GIANTS RESUME HOME STAND

The Giants are back home today for the first time in three weeks and the Cardinal game marks the start of a four week stretch drive which we hope will culminate in a successful defense of the Eastern Division title and a place in the playoff.

After the Cardinal game today the Giants must face the Pittsburgh Pirates, the Brooklyn Dodgers and Washington Redskins on successive Sundays. All three proved tough opponents on the road so the path to the title is a rough one. In Pittsburgh the Giants had to come from behind in the second half to win out. Two weeks ago in Ebbets Field the Dodgers threw a major scare into Steve Owen's charges before succumbing, 7 to 6. Earlier in the campaign the New York eleven was lucky to escape with a scoreless tie in Washington.

No champion has yet been able to retain its title in the National League since the circuit instituted the playoff system seven years ago. The Giants are tied now with the Redskins and probably will have to win every game remaining on the schedule to gain the playoff berth.

Washington after playing in Brooklyn today meets the Cardinals and Detroit in Washington before coming to the Polo Grounds on Sunday, December 3.

The current Giant team is boasting the best record any New York team compiled at a corresponding date. Despite the setback in Detroit last week the Giants have won five and tied one. The New York eleven last year had two defeats on its record at this stage of the race and with the strain of maintaining an unbeaten string removed the Giants hope to snap back into championship form.

BEARS ROLLING AGAIN

The Chicago Bears recovered their ground gaining leadership and boosted their scoring total to 206 points as whirlwind offensive tactics continued to keep National Football League averages well in advance of last year's record-breaking highs according to team statistics for the eighth week of play.

For the fourth time this season a team record was broken or shattered when Detroit players kicked four field goals Sunday to shatter the mark of three by one team, by New York, Brooklyn and Detroit six times in the past.

The Bears have gained 2650 yards in addition to scoring 200 points. Washington, last week's ground gaining leader, dropped back to second place with 2303 yards, and Green Bay remained in third place with 2157 yards.

Cleveland's scoring also exceeds its 1938 total as the entire league pace of 29 points a game remains three points above last year's record. Cleveland has completed the most passes—77 out of 167—while Washington's 54 per cent efficiency compiled with 59 completions in 108 tosses is the best.

There have been 33 field goals kicked in 36 games to date. Brooklyn and New York had the league with seven each. New York and Philadelphia are already ahead of their 1938 field goal output.

PARKER AND SCHWARTZ LEADS

The race for individual honors in the National Football League has narrowed down to a thrilling duel among two or three players in all departments as the circuit enters the final month of competition.

Joe Maniaci holds only a nine-yard margin over Bill Osmanski, Chicago Bears teammate, in ground gaining; Parker Hall, Cleveland, and Ace Parker, Brooklyn, are tied in forward passing; Perry Schwartz, Brooklyn, leads Don Hutson, Green Bay, and Sam Boyd, Pittsburgh, by four catches in pass receiving; Ralph Kerebeval, Brooklyn, is one field goal ahead of Ward Cuff, New York Giants, and John Drake, Cleveland, in one touchdown in front of Osmanski in scoring in the close home-stretch duel for 1939 championships.

Martinson's three field goals against the Giants equalled the league record for one game established by Harry Newman, Giants, in 1934, and Ward Cuff, Giants, and Kerebeval, this season. Sloan completed 15 passes against New York to share the one-game record made by Pat Coffee, Cardinals, in 1937, and Ace Parker, Dodgers, this season.

Bill Osmanski, Bears rookie back from Holy Cross, rose from sixth to second in scoring and came within ten yards of surpassing his idle teammate Joe Maniaci in ground gaining. Maniaci has 501 yards to 492 by Osmanski in ground gaining. Maniaci and Andy Farkas, Washington, remain tied for third in scoring with 37 points each, while Jim Benton, Cleveland, is only one point behind.

Bill Shepherd, Detroit, regained third place in ground gaining with 368 yards and Frank Filechock, Washington, jumped from seventh to fourth, with 355 yards, three yards ahead of teammate Farkas, who dropped from third place this week.

PRO RULES

There are differences in rules for games played in the National Football League and under intercollegiate rules. We would like to call your attention to these major differences:

1. The goal posts are on the goal line (not ten yards back).

2. Forward passes are permitted from any point to the line of scrimmage (not thrown from five yards behind line).

3. The penalty for a forward pass thrown beyond the line of scrimmage is loss of down and five yards from the spot such pass is made.

4. A forward pass on fourth down is not a touchback if it goes over the goal line providing the pass originated outside the 20-yard line. In other words if the pass was thrown from the 25-yard line on fourth down it reverts to the defending team at that point.

5. On a kickoff the receiving team is not required to have five players within five yards

of the restraining line. Kickers are permitted to use tees in making kickoffs.

6. The penalty for clipping is 25 yards (not 15).

7. The ball is not dead when the runner touches the ground unless definitely in the grasp of an opponent and all forward progress stopped.

8. Substitutes may talk to teammates immediately on entering game.

9. Any two players of either team may re-enter the game once in the fourth quarter.

10. When a penalty is inflicted inside the 10-yard line it shall be only half the distance to the goal line.

11. A fumbled ball which strikes the ground may be advanced by an opponent when he recovers it.

12. On out of bounds kickoffs the ball is put in play on the 45-yard line (not the 35-yard line).

LEEMANS LEADS GIANTS

Tuffy Leemans is top ground gainer for the Giants. Tuffy in seven games has gained 346 yards in 99 attempts averaging over 3 yards per attempt. His closest rival is his running mate at tailback, Len Barnum, who has piled up 196 yards in 60 attempts, also better than three yards at a clip.

Ed Danowski is approaching the 50 per cent mark in passing once more with 26 completed in 57 attempted passes, three of them good for touchdowns. Eddie Miller, rookie ace, with 16 completions in 18 attempts has the best average of any Giant. Ward Cuff with 32 points is the leading point getter.
