## THE RAMS — MIRACLE TEAM

One of the most sensational teams of the past few years combat in the National Football League will invade the Polo Grounds next Sunday to face the Giants in another inter-sectional battle. The Cleveland Rams, now in their second year in the major league, will make their initial bow before New York grid fans but at the helm of the invaders is Art Lewis, who is certainly no stranger to Polo Grounds grid followers.

Only two years ago Lewis was a stellar member of the Giants for he came right out of Ohio University to take over a regular post at tackle and guard for the 1936 Giants. He was a standout player and certainly one of the outstanding rookies of the year that fall as he played almost every minute of every game after he once got into action.

It was a bad blow to the Giants when he took a coaching post last fall and gave up active competition. This past summer when the Rams were looking for an assistant to Hugo Bezdek they requested the Giants to release Art Lewis to them as a playing assistant coach. In return for Lewis the Giants received Johnny Gildea's services and the Rams got the 26-year old line star who today is the sensation of pro football.

When the Rams got off to a poor start despite some of the best material ever gathered together on a single team in the pro circuit it was decided that Lewis was the man to bring them out of the slump and that is just what he has done. Since Lewis took over the tutoring job the Rams have won three out of four and are a strong contender for the championship despite that poor start.

Beating the Detroit Lions, and the Chicago Bears twice in successive games

comes under the heading of a slight miracle and that is just what the Lewis tutored Rams have done. No other team has ever created so much havoc in so short a time among the western division teams and here's hoping they don't sink the Giants title hopes as they have done Lion and Bear hopes.

New York grid fans do not have to be told much about John Drake, who pulverized the Fordham line for Purdue

only a few years ago. Corby Davis, outstanding Big Ten back last fall at Indiana, is also in the Rams backfield along with Ed Goddard, who showed brilliantly here last fall when he started out with the Dodgers. Jule Alfonse and Vic Spadaccini of Minnesota; Dick Tuckey, Manhattan ace, Bob Snyder of Ohio U.; Bob Davis of Kentucky; and Stan Pincura of Ohio State are a few of the other stellar backs Lewis has under his charge at Cleveland.

The line is equally well studded with all-American names too in Ray Hamilton

and Jim Benton, stellar Arkansas ends last fall; Chuck Cherundolo, Penn State center of two years ago; Red Chesbro, Colgate's captain last fall; Vic Markov, Washington's great tackle and numerous other standouts.

This Cleveland invasion is just the first of three tough games still facing our Giants. Following the Rams will come the Green Bay Packers, at present setting the western pace, then the Giants travel over to Ebbets Field for the usual Thanksgiving Day embroglio with the Dodgers which is always a tough hurdle and on Sunday, December 4, close the league race against the championship Washington Redskins, who at present have a half-game lead over the Giants.

## HUTSON TOPS SCORERS

Don Hutson, Green Bay end, rose from second to first in scoring and from second to a tie for first in pass receiving to share honors for the week with Bill Shepherd, Detroit half-back, who jumped from sixteenth to first in ground gaining.

Shepherd's spurt was the result of gaining 152 yards against the Bears last Sunday, the biggest individual ball carrying effort of the season, bringing his total to 308 yards. Andy Farkas, Washington, is just five yards behind with 303 yards, and Cecil Isbell, Green Bay, is third with 295 yards, only four more than Scrapper Farrell of Brooklyn.

Hutson has caught 28 passes to tie Gaynell Tinsley of the Chicago Cardinals, but gained 487 yards as against 289 yards for Tinsley. Eight of his catches went for touchdowns and he has a point after touchdown to give him 49 points for the season.

Regis Monahan, Detroit, tied Ward Cuff, New York Giants, for field goal laurels. Each has kicked 4 three-pointers.

Danowski has completed 50 out of 84 tosses for 615 yards and a 59% average to lead in passing. Baugh's record is 45 out of 81 for 572 yards, and Robbins completed 48 of 90 for 548 yards. Six passers of the league have completed at least 50% of their tosses. The other three are Cecil Isbell and Bob Monnett of Green Bay, and Bill Hartman of Washington.

## GIANTS BEST IN PASSING

The Green Bay Packers are playing the leading role in advancing National Football League scoring to a new record with 168 points in eight games for an average of 21 points a game. Washington, New York, Brooklyn, Philadelphia and Cleveland scoring is also above their average for last season, with the last two named already exceeding their 1937 total points.

Washington and New York continue to pace other teams for ground gaining and forward passing laurels, respectively. Washington has an average of 301 yards gained in seven games, while Green Bay has a 276 average and New York a 268 yard average.

New York has completed 61 out of 117 forward passes for an efficiency mark of 52%, while Washington still has 50% complete in second place with 75 out of 148 tosses. The Chicago Cardinals have completed the most passes—92 out of 192—but are third in efficiency with 47%. Detroit has the best defense against scoring with only 49 points against it. New York has held opponents to an average of 178 yards a game for the best defense.

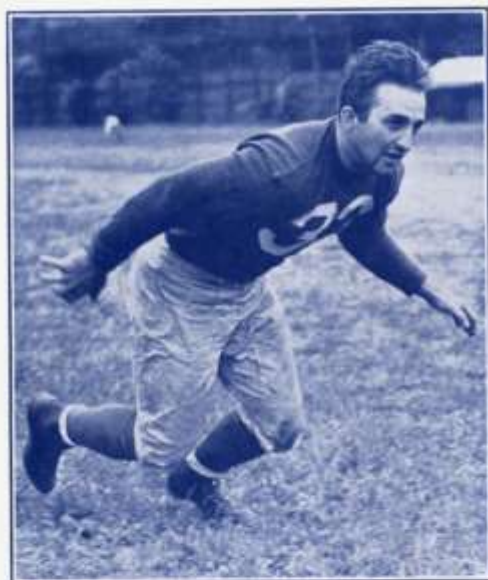

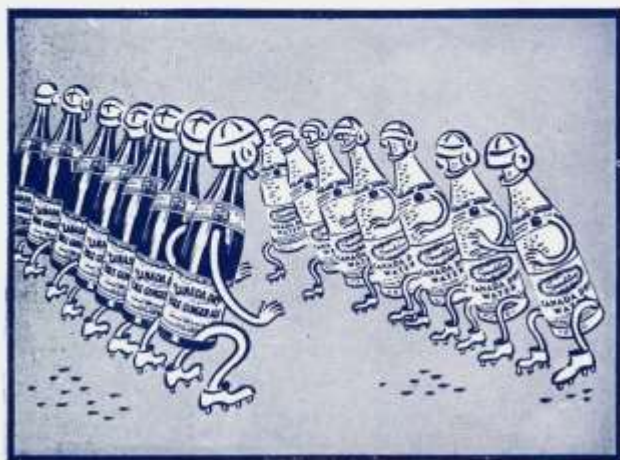

## PRO RULES

There are differences in rules for games played in the National Football League and under intercollegiate rules. We would like to call your attention to these major differences:

1. The goal posts are on the goal line (not ten yards back).
2. Forward passes are permitted from any point to the line of scrimmage (not thrown from five yards behind line).
3. The penalty for a forward pass thrown beyond the line of scrimmage is loss of down and five yards from the spot such pass is made.
4. A forward pass on fourth down is not a touchback if it goes over the goal line providing the pass originated outside the 20-yard line. In other words if the pass was thrown from the 25-yard line on fourth down it reverts to the defending team at that point.
5. On a kickoff the receiving team is not required to have five players within five yards of the restraining line. Kickers are permitted to use tees in making kickoffs.
6. The penalty for clipping is 25 yards (not 15).
7. The ball is not dead when the runner touches the ground unless definitely in the grasp of an opponent and all forward progress stopped.
8. Substitutes may talk to teammates immediately on entering game.
9. Any two players of either team may re-enter the game once in the fourth quarter.
10. When a penalty is inflicted inside the 10-yard line it shall be only half the distance to the goal line.

## SOAR TOPS GIANT GAINERS

Hank Soar continues to set the pace as the leading ball carrier of the New York Giants. The former Providence star now playing his second season with the Giants has picked up 316 yards in 78 attempts and tops Tuffy Leemans by approximately 50 yards.

Ed Danowski is, of course, the leading passer of the Giant squad as well as of the league as a whole. Ward Cuff has the distinction of being the leading field goal boomer and also the leading point maker of the Giants. Cuff has scored 28 points by one touchdown, ten successive extra points after touchdown, and four field goals.

## ROBBINS LEADING CARDS ACE

Jack Robbins, recruit back from Arkansas, is leading the Chicago Cardinals as a ground gainer and also as a forward passer. Robbins is averaging 3.5 yards and has picked up some 175 yards from scrimmage. In addition the former Razorback has completed 48 passes, only two less than Ed Danowski.

Jimmy Lawrence, former T. C. U. All-America back of a few years ago, is the leading scorer of the Chicago squad with three touchdowns. Gaynell Timley, who holds the league record in distance gained on passes, is topping the league and his teammates in the number caught at 28 catches.

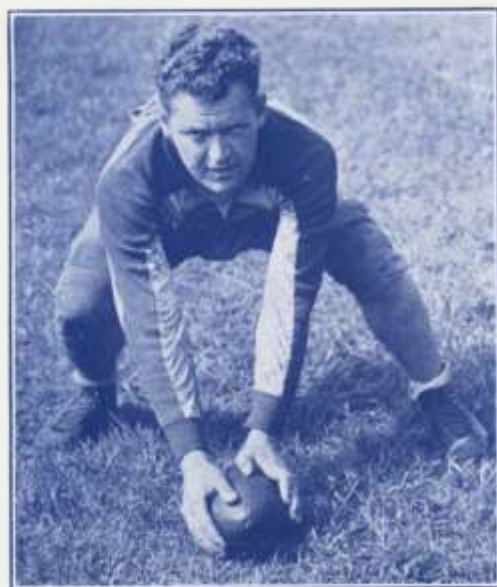

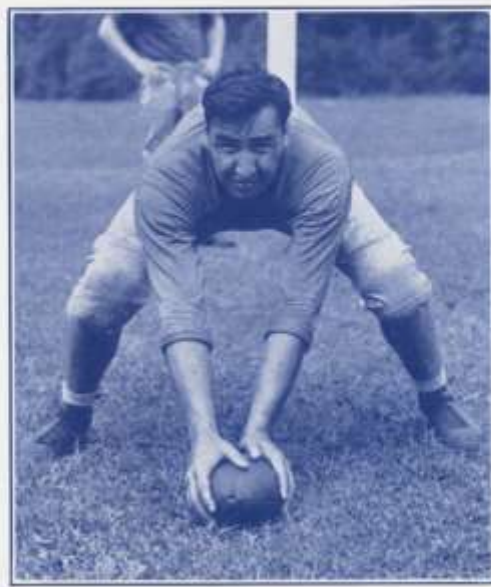

The best kick so far was a 55-yard effort by John Barrattini of Textile High, Manhattan elimination winner.

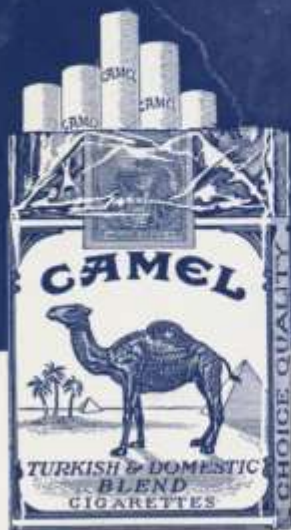
