

GIANTS TAKE TO ROAD

The New York Giants will not return to the Polo Grounds for three weeks following the engagement with the Chicago Bears today. However you will not have to miss the National League champions in action. The Giants next Sunday will travel over to Ebbets Field to face the revamped and determined Brooklyn Dodgers.

After that tussle the Giants are scheduled to go out to Detroit to face the undefeated Lions, who are setting the pace in the Western Division race at the present time. Both of these fields have long been jinx spots for the Giants. The New Yorkers have been tied in their last two trips to Ebbets Field and in four trips to Detroit since 1934 the Giants have yet to return with a victory.

If the Giants can get by these two engagements away from home they will be in a good spot to battle the Redskins down to the finish line for the Eastern Division title. Following the two games away from home the Giants come back here for four straight engagements opening on Sunday, Nov. 12, with the Chicago Cardinals headed by Marshall Goldberg, Pitt's great all-America back.

After the Cardinals the Pittsburgh Pirates, the Brooklyn Dodgers and last of all the Washington Redskins will encounter the New York eleven on the home field.

GOLDBERG LEADS CARDINALS

The New York Giants are in for tough sledding the next two weeks on the road facing the Dodgers at Ebbets Field and the undefeated Detroit Lions in Detroit, but there is no letup in sight for them on the return home.

The Chicago Cardinals under the leadership of Ernie Nevers, former All-America and All-League back, will move into the Polo Grounds on Sunday,

November 12, and it promises to be a busy afternoon for Steve Owen's boys.

The Cardinals gave the Giants their hardest battle of the season last fall when it took a last minute touchdown by Tuffy Leemans to nose them out 6 to 0 after the Chicago outfit had outplayed the New Yorkers.

The current Cardinal array is more powerful than that of a year ago, boasting as it does the addition of Marshall "Biggie" Goldberg, Pitt's famous All-America back who is no stranger to the Polo Grounds.

In addition to Goldberg they have another great All-American of last season, Ky Aldrich of T. C. U. who is rated as the best center in the western division at the current time.

Two former members of Fordham's Seven Blocks of Granite, Al Barbatsky and Mike Kochel, are playing in the Cardinal forward wall.

Also in the Cardinal lineup is Bill Smith, all-league end

who is currently setting the pace as the leading pass catcher of the circuit and also rates highly among the field goal kickers of the league. Smith is a great target for Jimmy Robbins, former Arkansas passer who is one of the best sharpshooters of the circuit; Frank Patrick, another one of Pitt's former all-American aces, is also in the Cardinal backfield.

FILCHOCK SETS MARK

For the second straight week a National Football League individual record was broken when Frank Filchock, Washington forward passing arc, threw a touchdown pass to Andy Farkas good for a 19 yard gain against Pittsburgh. The previous mark was made last year when a thought Russell to Gaynell Tindey aerial gained 98 yards against

John Druke, Cleveland Rams hard-hitting fullback, became the week's only new pacemaker when he tallled sky points against Detroit. This gave him a sensori's scoring total of 36 points. This disbodged Bill Smith, Chicano Cardinals end, from the leadership. Smith has 34 points, I do Manikad, Chicano Bears, 31, 11m Benton, Cleveland, and Bill Osmanski, Bears, 30 each, to keep within striking distance of Druke.

There is a three-way tie for pass receiving. Smith, Perry Schwartz, fronklyn, and Vie Spadacchii, Cheveland, each have raught 15. Maniari ad Osmanaki continue to run one-two for ground-calming laurels with 79 and 332 yards respectively. Days Smukler, Philadeiphia, is third this 218 yards.

Parker Hall, Cleveland rookie from Mississippi; Ace Parker, Brooklyn, and Bernie Masterson, Chicago Bears, remain the three best passers of the circuit. Frank Filchock, Washington, completed 6 out of 7 Sunday after completeing 8 out of 8 the previous week to bring his total completions to 18 out of 26 tosses for 69% efficiency. Masterson's five touchdown passes lead the circuit, while Jack Robbins, Cardinals, has thrown four secring aerials.

Five players are sled for field-goal kicking with two each. They are Jack Manders, Bears: Bill Smith, Cardinals: Hank Reese, Philadelphia, and Kon Strong and Ward Cuff. New York. Reese last Sunday kicked one 43 yards, the longest of the senson. Dave Smakker, Philadelphia, has the best punting average—49 yards from scrimmage in ten kicks. Twenty-three players in the National League have kicked the ball fifty or more yords this season.

TEAM RECORDS SHATTERED

One National Football League team record was broken by the Washington Redskins and another tied by the Chicago Bears as these fast moving aggregations continued to pace the circuit to new heights in offensive achievement in the fifth week of play.

Washington, by secring 44 points against Pittsburgh, became the first team in league history to tally over forty points in two consecutive games. The record books show that only four times in the past four seasons have National League teams secred 40 or more points in one game. The Bears also tailized 44 points Sunday as they gained 408 yards. It is the third time this season that the high-graved Chicagonus surpassed four historied yards in one game. The lieurs have 137 points and Washington has 92 for first and second in league secring. New York is the best defensive team in the league. Opponents have secred only 20 points, while Detroit is tied with the Glants in allowing only 576 yards. Team statistics, 87th week of play:

PRO RULES

There are differences in rules for games played in the National Football League and under intercollegiate rules. We would like to call your attention to these major differences:

- The goal posts are on the goal line (not ten yards back).
- Forward passes are permitted from any point to the line of scrimmage (not thrown from five yards behind line).
- The penalty for a forward pass thrown beyond the line of scrimmage is loss of down and five yards from the spot such pass is made.
- 4. A forward pass on fourth down is not a touchback if it goes over the goal line providing the pass originated outside the 20-yard line. In other words if the pass was thrown from the 25-yard line on fourth down it reverts to the defending team at that point.
- On a kickoff the receiving team is not required to have five players within five yards

of the restraining line. Kickers are permitted to use tees in making kickoffs.

- The penalty for clipping is 25 yards (not 15).
- The ball is not dead when the runner touches the ground unless definitely in the grasp of an opponent and all forward progress stopped.
- Substitutes may talk to teammates immediately on entering game.
- Any two players of either team may reenter the game once in the fourth quarter.
- When a penalty is inflicted inside the 10-yard line it shall be only half the distance to the goal line.
- A fumbled ball which strikes the ground may be advanced by an opponent when he recovers it.
- On out of bounds kickoffs the ball is put in play on the 45-yard line (not the 35-yard line).

Eddie Museles Miller, rooke buck, has the best passing mark with 9 in 16 passes completed for 128 yards, one for a touchdown. Ed Danowski after a slow start has been traction back to his record percentage of 50% and now has 4 in 32 passes completed, two for touchdowns. Miller in addition to his possing feats has averaged 43 yards in puniting.
