



Jim Thorpe, Greatest Player in Grid History, Released by Giants

MOST WONDERFUL ALL-AROUND ATHELETE EVER DEVELOPED RATED HIGHER THAN "RED" GRANGE

Jim Thorpe, the greatest all-around athlete of all time and the greatest backfield man in the history of football, has been released outright by the New York Giants.

Jim immediately grabbed himself another contract, a life-time sentence. He married a girl from South Carolina and now is on his honeymoon.

Thorpe, in the heyday of his fame, was the greatest star in the history of athletics. He

could run a hundred yards in 10 seconds, a quarter in close to 50 seconds, a half under two minutes and could make equally creditable showings at the longer distances.

Thorpe could clear more than 6 feet in the high jump and in the running broad jump was a consistent leaper of more than 22 feet. He also was a

fine baseball player and an exceptional performer in the basketball

He won the all-round championships at the Stockholm Olympaid, but later returned the prizes when it was discovered that he had previously played professional baseball.

We cite these performances to drive home the fact of just what is meant when it is said that his real forte was football. As great as he was in other sports, Thorpe was greater in football than in the others.

A canvas of football coaches during the past week made by Ten Von Zieghursch, sporting

week made by Ten Von Zieghursch, sporting editor of the Daily News, reveals the fact that all but one rate Thorpe higher than Grange. The one dissenting vote was cast by Lou Young, Penn coach. The others admitted that Grange was a more spectacular ball carrier than Thorpe, but said that he did not measure up to the great Sac in all around backfield ability. ability.

Thorpe could hit the line, run off tackle, skirt the ends and either throw or receive forward passes. He was one of the most consistent ground gainers in the game and in addition was a wonderful defensive back.

Heavier and bigger than Grange, he was admirably adapted to showing interference—a part of the game in which he shone—and in addition was one of the greatest kickers football has ever developed. Thorpe's punts would average close to fifty-five yards, and he kicked more than one drop kick from midfield. The game has lost a wonderful performer. game has lost a wonderful performer.

Pottsville Maroons Play Here Saturday in Important Game

The Pottsville Maroons invade Frankford next Saturday to play what promises to be one of the most interesting and tightest games of the current season.

The Miners have one of the best teams in the National League. They have dropped one game this season to the Providence Steam rollers, and dropped that without the victors tallying a first down.

A fine tribute to the defensive strength of the up-Staters is the fact that only one first down has been made against them so far this seasons, Colum-

bus accomplishing the feat last week.

The Maroons also have an exceptional offensive. They showed their worth when they journeyed to Providence, the home of the Steamrollers, and avenged the early season defeat by rolling up a 34-0 score. Pottsville's offensive is savage. The Miners probably have piled up more first downs than any other team in the National League, and they are among the foremost teams in scoring.

The backfield of Wentz, Latene, French and Ernst functions perfectly. The attacking power is distributed, the backs being able to hit the line, run off tackle and circle the ends. The line, too, is far above the ordinary.

In Charley Berry, from Lafayette, and Eddie Doyle, West Point and Frankford, the invaders have two great ends. Russ Stein is playing great ball at the left tackle post, and Herb Stein is holding down the pivot position in his own finished style.

The game next Saturday will give the winner a clear claim to the eastern championship. In addition to the title and the league standing at stake, the game also arouses great interest because of the heated rivalry between the two elevens.

The clubs met in 1923, the game ending in a scoreless tie. Last year the clubs were unable to get together because Pottsville was in bad standing with the league. The Miners hurled challenges at Frankford, but the local management was unable to schedule them.

The game assumes the same relative importance on the schedule of the two teams as did the Frankford-Holmesburg games of years back.

THIS YEAR'S SQUAD REPRESENTS COLLEGES IN ALL SECTIONS OF THE UNITED STATES

GUY CHAMBERLAIN: End and coach. An all around athlete at the University of Nebraska. Chamberlain is recognized as one of the greatest ends ever developed at Nebraska. He was All-Western and All-American wingman. Since entering the pro-league, Chamberlain has coached five teams to championships in the circuit.

RUSS BEHMAN: Tackle and captain. Played Lebanon Valley and Dickinson. Was captain at Dickinson. In 1922 Glenn Killinger rated him "the greatest college lineman in the country." A regular ball hawk.

BILL HOFFMAN: Guard from Lehigh University. Bill is the type that gives everything he has on every play, and he has plenty to give.

BILL SPRINGSTEEN: Center and former Lehigh University captain. Has played every position on a football team, but prefers the pivot post.

HARMS: Tackle from Vermont University. Harms plays football because he loves the game and plays it in a fashion none but a fine player and football lover could imitate.

RAY CROWTHER: End from Colgate. Crowther captained the boxing team at his uni-

versity, also. Ray plays the aggressive type of game one would expect from a boxing captain.

"TWO BITS" HOMAN: Former Lebanon Valley quarterback. Weighs 142 pounds and can and does play football with every pound. A sensational broken field performer and a good field general.

STOCKTON: A back who was rated the most feared man in the Pacific Coast Conference last year, according to the rule book. Runs, kicks and passes equally well. Gonzaga University.

LES HAWS: Former Lower Merion and Dartmouth back. A consistent ground gainer and one of the best-liked backs ever playing for Frankford. Labeled the "Pepper Box" because of his ginger.

TEX HAMER: Former Penn captain and fullback. Tex has the speed to circle an end and the size and punch to hit a line. A consistent ground gainer and a fine defensive back.

SEACRIST: University of Western Maryland lineman. Plays tackle or guard and lives up to the slogan of the French: "They shall not pass."

Frankford Conquers Columbus by 19-0 Score in Spectacular Game

BEHMAN SCORES TWICE AS STOCKTON SHOWS RARE ABILITY AT DIRECTING FORWARD PASS ATTACK

The Columbus Panhandlers came, saw and were conquered to the tune of 19-0 in a National League football game last Saturday.

The game was closely contested and spectacular to the extreme despite the size of the score. Frankford won

score. Frankford won by its spectacular passing attack and the alertness of its players.

Captain Russell Behman scored two of the touchdowns. The first came after the Jackets worked the ball into scoring range by a wonderful pass from Stockton to Hamer, a pass that gained more than forty yards.

Columbus hedl for downs and got the ball. Chamberlain blocked their attempt to kick

out of danger and Behman scooped up the pigskin and crossed the goal line for a sixpointer.

The second touchdown come after some fine work by Stockton and Crowther. Stockton heaved another forty-yard pass. Crowther caught it while in full flight and was downed on the ten yard line. On the next play Stockton threw a short pass to the end and Crowther crossed the line standing up.

The final six-pointer came in the waning minutes of play when Behman speared a Columbus pass and chased forty-five yards to the goal line.

The invaders presented a well-drilled team that fought hard throughout the game to ward off impending defeat. Several players on both teams were injured, so fiercely did the battle wage, but all escaped serious hurts.

The alertness of the Frankford team was typified by Chamberlain and Behman. The big end has developed the happy faculty of blocking opponents' punts just when such plays will do the most good.

His blocked punt last week paved the way for the first touchdown and put the invaders in a position where they were fighting to come from behind instead of battling on even terms.

In addition to his punt blocking activities, Chamberlain also is playing a bang-up allround game at the wing post.

Chamberlain and Hamer Score as Yellow Jackets Down Buffalo 12-3

FULLBACKS INTERCEPTS PASS AND RUNS 50 YARDS FOR TOUCH-DOWN AND COACH SCAMPERS 53 YARDS TO TALLY

Two sharp shots rang out and two more Buffaloes bit the dust!

Yep, the Yellow Jackets took the measure of the Bison All-Americans again last Sunday, the scene of the fray being the Buffalo home grounds and the final count being 12-3.

The game was played in four inches of mud, a condition that made a consistent attack almost impossible and swayed victory to the team that could better grasp the opportunity and hold the wet slippery field.

hold the wet, slippery field.

Tex Hamer broke into the limelight when he intercepted a Buffalo aerial and made a long run through a broken field to the goal line. Hamer's run was a spectacular exhibition of speed, change of pace and dodging ability.

Hamer caught the Buffalo pass near midfield and his run was for a trifle more than fifty yards.

A few minutes later, Stockton and Chamberlain collaborated in a fifty-three-yard aerial that netted the second touchdown. The pass was a beaut, accurately tossed by Stockton and gathered in by the coach on the dead run. That ended the Frankford scoring.

Chamberlain's men played a strictly defensive game after going into the van, Buffalo

having the ball most of the time during the remainder of the game. Several times the Bisons worked the ball into Frankford territory, but each time the Jackets braced and were able to stave off a touchdown. The game marked the eighth victory in nine league games for Frankford.

Buffalo was the first to score, Kendrick knocking over a placement goal for Buffalo in the opening period, after the Jackets had held for three downs on their own five-yard line.
