### National football League

#### INDIVIDUAL RECORDS

Harry Newman and Ken Strong of the New York Giants enjoy a high ranking among the individual stars of the National Football League.

According to League statistics, including games of last Sunday, Ken Strong is the individual high scorer of the League with 52 points, four ahead of Glenn Presnell of Portsmouth, and ten better than Buckets Goldenberg, new star of the Green Bay Packers, who will show his wares here next Sunday.

Newman is in a hot four-cornered fight for forward passing honors and also is the third leading ground gainer of the circuit. Tied with Newman for passing honors are Arnold (Flash) Herber, black-haired star of the Packers, who will face Newman next Sunday, Benny Friedman, Brooklyn ace, and Presnell. Newman has gained the most ground by completing 29 in 76 tosses for 593 yards; Friedman has the best average with 28 in 53 tosses completed; Herber has completed the most passes, 34; and Presnell is second only to Newman in ground gaining on his passes with 490 yards.

Field goal kicking, which has staged a revival in the National League this season, find Presnell and Jack Manders of the Chicago Bears, the leading exponents of the three-pointers. Both have booted five three-pointers.

Bill Hewitt, Chicago Bears end, who is playing here today, is tied with Paul Moss of Pittsburgh, and Roy Grove, Green Bay, for honors as the leading pass receivers. Each of these men has caught twelve tosses, but Moss, who was an All-America at Purdue last year, has gained the most yards, 213.

#### SCHOOLBOY CONTESTS

The schoolboy drop-kicking contests sponsored by the New York Giants resume today with two sections competing. Queens high schools and Manhattan-Bronx private schools compete today for places in the final to be held on Sunday, December 3, when the Pittsburgh Pirates play the Giants here. Robert Connolly of New Rochelle, Martin Remore of Fort Lee, and Frank Goodell of Curtis, are the survivors of the first three contests.

Herb Jaffe of Adams, Vito Piazza of Cleveland, Dace Hertzon of Far Rockaway, and representatives of Flushing, Jamaica and Richmond Hill, will compete from Queens. Frank McCarthy of All Hallows, John Dee of Xavier, Jim O'Sullivan of Fordham Prep, Fred Chericone of Mt. St. Michael's, Robert Brossmer of Riverdale, and James Minehan of Horace Mann, compete in the private schools divisions. Charley Brickley, famous Harvard drop-kicker, will be the chief judge. Next Sunday the Bronx high school division will compete.

In all instances other than in the exceptions noted herein the rules of the National Intercollegiate Athletic Association are to be followed.

#### KICK-OFF AND FREE KICK

- 1. The receiving team may line in any position beyond the ten yard restraining line.
- 2. It is permissible for the kicking team to use a natural tee made from the soil in the immediate vicinity of the point of kick-off.

#### FLYING BLOCK AND TACKLE

The flying block and flying tackle are permitted.

#### FORWARD PASS

The passer may pass the ball from any point behind the line of scrimmage.

#### TIME OUT

Officials must notify the captain of each team when time has been out three (3) times—and no penalty is to be imposed for additional time out unless such notice has been given.

#### DEAD BALL

In Rule 7—Section 7—Article (1a) of the Intercollegiate rules omit the words "when any portion of his person except his hands or feet touches the ground."

#### PERSONAL FOULS

Use of hands-in Rule 10-Section 2-Article 1-Item 2 of the Intercollegiate Rules, omit the words "players on defense may not strike the opponent on the head, neck, or face with the palms of their hands."

#### CLIPPING

The penalty for clipping shall be 25 yardsofficials shall enforce this rule to the letter.

#### GOAL POST

The goal posts shall be placed on the goal-line instead of ten yards beyond.


