# SERVICE FLAG OF GIANTS SHOWS 46 BRIGHT STARS



**T**HE service flag of the New York Giants football club shows no fewer than 46 bright stars. Steve Owen's gridiron heroes began to move into Army, Navy and Marines from the 1940 squad, which lost Chuck Gelatka, Bo Molenda, Grenny Lansdell, Walter Neilsen, and Pete Cole.

From the 1941 squad, 22 men went into service, and from the 1942 outfit, 17. Thus far the 1943 squad has lost only one man, George Lynn.

To appreciate more or less fully just what the Giants have had to do to keep up with the war drains on their manpower, just scan that list of 46. Dom Principe, Hank Soar, Jim Howell, Andy Marefos, Merle Hapes, who made so fine a showing in his first season last year, Leo Cantor, Frank

Reagan, Ed Danowski, Jim Poole, George Franck, Nello Falaschi, Chet Gladchuck—these and so many others, gone into the armed forces.

It has been a task to maintain skill against these losses, but the Giants have managed to do quite well, even if they do show a couple of losses this season.

The service flag of the New York club shows stars not only for players but for coaches Molenda and Mike Palm, and Wellington Mara, vice-president and secretary of the club, who is a lieutenant (j.g.) in the Navy.

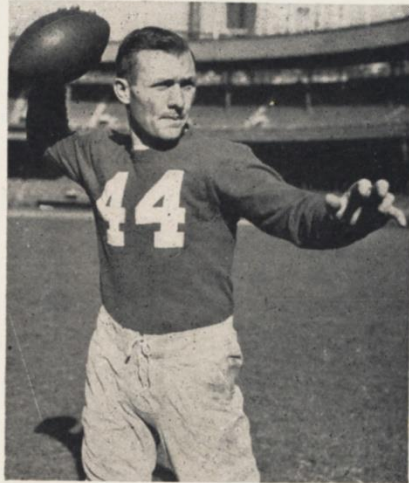

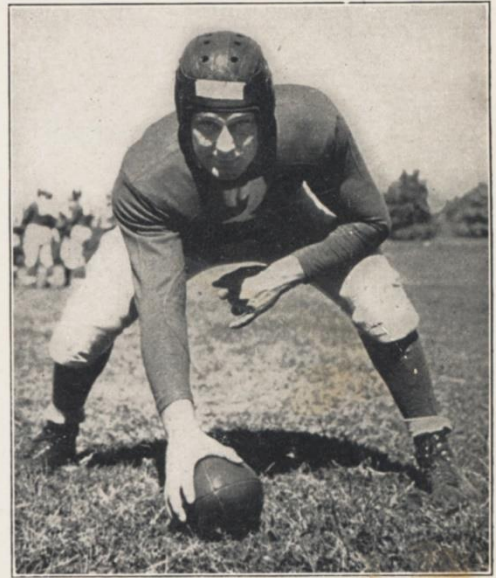

# 1943 Giants Youngest Club Since N. Y. Entered League

**S**TEVE OWEN calls this year's Giants "those kids." Stout Steve's factually correct. The 1943 Giants are the youngest team that's been fielded since the club organized in 1925.

Rookies outnumbered veterans two to one during a stretch in pre-season activities. Barring unexpected developments, the Maramen must make their championship bid this year with a squad formed almost half of freshmen. For the most part the first-year contingent is composed of high-spirited youngsters who work like beavers gaining essential knowledge and experience in the pro circuit, the most exacting of all football schools. The current rookie crop showed some very promising members, especially in the backfield, where vacancies were the most numerous.

**THE YOUNGEST PLAYER** on the squad also is the most promising freshman. He's 21-year blond Bill Paschal out of Georgia Tech. The newcomer is gifted and versatile. The Georgia Flash runs with great speed and power. He's the club's second best passer and No. 1 punter. In four pre-season games Paschal scored seven touchdowns, three against the Camp Lee soldiers. Already the

spectacular freshman is called another Tuffy Leemans.

Other fine rookies are Emery Nix, TCU's latest aerial wizard; Dave Brown, Alabama wingback; Carl Kinscherf, fancy-stepping back from Colgate; two centers, Walter Dubzinski, Boston College, and Bill Piccolo, Canisius; Larry Visnic, guard from St. Benedict's; and Verlin Adams, former Morris-Harvey end.

Coach Owen secured Vic Carroll from Washington, thereby furnishing more league experience to the young squad. Seven years with the Redskins, Carroll played every line position. The newcomer is one of the biggest members of the New York club, six feet three inches and 230 pounds.

Another experienced recruit was Larry Braham, who formerly operated with the Cleveland Rams. He was drawn by the Giants when the Rams suspended for the duration.

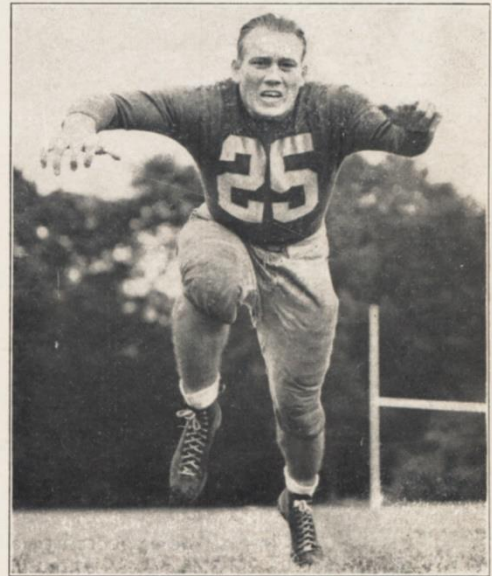

# Ward Cuff Tops All-Time Scoring Sheet of Giants

WARD CUFF, still kicking goals for the Giants, stands out as their leading scorer for the history of the club. Cuff went into the current season with 249 points. Ken Strong, who finished up here in 1939, stands second in the all-time list-

ing, with 194, and Dale Burnett ranks third, with 154.

Coming into 1943, the Giants showed 142 games won, 68 lost, and 14 tied. Here are the official figures—

**In Series

in 1925**

**T**HE Chicago Bears, who are in the Polo Grounds today, always have been welcome visitors. A game with the Bears is a game of thrills. The relationship between the New York and Chicago teams was started in 1925, with the entry of the Giants into the National League, and is the oldest series on the books of the Polo Grounders. That first year the Giants broke even with the Chicago outfit, which won the first game, 19 to 7, and lost the second, 9 to 0.

The Bears came into Harlem today for their twenty-ninth engagement with the Giants. The history of the series shows an edge for Chicago, which has won 17, lost 10 and tied one.

Those of you who were fortunate enough to see that single deadlock will remember it as one

of the most interesting battles in National League history. It came in 1937, 3 to 3.

In the matter of points scored, the Bears show an advantage of 89 points. The Giants have scored 289 and Chicago 378.

It is interesting to note that three of those Giant-Bear struggles were for the championship of the National League. In the first of these, in 1933, the Bears scored one of the most dramatic successes the league has seen—23 to 21.

In 1934, Steve Owen's athletes took the Bears in the playoff, 30 to 13. In the 1941 playoff, the Chicago eleven won by 37 to 9.

Last season, the Halas outfit beat the Giants by 26 to 7.
