WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP PLAYOFF

The playoff for the Ed Thorp Memorial Trophy, symbolical of the world football title, will be contested on December 9 on the field of the Eastern champion. At present the New York Giants hold a two game lead for the honor of again representing the East in the gridiron final. A victory over the Bears today or Boston next week, would come close to clinching the crown to a mathematical certainty, although setbacks in both these games would make it necessary for the Giants to win from Brooklyn at Ebbets Field on Thanksgiving Day and also in Philadelphia on December 2.

The western champion will be decided in the two game series between the undefeated Detroit Lions and the Bears, who also are unbeaten. The first game is to be contested Thanksgiving morning in Detroit, the second on December 2 in Chicago. In the event the Giants clinch the title by beating Boston, reservations for tickets to this game will be accepted immediately at the Giant office, 11 West 42nd St., Room 1740, Phone No. LAck. 4-8946.

INDIVIDUAL RECORDS

Beattie Feathers, the sensational Bears rookie from Tennessee, is continuing his record making pace as a ground gainer. The newcomer has piled up 915 yards in nine games, an average of 100 yards per game and better than ten yards each time he has carried the ball. The only team which checked his stride at all was New York in Chicago, when Feathers only made 40 yards.

Swede Hanson, former Temple ace now with Philadelphia, has rocketed into second place with 714 yards, and Earl (Dutch) Clark, former Colorado College ace now with the Detroit Lions, is third with 654 yards.

Harry Newman, Giants all-league quarterback, is fourth in ground gaining with 476 yards, but that is only three yards ahead of Cliff Battles, Boston Redskins ace who lead the league last season. Battles, who plays here next week, has gained 473 yards in 76 attempts for an average of six yards per try.

In point scoring Dutch Clark has a substantial lead on Jack Manders, former Minnesota star now of the Bears. Clark has scored 72 points, while Manders has 58, twenty-five of these points coming from the extra point after touchdown at which he has missed only once this season.

Ken Strong, who lead the league in scoring last year, is gradually creeping up on the leaders and with 46 points, is only two behind Beattie Feathers, who holds third place. Harry Newman has also spurted up to seventh place with 37 points.

Newman has completed the most forward passes of any player in the league with 32 completed in 84 attempts, but Clark has the best average with 20 completed in 41 tosses. Arnold Herber of Green Bay has gained the most ground on his tosses with 562 yards from 30 passes.

Joe Carter of Philadelphia has caught eleven tosses to lead the pass receivers, while Charlie Malone of Boston, who will show his wares here next week, has caught ten.

The Boston Redskins play here next Sunday in the last regularly scheduled game of the 1934 season. The world championship playoff, if the Giants defeat Boston, will be held here December 9, against the Western champion, either the Bears or Detroit Lions. The National Football League Revised Rules

Season 1934

In all instances other than in the exceptions noted herein the rules of the National Intercollegiate Athletic Association, including changes made for 1934, are to be

KICK-OFF AND FREE KICK

1. The receiving team may line in any position beyond the ten yard restraining line.

2. It is permissible for the kicking team to use a natural tee made from the soil in the immediate vicinity of the point of kick-off.

OFF-SIDE PLAYS

On all off-side plays committed within the ten yard line by the defensive team, the penalty shall be one-half the distance to the goal instead of five yards.

PLAYER ENTERING THE GAME
A player entering the game shall be permitted to communicate with his teammates immediately, instead of waiting until one play has been completed.

FLYING BLOCK AND TACKLE The flying block and flying tackle are permitted.

FORWARD PASS

- 1. The passer may pass the ball from any point behind the line of scrimmage.
- 2. A forward pass made hand-to-hand back of the line of scrimmage, which becomes incomplete, is to be ruled a fumble.

Officials must notify the COACH of each team when time has been out three (3) times—and no penalty is to be imposed for additional time out unless such notice has been given.

DEAD BALL
In Rule 7—Section 7—Article (1a) of the Intercollegiate rules omit the words "when any portion of his person except his hands or feet touches the ground."

PERSONAL FOULS

Use of hands—In Rule 10—Section 2—Article 1—Item 2 of the Intercollegiate Rules, omit the words "players on defense may not strike the opponent on the head, neck, or face with the palms of their hands".

CLIPPING

The penalty for clipping shall be 25 yards—officials shall enforce this rule to the letter.

GOAL POSTS

The goal posts shall be placed on the goal-line instead of ten yards beyond.

Because of the goal posts being placed on the goal-line the following rules become effective:

1. A ball kicked from the field of play, except one scoring a goal, which strikes the goal posts or cross-bar before being touched by a player of either side, shall become a dead ball and is to be ruled a touchback.

A ball kicked from behind the goal-line which strikes the 2. A ball kicked from behind the goal-line which strikes the goal posts or cross-bar and is recovered by the opponents in the end zone shall be ruled a touchdown. In the event it is recovered by a player of the kicking team, or rolls outside the side line extended, or beyond the end line in the end zone, it shall be ruled a safety. Should the ball strike the goal posts or cross-bar and continue into the field of play it shall be played as if it did not hit the goal posts.

3. A forward pass thrown from the field of play which strikes the goal posts or cross-bar before or after it has been touched by an eligible player and before it has touched the ground shall

be declared incomplete and ruled a touchback.

be declared incomplete and ruled a touchback.

4. A forward pass thrown from behind the goal-line which strikes the goal posts or cross-bar shall be subject to recovery by the opposing team or any eligible player of the passing team before it strikes the ground. (The passer is included among the eligible men.) Should the ball be recovered by an opposing player within the end zone before it strikes the ground it shall be ruled a touchdown. If it is recovered by a member of the passer's team and not advanced into the field of play, or bounds beyond the side line extended, or beyond the end line, it shall be ruled a safety. Should the ball strike the goal posts or cross-bar and continue into the field of play it shall remain in play as though it had not touched any obstruction. as though it had not touched any obstruction.

The Bears in nine games have gained 2,993 yards, only 36 shy of their 1933 total and have scored 230 points only 14 less than the record total of the New York Giants last fall.

The Green Bay Packers continue to hold their lead in forward passing with an average of 43% successful by completing 54 tosses in 127 attempts, while New York is second with a 37% average, 39 completed in


RED GRANGE Chicago Bears
