. His acquisition was a happy move. The biggest Giant, at 260 pounds, Mo moved right into the line-up at defensive left tackle. No one, including the opposition, has been able to budge him since. His hobby, as well as his profession, is slamming rivals violently to the ground. A Maryland graduate, Dick is the father of one son.

Walt Yowarsky (78), a solid sixyear pro from Kentucky, joined the Giants in 1955 after previous service with Washington and Detroit. Big, tough and rugged, he has been a stalwart defensive performer at end and tackle. He's also an offensive swing man, who can fill in capably at center and tackle in emergencies. Walt, who hails from Cleveland, Ohio, is single.

Bob Schnelker (85) led the Giants in pass-catching as a rookie in 1954, when he grabbed 30 for 550 yards and 8 TDs. His production fell off in 1955, when, with the other Giant ends injured, the defense ganged up on him, and last year he saw limited service. Now he's back in the spotlight as the club's high-scoring receiver. Not particularly fast, but an artful faker who holds any pass he can reach. A Bowling Green alumnus, Bob is married and a father.

Ed Crawford (21) was drafted No. 13 by the Giants as a "future" in 1955, when he still was a junior at Mississippi, It was an inspired choice. He had a great senior season at Ole Miss and undoubtedly would have been grabbed before the Giants had a shot at him in the 1956 draft. He quickly demonstrated his ability by becoming one of the two rookies to win Giant jobs this year. He has been a valuable spare rib in the defensive umbrella and a fine kick-returner. Still single.

Jack Spinks (68), a 5-year veteran of the pro football wars, who was obtained by the Giants from Green Bay in 1956, has been dogged by injuries the last two seasons. When sound, he's a crackerjack offensive guard who can run with the speed of a back. In fact, that's what he was in college at Alcorn A. and M. and for one season with the Steelers. Born in Alabama, grew up in Mississippi and now lives in Pittsburgh with his wife and son.





#### About the Browns

EVER since their formation in 1946, the Cleveland Browns have been one of football's mightiest teams. They won four straight All-America Conference championships and in eight years of National League membership captured seven Eastern Conference and, up to this season, three world titles.

Last year, following the retirement of Otto Graham, the great quarterback who guided them through a golden decade of success, the Browns had their first losing season, finishing in a fourth place tie in the Eastern Conference with a 5-7 lost record.

In one of the most amazing sports comebacks of 1957, Coach Paul Brown's squad has rebounded to the heights.

Always tremendously efficient on defense, even in the dark days of 1956, the Browns have rebuilt their attack to its old potency.

One key factor in this sharp improvement has been the development of Tommy O'Connell at quarterback. Until he was injured a couple of weeks ago, the former Illinois star, who was just so-so in 1956, ran his club and passed in the grand Graham manner. He led the NFL passers at last look.

Contributing also to the rise of the Browns has been the sensational running of Jimmy Brown. This indefatigable giant—6-2 and 224—from Manhasset, L. I., perhaps the best all-around athlete ever developed in the metropolitan area, is cake-walking off with the NFL rushing crown as a rookie.

So from having an erratic passing attack and a rather pedestrian running game in 1956, the Browns again can move the ball at a rapid rate aloft and alow.

In Chet Hanulak, Ray Renfro,

Lew Carpenter, Billy Reynolds and Milt Campbell, the Olympic decathlon champion, they have a swift corps of ball-carriers in support of the brilliant Brown. In Milt Plum, a rookie from Penn State, they have a capable standin for O'Connell.

The veteran Darrell Brewster and Preston Carpenter, who led Cleveland in rushing as a back last year, man the ends and do an outstanding job of pass-receiving.

And, as he has been since 1946, Lou Groza always is ready, willing and able to boom field goals from any feasible range.

This revived attack, plus a rockribbed defense that features Len Ford, Don Colo and Bob Gain up front and Warren Lahr, Ken Konz and Don Paul in the secondary, again makes the Browns the scourge of the National League.





order of their won-lost standing in the league (the Giants had tenth pick in each round, after the bonus choice of King Hill by the Cardinals).

Furthermore, selections are made with an eye to plugging weak spots in the line-up. For instance, in the first round of the draft, five linemen and an end were selected.

With note of these and other exceptions that may be taken, it still is hard to argue that there is a better All-America.

#### Jottings on the Giants

NTRODUCING Phil King of Vanderbilt, the Giants' No. 1 choice in the recent college draft: Part Cherokee Indian and all football player, the 6 foot 4 inch, 215-pound King was Vanderbilt's co-captain this season. The "Chief," as he is nicknamed, plays either halfback and fullback and did just about everything except collect tickets.

For instance, he led the Commodores in rushing, with 438 yards in 115 attempts, and in passing, with 14 catches, good for 177 yards and two touchdowns. He completed two of seven passes for 25 yards and one touchdown. He punted twice for an average of 48 yards. He intercepted four passes for 60 yards, returned eight punts for 99 yards and raced back 240 yards with eight kick-offs. These varied depredations add up to 939 yards gained by all means.

To quote from a sketch on King in the Vanderbilt program: "He has the speed of a deer and the crunching power of a buffalo." From all accounts, he's quite a football player.


#### Giant Blackboard

THERE'S one play that the Giants—and all football teams—use that gives us novice experts a nice homey feeling—because we can recognize it. That's the 'delayed buck off a fake pass known as the "draw play."

Diagrammed here as the Giants use it, the Machiavellian subtleties of this simple but effective

play become apparent.

Before going into details, one more observation: the draw play is essentially a psychological maneuver that capitalizes on the human frailty of wanting to get something for nothing. Almost invariably it is used in a situation that screams for a pass, say 3rd down and 20 to go. The defense knows that in these circumstances it's 50-50 that a draw will be called. Nevertheless, it's a rare defensive lineman who won't take the bait and chase the butterfly that is fluttered before him, even at the risk of leaving his territory uncovered.



Here's how the Giants capitalize on this eager defensive cupidity (and get victimized themselves):

The formation is balanced right inside (meaning in the Jim Lee Howell-Vin Lombardi Sanskrit that both ends are split and the right halfback is in the right side slot).

On taking the center snap, Conerly (42) retreats as though to pass. Gifford (16) flares from left half to join Rote (44) and Schnelker (85), the split ends, and Webster (29), the slotted right half in a four-man pass pattern.

Triplett (33), the fullback, holds position, as though to serve as a blocking shield for Conerly, which he normally would do on such a pass pattern.

Except for Wietecha (55) who shoots forward from center to chop down the defensive middle line-backer, the Giant linemen (guards and tackles) give ground, maintaining inside blocking position on their charging defensive opposites.

About when it appears he is going to be snowed under by the thundering defensive herd, Conerly slips the ball to the waiting Triplett. Mel drives forward, going inside or outside the defensive left guard, depending on which way Stroud (66) has been able to guide that defender.

With the middle line-backer knocked down, the outside line-backers decoyed and the four-man defensive rush line screened off, there presumably is a hole. Barring a missed assignment or a delaying diving leg tackle, Triplett is off to the races.

You know he is. You have seen him run this play for big yardage time and again.

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

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
