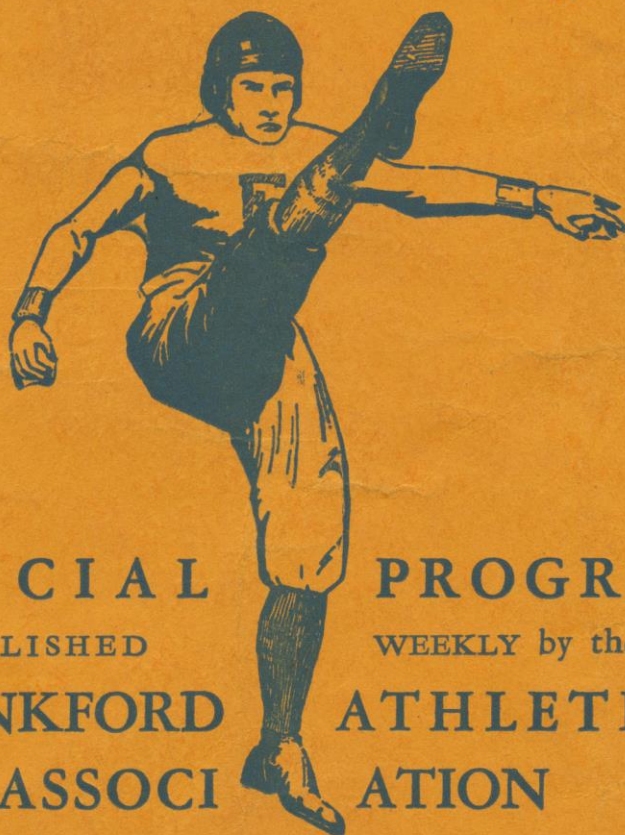

Cleveland Bulldogs with Benny Friedman Here to Battle Jackets Today

Only Team to Lower Colors of New York Giants This Season—Has Great Array of Stars.

Benny Friedman and his Cleveland Bulldogs furnish the opposition for the eighth game of the home schedule of the Yellow Jackets today. Frankford, after splitting even with Pottsville last weekend, shows a revival of the old spirit that carried it to the top of the league last year and are all set to give the Bulldogs the game of their life. A victory for the local eleven today would help greatly to avenge the double defeat suffered by the Jackets at the hands of the New York Giants.

The outstanding star of the visitors is none other than

Benny Friedman, All-American Quarterback in 1925 and 1926, being captain of Michigan in 1926. He was the leading Big Ten Scorer in 1925, and was the best tackler and blocker Michigan had. He is also a great place kicker and punter. Triple threat—hits the line well and a star in broken field. He is without a doubt the greatest forward passer in history and is known as "The Quarterback who never made a mistake."

Other stars with Friedman include: Halfback "Jinks" Simmons, Capt. All-Oklahoma team, a great line plunger and high scorer of the Bulldogs this season; Rex Thomas of St. John's University, with Brooklyn Pros last year; Frank Kelley, halfback, S. Dakota State, and Captain, All-Conference, 1926.

Webber, Munn, Cobb, Owen, Rehnquist, Howard, and Smith of the line, and Bloodgood, sub-halfback, all were with the Kansas City Cowboys last season.

The coach is L. B. Andrew of Kansas State 1915, 1916-1920, Great Lakes Naval Training Team in 1918; All-Time All-Kansas tackle.

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PHILADELPHIA

Rogers, Ed. Weir and Dougherty Appointed Coaching Staff of Yellow Jackets

Ed. Weir to Direct Line, Rogers and Dougherty Will Lead Backfield. Latter is a Newcomer.

The Yellow Jackets have reorganized and a complete change in Coaching arrangements has been made by the Association. After the resignation of Uncle Charlie Moran, Swede Youngstrom jumped in and took charge of the boys for the last two games and made out well while permanent arrangements were being figured out; but Swede had consented to act for the Pottsville games only.

Following a meeting of the Directors of the Frankford Athletic Association held on Tuesday night, it was announced that for the balance of the season the coaching will be in the hands of a staff composed of Pug Dougherty, interfering partner of Red Grange on the 1925 Illinois team, Ed. Weir, Nebraska end who has been with the Jackets two years and Charlie Rogers, last year Penn flash who has performed exceptionally well this season with the Jackets.

In securing Daugherty the Association landed one of the best backs playing pro-football today. The former interfering partner of Red Grange at Illinois will likely open up the holes for Charlie Rogers and then the former Penn flash will show the Frankford fans even more real ground gaining than he has already displayed.

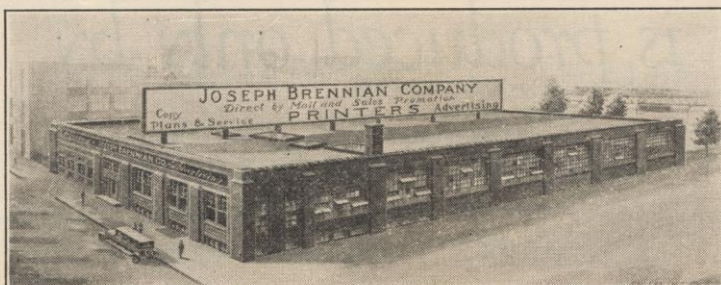
Ed. Weir, All-time All-American tackle from Nebraska who joined the Jackets last year, became an idol of local fans the first game he played, and there is no question that he knows his stuff and will make an excellent line coach.

Charlie Rogers who has been shifted from halfback to signal caller is fast filling the vacancy left in the minds of the Jacket followers caused by the releasing of "Tex" Hamer.

"Two Bits" Homan, Rudy Comstock, Swede Youngstrom, Max Reed, Ned Wilcox and Ed. Weir are the only men left who have played with the Jackets before this year.

"The fans have been apparently shocked with the rather sudden changes that have taken place lately, but the association feels that these moves have been for the best interests of the present team and in line to make a good foundation for the following year. A radical change is often bad in the middle of a season but at times breaks occur that must be faced and drastic measures adopted quickly. This change will work smoothly and the fans will see plenty of football from now on even though the toughest games on the schedule are yet to be played."

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Jackets Beat Pottsville

Breaking Losing Streak

Rogers Individual Star of Great Victory Over Maroons in Annual Fray.

MINERS EVEN COUNT IN RETURN GAME AT POTTSVILLE

After losing four straight games that toppled Frankford to the bottom of the league standing, and the resignation of Coach Charlie Moran, to add to the downward slide, the Jackets, lead by Charlie Rogers, former Penn flash, staged a comeback last Saturday and turned in a victory over their ancient rivals, 10-0. "Swede" Youngstrom, veteran Jacket linesman, deserves much credit for the victory, for it was he who put the winning combination on the field that spelled defeat for Pottsville. But to Rogers belongs the individual laurels accorded that fighting player, that instilled the old spirit in the fans and displayed the pep of great Frankford teams of yesteryear.

It was incidentally Charlie's first game as signal caller, but it in no way impeded his brilliant display of ball-toting ability that has won him a place in the hearts of Frankford fans. He held down the job nobly, giving the team that pep and punch that has been lacking all season. His selection of plays met with very favorable comment from all sides.

Frankford gained a total of 329 yds. during this hectic struggle, 223 of which were chalked up by Rogers. He gained 4 of the 11 first

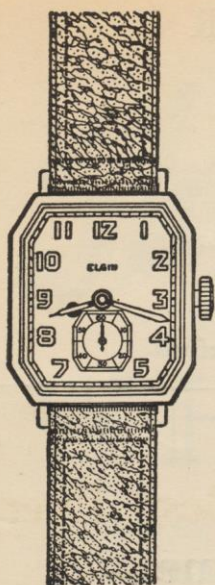

downs. He returned one punt 55 yards in the second period that placed the ball in position for Mercer's field goal, the first score of the game.

Those three points were only a starter. In the third period Charlie Rogers again figured in a series of startling plays, when he was an ace on the receiving end of a long forward pass that carried the ball to the enemy's 18-yard line. A moment later, Charlie was loose, despite pools of mud on the field, and dashed spiritedly through the entire Pottsville clan, reversing his field to scamper over the goal line with a touchdown, one of the prettiest runs ever seen on the local gridiron. When Mercer booted the point after touchdown, the game was successfully sewn up.

Frankford presented a real team built around Rogers on offensive; and also with a defense, of the stone-wall variety, which held Pottsville for downs on two separate occasions during the game, when scores were imminent. "Pud" Connaughton was a real ace in the line as was McGrath on the end, until he was rather seriously hurt in the closing minutes of play. Adrian Ford, former Lafayette star, was in the Frankford line-up for the first time at halfback, and played a bang-up game especially in giving interference and in the defense, as did Kassel, from Illinois, at end.

Budd, former Jacket player of last year, tried a field goal from the 11-yd. line which went wide of the mark. The playing of Wentz, Ernst, and Latone was up to the usual good standard always displayed by these boys against Frankford.

POTTSVILLE WINS SECOND GAME

The following day (Sunday) the Maroons evened the count by winning on their home grounds, 9-0.

It was a field goal by Pete Henry and a touchdown, by Joe (Whippet) Carr, new members of the Maroon eleven, that provided the margin of victory for the miners. The contest was played on a muddy field, with a high wind blowing that handicapped kicking and forward passing toward the west goal, and both teams took advantage of the gale when in possession of the opposite end of the field.

Carr's Run Profitless

On the first play of the second period Carr broke through the Jackets' tackle and ran to Frankford's 19-yard line. Frankford held and Pete Henry stepped back to the 32-yard mark and dropkicked over the center of the bars, the ball traveling 45 yards, giving the Maroons a 3 to 0 lead.

Ford broke through the Maroon line early in the third period, and as he was tackled, fumbled the ball, Carr grabbing it for the Maroons on their 17-yard line. A beautiful pass by Jack Ernst and a remarkable catch over his head by Carr behind the Maroons' goal line gave the Maroons a touchdown and the score was 9 to 0. Pete Henry's dropkick for the extra point was wide of the bars.

In the fourth period, the Jackets threatened on two occasions and but for the wonderful defensive work of Scharer, Osborne and Carr, the Jackets likely would have possessed a touchdown.

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FRANKFORD, PHILADELPHIA

Guy Chamberlin and His Chicago Cardinals Here Next Saturday

Jones, Springsteen and Moran, Trio of Former Jackets, Who Are Starring for Windy City Eleven.

Next Saturday will, no doubt, see a capacity crowd at the local Stadium, due to the fact that Guy Chamberlin, last year's coach of the Yellow Jackets, is this year mentor for the Chicago Cardinals. With him are Ben Jones, Springsteen, and Hap Moran, who was recently released from this year's Yellow Jackets. The Cardinals, like Frankford, have not been hitting their usual stride this season, but last Sunday played a brand of football that, if displayed against the Jackets, will be hard to beat. They held the strong Green Bay eleven, second position holders, to a 6-6 tie.

Chamberlin, Jones, Springsteen and Moran were very popular with hundreds of local fans and are coming here to prove to Frankford that they are still playing A-1 football. On the Jacket eleven who played with Chamberlin last

year are Homan, Wilcox, Ed. Weir, Comstock and Youngstrom. So it will be practically a battle between two Jacket elevens, as the former Frankford stars are actually the mainstay of the Windy City eleven.

The advance sale of tickets is already far above the expectations of the Ticket Committee; so make your reservations early for what is expected from the local fans' point of view to be the biggest game of the season, as they will in this one fray have a chance to see their favorites of last year battling for honors with the Frankford eleven of today.

The Chicago Bear management pulled a good stroke of business when Tillie Voss was picked up. The majority of the managers figured Voss' football days were over but he is more than earning his money at end for the Bruins.

Bull Lowe is burning up the gridiron at a wing position for the Providence Steam Rollers. His defensive play against the league-leading Bears earned him plenty of ink from the scribes on several Chicago papers.

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CONDENSED RULES

A FEW IMPORTANT RULES AND FACTS FOR YOUR GUIDANCE

When the referee starts the game by blowing his whistle no player on the kicking side can touch the ball on the ground without at once putting it in play by kicking it.

Should a player on the side in possession of the ball make a false start or otherwise draw his opponents offside, the ball, if snapped, shall not be regarded as in play or the scrimmage as started.

Before the ball is put in play the opponents cannot in any way interfere with the center, nor touch him or the ball.

The ball cannot be tossed or passed in the direction of the opponents' goal by a player on the side not putting the ball in play from scrimmage.

A player is put offside if the ball in play has been touched last by a man of his own team behind him. He cannot be called offside, however, if behind his own goal line or while holding the ball for a place kick.

No substitute or any other person not actually in the game is allowed to coach.

THE NATIONAL FOOTBALL LEAGUE

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CODE OF ETHICS

Members of this League are expected to conduct themselves as gentlemen and sportsmen. Any flagrant violation of this principle may subject the offending member to suspension or expulsion.

No member shall knowingly make false representations through advertising as to the personnel of his or a competitive team in an effort to deceive the public for his own financial betterment. The confidence of the public is to be desired above all else.

No member shall have a player on his team under an assumed name.

Tampering with players on College teams shall not be tolerated by this League. The same creates much unfavorable public sentiment against professional football, and is deplored and discouraged by this League. An adequate supply of football players who have completed their academic status exists and by confining ourselves to these men much favorable public sentiment will be ours.

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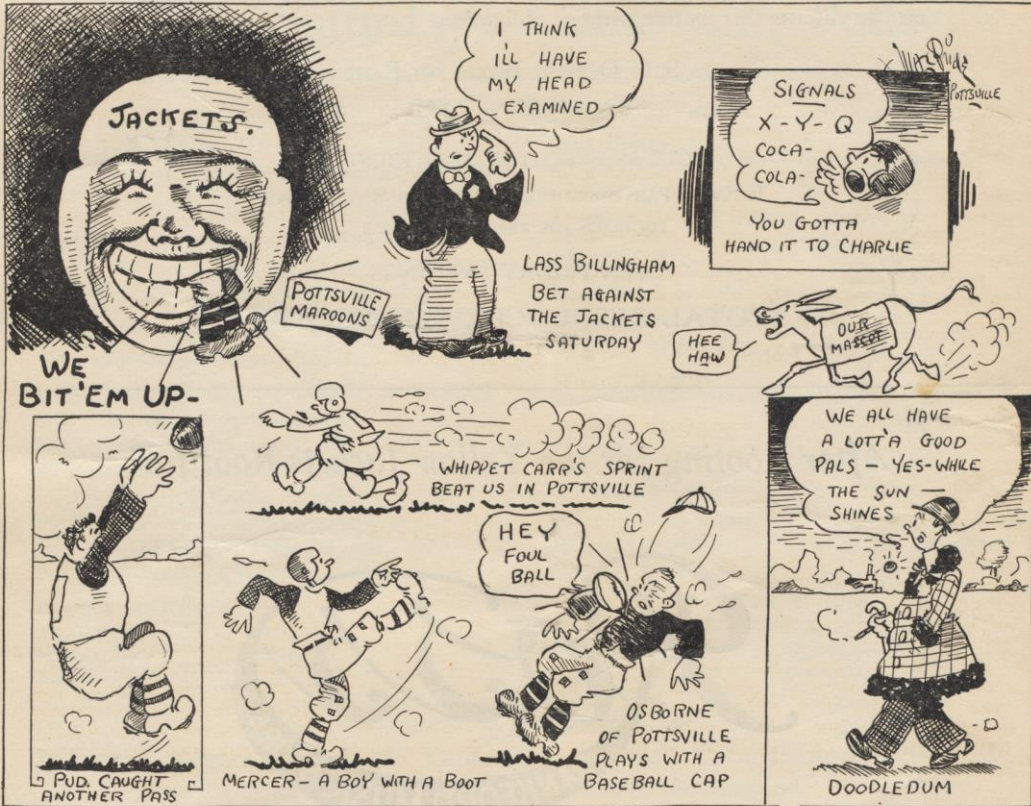

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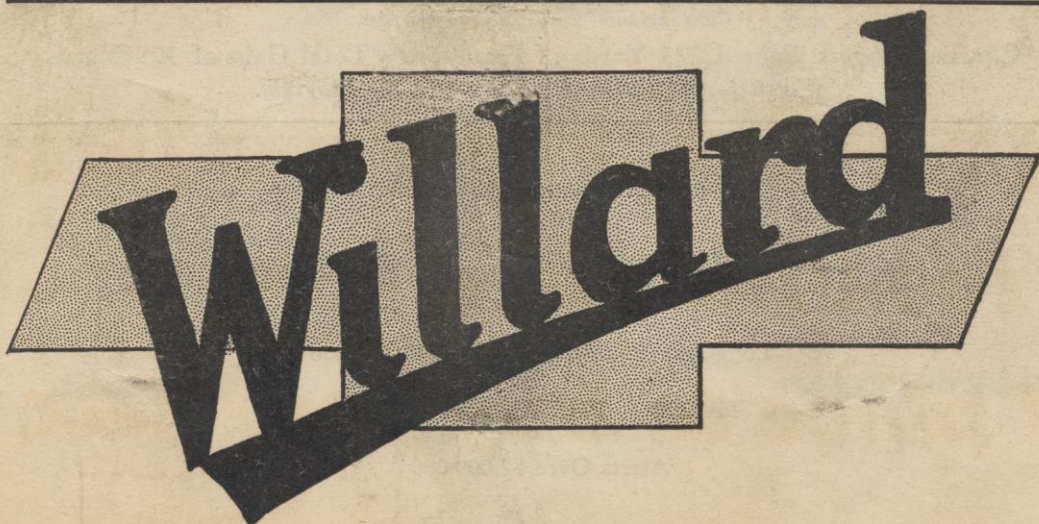

New York Giants Lead League After Trouncing Bears

Score 26-6 Victory Over League Leaders. Yanks Beat Providence 25-0. Many Other Upsets.

New York's two professional football teams shook up the standing in the National League Tuesday by scoring victories in an Election Day double-bill.

Red Grange, returning to the game at the Yankee Stadium for the first time since his leg injury in Chicago, led the New York Yankees to a 26-6 victory over the Chicago Bears, who were toppled from the league lead as a result. The Giants advanced to the top by handing the Providence Steam Rollers a 25-0 trimming at the Polo Grounds.

The Providence Steam Rollers startled the pro-football world by holding the Chicago Bears to a no score tie on Sunday. Conzelman and his crew didn't show much on the offense but defensively, they had a shade on the Bruins.

Wildcat Wilson, the Providence ace, turned in a wonderful exhibition of punting and his soaring spirals got the Steam Rollers out of many a tight spot. Driscoll, the Bear field goal expert, went bad on four attempts.

With a certain Mr. Grange still decorating the sidelines and rubbing his ailing knee, the New York Yankees were submerged in the mud at Luna Park, Cleveland by the Bulldogs 15 to 0. The Pyle-men never had a chance.

Despite a muck-covered cowhide, Benny Friedman hurled the oval with deadly accuracy.

It was two of his bulletlike tosses that paved the way for Cleveland scores. One goal was kicked. The other two points were a safety.

The Duluth Eskimos found the New York Giants just a bit too rough to "snowshoe" over. Nevers and his clan battled all the way but the Broadwayites passed and slashed their way to a well-deserved 21 to 0 victory.

McBride, the Giants' fullback, had a perfect day with his educated toe against the Eskimos as he kicked three out of three extra points. The New York Giants' touchdowns were negotiated by Mule Watson, Hinky Haines and Wyckoff.

The Green Bay Packers invaded Chicago and battled the Cardinals to a 6-6 tie. Chamberlin's crew counted in the second stanza when Brute Weller grabbed a pass after two of the Bays partly knocked the ball down.

The Packers knotted the count in the last five minutes of play. Three well-executed forward passes carried the oval 60 yards down field and Llewellyn knifed the line for a touchdown. The Cards blocked the goal attempt.

Before the Packer-Cardinal game started, Willie Brennan, one of Chris O'Brien's veterans, was presented with a purse of \$1,000 by his admirers. The husky guard is going good in his twentieth year on the chalk-marked field.

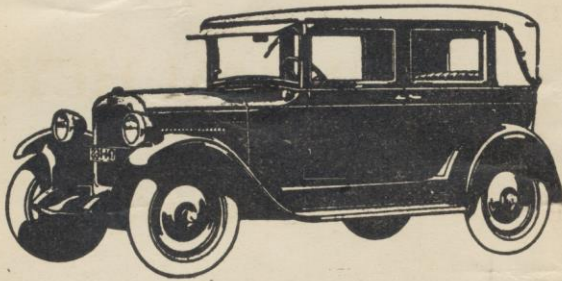

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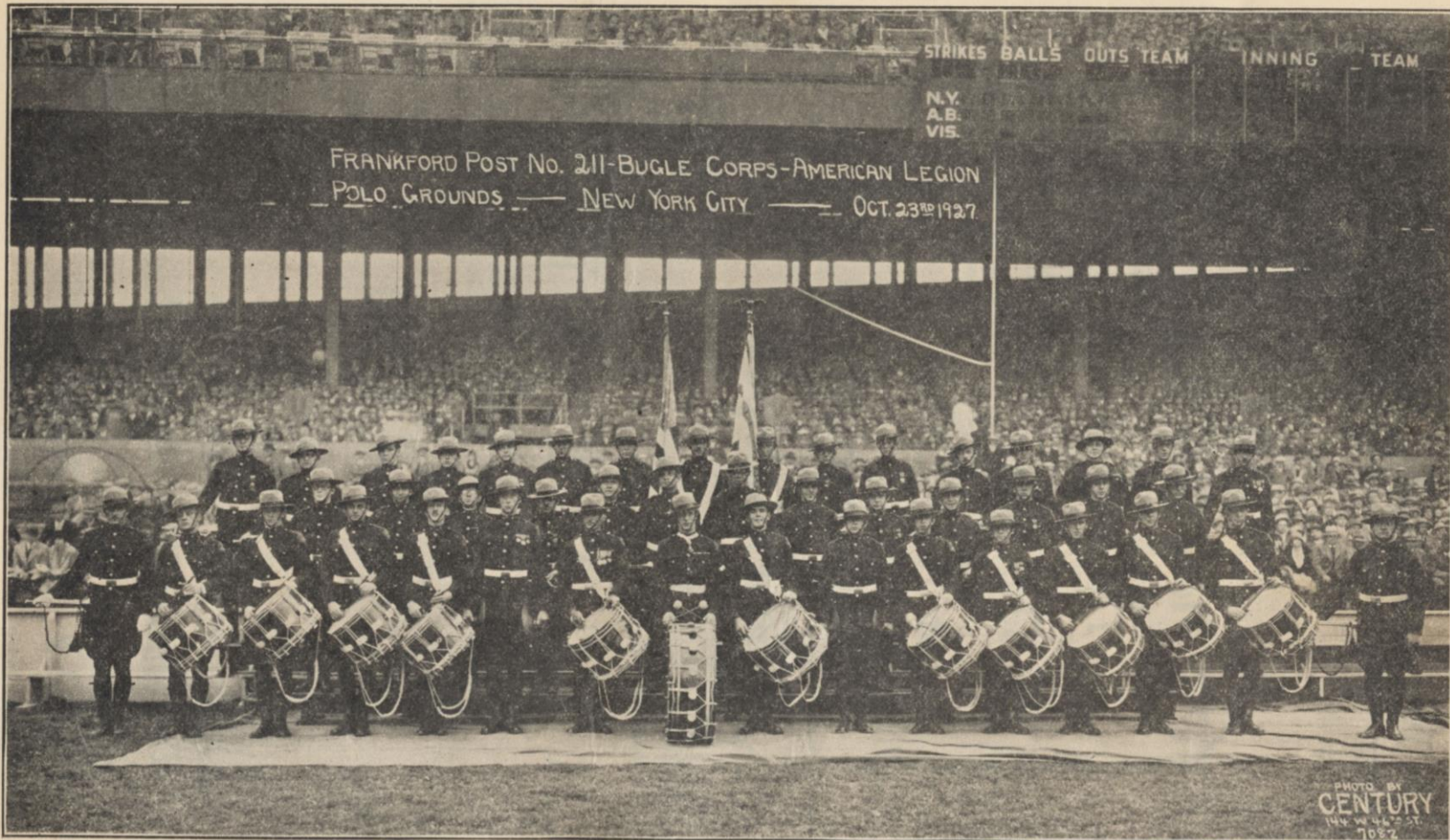
