

DANOWSKI CLOSE TO LEAD

Ed Danowski is within a few percentage points of over-taking Ed Matesic of Pittsburgh as the best passer of the league. The Giant star, who set a new record of efficiency last season, has completed 34 in 69 attempts so far this season to top the Giants in aerial work. Tuffy Leemans continues as the leading ground gainer of the league with 575 yards in 132 attempts, an average of 4.5 per attempt. Dale Burnett with 18 points is the leading Giant scorer, while Tillie Manton with ten extra points and a touchdown is unly two points behind the veteran halfback.

Packers Packing Punch

The Green Bay Packers return to the Polo Grounds two weeks from today to resume those knock down and drag them out battles with the Giants after an absence of a year. These struggles with Curley Lambeau's Wisconsin eleven have long been the highlight of seasons gone by and the current record of the Packers points to the renewal of the rivalry as something you can't afford to miss seeing.

The Packers are tied with the Bears for the leadership in the western sector and it seems highly probable that they will be favored in the drive down the stretch for the right to gain the playoff for the Ed Thorp Memorial Trophy and the National League championship.

It's a colorful outfit this hardy bunch

from Wisconsin. Arnie Herber, probably the greatest long distance heaver in the circuit, is still out there with his black locks waving and pitching them with unerring accuracy yards down the field with Don Hutson, the former Alabama end, snaring them for long gains. Herber's tosses have all ready gained over 660 yards this season and he's won several games for the Packers.

Clarke Hinkle, whose feats at Bucknell gave Fordham many a headache at the Polo Grounds, is again in good shape and one reason for the Packers being on top of the heap again. Not to overlook George Sauer, the ex-Nebraska all-American and one of the toughest fullbacks of the league now in his second year of pro ball.

Paul Miller, speedy ball carrying recruit from North Dakota, is ready to challenge Tuffy Leemans' right to claim as the outstanding rookie ball carrier of the circuit.

And of course there is Johnny Blood who has oftentimes been a thorn in the side of the Giants and whose play this year has been the inspiration to carry the Packers through all opposition.

The Packers upset the Giants, 16 to 7, last fall in Green Bay and the local eleven is out to revenge that set-

back and also to keep in the race for the right to represent the East in the playoff battle. It may well be a preview of the title battle although both teams face a hard struggle to win the sector titles.

PACKERS BEST ON OFFENSE

The Green Bay Packers, who meet the Giants here two weeks from today, have the outstanding offensive team of the National Football League. The Packers have gained 1,939 yards and scored 151 points, which gives them a substantial lead in both these offensive departments over the Chicago Bears and New York Giants.

The Giants have been increasing their passing efficiency with each week and are now only two per cent behind the Pittsburgh Pirates. The Giants have completed 42 in 92 attempts, while Pittsburgh in one more game has completed 65 in 138 tosses. The Pirates a week ago had a five per cent lead over the Giants.

The Boston Redskins, who close the season here on December 6, are the best defensive club of the circuit. Only 1,221 yards have been gained against Ray Flaherty's Redskins in seven games.



RULES OF MAJOR LEAGUE FOOTBALL SUMMARIZED BY WILFRID SMITH

Professional football, in the past three seasons, has altered the code of rules under which colleges and universities play the game. The changes have not been numerous but they have been important.

The most important change permits forward passes to be thrown from any point behind the scrimmage line. The college rule permits forward passes from any point FIVE yards behind the scrimmage line.

In professional football the goal posts are on the

goal lines.

Professional football declined to adopt the "dead ball" rule of the collegiate code.

Flying blocks and flying tackles are permitted in the professional game. The professional rule against clipping, that is, knocking down an opponent from the rear, is strictly enforced. The penalty is loss of 25 yards, as compared with the collegiate rule which penalizes infractions with the loss of 15 yards.

Professional players may be stationed any place on the field so long as they do not advance within 10 yards of the ball before it is kicked.

At the kickoff, the pros may kick from a dirt tee. Substitute players may communicate with their teammates immediately on entering the game. Coaches must be notified when the limit of three times out have been taken in a half.

When the ball carrier is run out of bounds or is tackled at any point within 15 yards of the side line, the ball will be placed in play at a corresponding point 15 yards from the side of the field.

Offside penalties on the defense within its own 10 yard line have been minimized. Instead of loss of five yards, customary rule, the penalty in this area now is half the distance to the goal.

Here are the two most important changes in the pro rules for this fall:

1. A fumbled ball, except fumbles resulting from lateral passes, may be advanced by either team, no matter whether the ball strikes the ground or not. On fumbled laterals, the rule remains the same. The offense may recover and advance; the defense only may recover unless the ball is caught in the air. Then it may be advanced. Fumbled kicks may be recovered by the kicking team. They can not be advanced unless the receiver of the kick gains possession and then fumbles when tackled.

2. The penalty for two forward passes on the same down has been changed. In the past there have been several instances where a forward pass was completed successfully and after the ball had been advanced for a long gain, an attempted lateral pass actually became a second forward pass. Under the collegiate rule the ball is brought back to the point at which it originally was put into play. The new professional rule provides for a loss of FIVE yards from the point at the second and illegal forward pass.
