# Tokyo Bay to the Polo Grounds, From Germany to Coogan's Bluff

THE New York Football Giants' list of Season Subscribers includes fans from six different states, many of whom travel over 100 miles each Sunday to occupy their same seats for all Giant home games at the Polo Grounds. During the present Season, however, the Football Giants' front office has had a score of experiences with far traveling Giant fans which makes all other such incidents seem mild in comparison.

The outstanding example of the perseverance of a Giant subscriber is brought out in the case of Lt. Martin Shenker, who holds a season subscription in Section 30-Upper Stands. Early last June, when the Giant office mailed out the section locations and bills to subscribers one was sent to Lt. Shenker at an Army Camp in Meriden, Mississippi. Nothing further was heard from Lt. Shenker until late in August when a letter arrived from Hochengeim, Germany requesting that the subscription be held for 1945. Early in September another letter arrived from Lt. Shenker in Germany enclosing his remittance and advising the office to mail out his tickets. The Giants take pride in subscribers like Lt. Shenker and trust he always will be with us.

The U.S. Navy is also well represented in the list of traveling Giant fans as evidenced by the many letters received from members of the fleet while in distant Pacific Areas. From the Carrier Enterprise early in September came a reservation for six tickets for the Washington game.

These men were at the Giant office soon after the Big E reached New York and picked up the tickets reserved months before in the Shadow of Tokyo. Also from the Navy came a reservation early in October from a group of officers on the famous *Missouri*. When these men picked up their tickets last week they remarked that acknowledgment of their reservation by the Giants management had reached them while the ship lay at anchor in Tokyo Bay.

The Giant management has had many pleasant experiences with its ticket subscribers but it feels the above incidents will be remembered above all others in that they tend to prove that no matter where the fan may be his tickets will be reserved as long as he wants them—and the management hopes that will be for a long time.

# Green Bay Packers Face Giants Here Next Sunday


THE 1944 champions of the National Football League, the famous and ever colorful and interesting Green Bay Packers, come




### Frank Liebel, Giant of the Week!

AL BLOZIS

AL BLOZIS and Jack Lummus, who made the supreme war sacrifice this year, will be honored by the New York Club when plaques to memorialize their achievements will be unveiled at the Eagles game December 2. Blozis and Lummus typified the finest tradition of skill and sportsmanship on the gridiron. They were equally proficient in the grim business of war. Both were advancing against the enemy in their final engagements, Blozis in the Vosges Mountains in France; Lummus on Iwo Jima.

Blozis joined the Giants in 1942 after winning fame in football and as the world's champion shot putter at Georgetown. Big Al (he weighed 250 and stood 6:6) did well in his freshman year with the pros. In his second he won all-league tackle honors.

After the 1943 gridiron campaign the North Bergen, N. J. giant got into the Army the hard way. He had been turned down several times because of his size. After winning his gold bars, Al received special permission to play with the Giants the last three 1944 games. His gridiron farewell was December 17 when the Giants opposed the Green Bay Packers for the title. Two days later Al was on his way to the front.

Al was seeing his first combat as platoon leader of Co. A, 110th Infantry Regiment, January 31, 1945. He set out alone to find two members of his platoon in the snow-covered mountains close to the German lines.

# Giants Will Dedicate Blozis and Lummus Memorials Dec. 2

There was a sudden blast of German machine gun fire. Big Al never came back.

Lummus came from Baylor University to play end for the Giants in 1941. The Texan enlisted in the Marine Corps in January, 1942.

1st Lt. Lummus was killed in an infantry-tank attack which broke one of the Japs' final and most stubborn lines of resistance on Iwo Jima. He was wounded fatally when a land mine exploded under him in the thick of one of the bitterest battles of the island campaign. At the time, Lummus was well in advance of his men directing the tanks. Even after he was wounded, the former Giant insisted on sending a report to his commanding officer, Maj. John W. Antonelli of Lawrence, Mass. Jack died a short time later.
