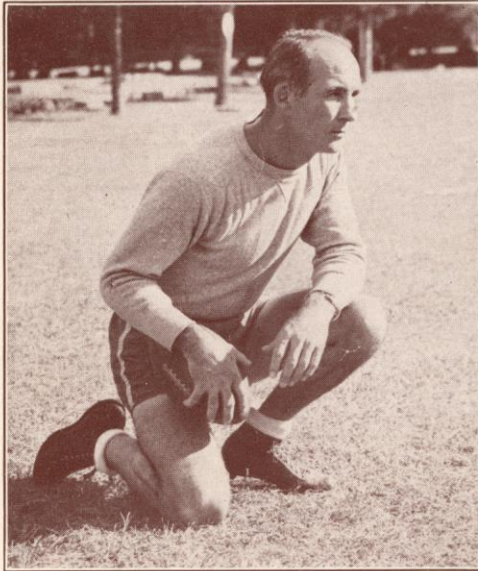

We will always appreciate your criticisms and value each of you as individual partners in our enterprise.

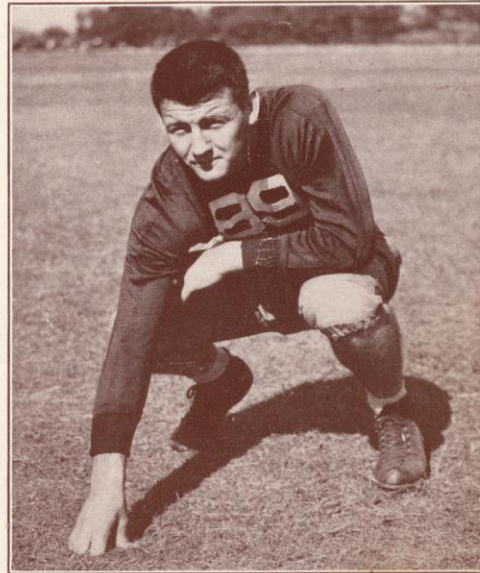

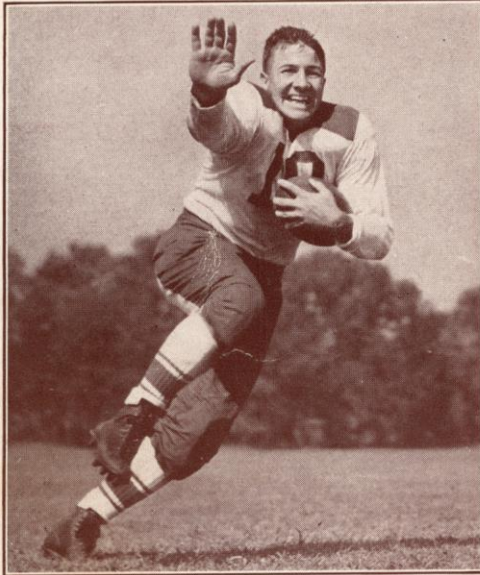

JIMMY STRAUSBAUGH, known as the Chillicothe Clipper in his college days at Ohio State, is proving a sensation with the Bulls in his first year up with the professional boys.

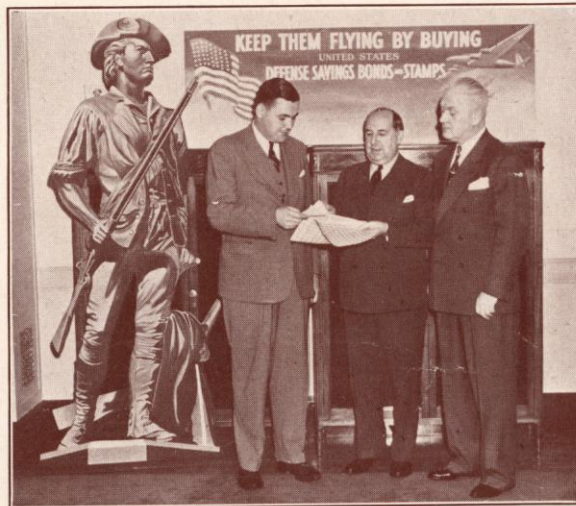


WELCOME SERVICE MEN

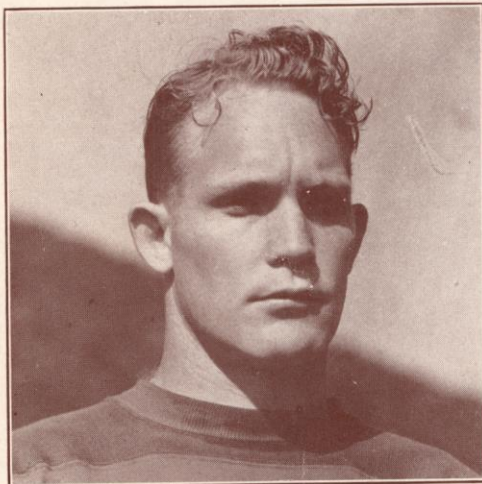
