

HISTORIES - NEW YORK GIANTS, 1931

"CHANG" ARTMAN-10-Guard

Makes his bow in professional football for the first time this season. Played as guard and tackle for Leland Stanford under the watchful eye of "Pop" Warner and despite his high weight is very fleet of foot. Hails from Long Beach, California.

"RED" BADGRO-17-End

In this stalwart 190 pound son of the University of Southern California, the Giants have one of the greatest defensive ends ever to bring down a ball-carrier, as all those who saw last year's memorable battle with the Packers of Green Bay will testify. And "Red" is not a one sport man either, he belongs to the St. Louis Browns and played ball in Texas all during the summer.

"TED" BUCKLIN-0-Guard

Bucklin joined the Giants while they were on their Western trip. Last season he was coach at the University of Idaho. Bucklin is not a newcomer in pro football. Played a couple of seasons ago with "Wildcat" Wilson in the then so-called Grange League. Good all around player.

DALE BURNETT-18-Back

Last year, in his first year with the Giants, Burnett's pass-catching and ball-carrying won him recognition as one of the best prospects in the League. Weighing 190 pounds, he is in fine shape as he played pro basketball during the off season. He comes from Emporia Teachers College, Kansas.

"RED" CAGLE-12-Back

Cagle, for three years one of the nation's outstanding backs, and universally named as All American, was one of the greatest backs West Point ever produced. But he's a better player now than he was then. He has learned lots of football since his baptism of fire in the game with the rough and tough Green Bay Packers last year. He now weighs 170. When not playing football "Red" sells bonds.

"TURTLE" CAMPBELL-15-End

"Turtle," with his funny looking headgear, is one of the best, most popular and most colorful ends the Giants ever had. He played baseball during the summer and has gained weight. He comes from Emporia Teachers College and now weighs 200 pounds.

"LES" CAYWOOD-4-Guard

"Les" is again with the Giants as he was for two consecutive previous years. He loves to play pro football. Before coming with the Giants he played with Detroit and Cleveland.

"RAY" FLAHERTY-6-End

Ray comes back to the Giants after having coached at Gonzaga College during all of last year. Giant fans will remember him for his fine playing during the 1929 season. He now weighs 190 lbs. and aside from his accurate eye in the throwing of forward passes, Flaherty is one of the best ends in pro football.

"BUTCH" GIBSON-11-Guard

Giant followers of last season will remember "Butch" as the guard who came out of the line to throw a left handed forward pass. The toothless running guard played baseball all summer and is now faster than ever. His weight is about 200 and his Alma Mater is Grove City.

"LEN" GRANT-3-Tackle

"Len" came to the Giants last year fresh from N. Y. U. and, although hampered by a bad knee, put up a very strong battle at tackle. This year, weighing 235, he is lighter than last season and harder. He worked during the off season as a life guard and as an auto mechanic.

"MEL" HEIN-7-Center

When at Washington State College, "Mel" was named on almost every All-American team selected as either center or tackle. He weighs 205 pounds, and his defense specialty is intercepting forward passes. While at college he was an honor student.

"JOHNNY" KITZMILLER-13-Back

"Johnny" was originally appointed to West Point. He played first at Tech High in Harrisburgh and then went west with Captain McEwan, now head coach at Holy Cross. While playing at Oregon U. he was known to the far west as "The Flying Dutchman." His weight is 170 and he does everything a good back should do.

HISTORIES - NEW YORK GIANTS, 1931

"HAPPY" MORAN-22-Back

"Happy" hails from Carnegie Tech and weighs 190 pounds. His ball-carrying featured his play last year, especially in the Green Bay game when he broke through for a sparkling 90-yard run. Since last season, he has sold oil and gas and has been a sailor from St. Louis to New York on a privately owned submarine chaser. He can also play end.

"SUNNY" MUNDAY-9-Tackle

"Sunny" entered the pro football ranks for the first time this season. While he has had no previous pro experience, his many successful chances in the game should merit him recognition. He holds intercollegiate records as a hurdler and discus thrower.

"MICKEY" MURTAGH-2-Guard, Center

At Georgetown "Mickey" played guard under Lou Little on one of his great teams. Then he came to the Giants and has played every position in the line and played them all well. He now weighs close to 200 and lives at Rutherford, N. J. He says he is not bothered by the mosquitos.

"BILL" OWEN-36-Tackle

Weighing 205 pounds, "Bill" is the lighter of the Owen brothers. When not playing football, he is an undertaker although he also juggles oil barrels and plays baseball. He also plays the violin when his fingers aren't sore from football. But above all, he is a fine tackle and a bulwark in the Giant line.

"STEVE" OWEN-55-Coach, Guard, Tackle

"Steve," like his brother, comes from Phillips University and is well up in the 200-pound class with a weight of 235. And is he fast? If he wasn't, how could he cover kicks the way he does? "Steve" has been in pro ball a long time and has always been considered one of the best tackles in the league. During the off season he sells coal and he says his coaching will not interfere with his playing if there is occasion for it.

REHNQUIST-29-Guard

Rehnquist is a graduate of a small Kansas school, Bethany. He is now in his fourth pro-football year. Made his debut with Cleveland, later playing with Detroit and more recently with Providence. Known in professional football circles as a strong defense player. Two seasons ago was named All-Professional Guard.

"TWINKLE" SEDBROOK-14-Back

"Twink," also known as "Dad," weighs 170 and comes from Phillips U. He is a fine ball carrier and pass receiver and a good blocker. He too is a fireman when not playing football and maybe that's what makes him so hot on the gridiron.

"RED" SMITH-5-Back

Smith, in addition to his playing with the Giants is also coaching Seton Hall College over in South Orange. He has behind him four years of football at Notre Dame and before joining the Giants played with the Green Bay and Newark teams of the league.

"SAMMY" STEIN-23-End, Tackle

"Sammy" is a Hebrew and not a college man and is proud of both. The Giants liked his work with the "Stapes" so much that they traded "Tiny" Feather for him. Sam and the "Turtle," both playing without helmets, make a colorful pair on the flanks for the Giants. He weighs 205.

"DOUG" WYCOFF-8-Back

"Doug" is playing his sixth season in pro football. Prior to entering the pro ranks, he was All-American back at Georgia Tech. Was on the Championship Giants of 1927 after which he was featured with the "Stapes." Returns to the Giants after having successfully accomplished his desires with the latter team.
