INDIVIDUAL RECORDS

Harry Newman, New York Giants' star, and Benny Friedman, Brooklyn ace, both former Michigan All-America quarterbacks, are leading the National Football League in forward passing along with Flash Herber of Green Bay.

Newman in five games has completed 17 tosses in 39 attempts for a gain of 353 yards, while Friedman in two games has completed 9 in 11 for 165 yards. Herber has thrown 27 in 57 attempts to gain 371 yards.

Ken Strong of the Giants is second only to Glenn Presnell of Portsmouth as the leading point getter of the circuit. Strong has scored 28 points, one less than the Spartan star. Buckets Goldenburg of Green Bay and Wisconsin, with 24 points is next.

Cliff Batles and Jim Musick of the Boston Braves, with 447 and 273 yards gained, are the best ground gainers, closely followed by Ace Gutowsky, former Giant now with Portsmouth, with 238 yards.

Luke Johnsons, Chicago Bears end, and Paul Moss, Purdue All-America last year, now with Pittsburgh, are the leading pass receivers. Each has caught nine tosses for gains of 253 and 243. Dale Burnett of the Giants has scored most often on passes, tallying three touchdowns on receiving aerials. Ray Flaherty, who led league in this division last year, is in the race with six snared.

SCHOOLBOY CONTESTS

The schoolboy dropkicking contests sponsored by the New York Football Giants will be continued each Sunday between the halves. Today the Jersey schools will be represented. Martin Remore of Fort Lee, Fred Scott of Leonia, Gelso Young of Tenafly, Herbert Welker of Ridgefield Park, and a representative of Rutherford and Cliffside Park High Schools will compete for the right to enter the final on December 3rd.

The opening contest last Sunday was won by Frank Goodell of Curtis High, who kicked four out of five from the 20-yard line in a kickoff after tying with Nick Kazura of Textile and Tom Sette of Stuyvesant at three out of five.

In all instances other than in the exceptions noted herein the rules of the National Intercollegiate Athletic Association are to be followed.

KICK-OFF AND FREE KICK

- 1. The receiving team may line in any position beyond the ten yard restraining line.
- 2. It is permissible for the kicking team to use a natural tee made from the soil in the immediate vicinity of the point of kick-off.

FLYING BLOCK AND TACKLE

The flying block and flying tackle are permitted.

FORWARD PASS

The passer may pass the ball from any point behind the line of scrimmage.

TIME OUT

Officials must notify the captain of each team when time has been out three (3) times-and no penalty is to be imposed for additional time out unless such notice has been given.

DEAD BALL

In Rule 7—Section 7—Article (1a) of the Intercollegiate rules omit the words "when any portion of his person except his hands or feet touches the ground."

PERSONAL FOULS

Use of hands-in Rule 10-Section 2-Article 1-Item 2 of the Intercollegiate Rules, omit the words "players on defense may not strike the opponent on the head, neck, or face with the palms of their hands."

CLIPPING

The penalty for clipping shall be 25 yardsofficials shall enforce this rule to the letter.

GOAL POST

The goal posts shall be placed on the goal-line instead of ten yards beyond.


