## THE 1935 SEASON

---

The New York Giants today open their eleventh season in the National Football League. The 1934 season was one of the most successful in the history of the Giants. New York won the league title and possession of the Ed Thorp Memorial Trophy. Improving on that record will be hard but that is the aim of Coach Steve Owen and his players.

They have a good start in that direction for they come back to the home field this fall with the best record ever compiled prior to starting a stand at the Polo Grounds. Two victories in three starts is the current mark. The Giants feel the array presented today for the first time is a stronger squad than the one which won the title by defeating the Chicago Bears, 30 to 13.

There are nine new men with the Giants this year and every one of them is qualified to step into action as a regular. Seven of these recruits are from college teams, and two were secured from other clubs. These acquisitions have strengthened the team materially Coach Owen believes, and the 1935 edition of the Giants will strive mightily to retain the world's championship for New York.

## SCHOLASTIC CONTESTS

The New York Giants will stage their third annual interscholastic football competition for metropolitan district grid hopefuls this season. The series of elimination contests begin today.

This season there will be two new competitions for the schoolboys. One competition will be for speed and includes a test of running the full length of the field in regular football equipment and carrying a ball. The other competition will be in passing, with each competitor having five shots at a target from varying distances.

For the past two seasons the Giants have held competitions for kickers—two years ago it was dropkicking and last year it was place kicking. In 1933 Martin Remore of Fort Lee was the winner and last season Tom Chase of Roosevelt proved the best place kicker in schoolboy ranks.

The opening competition is for Bergen County, N. J., schoolboys. Next Sunday Westchester players will have an opportunity to qualify for the finals to be staged December 8.

**TEAM STATISTICS**

Ground gaining and point scoring honors this week are divided between teams in the Western and Eastern divisions of the National Football League.

The Giants are leading the circuit in points scored with a total of 69, and have the best passing record with a 43% average of 17 out of 39. Detroit still has the best defensive record, holding the opposition to 379 yards in three games for an average of 126 yards. **BURNETT, DANOWSKI LEADERS**

Dale Burnett, of the New York Giants, and formerly of Emporia Teachers, is leader of the National Football League point scorers. Ernie Cadell, of the Detroit Lions and Stanford, is tied for second with Don Hutson, Green Bay Packers, and 1934 Alabama Rose Bowl star. Burnett now has 30 points, while Cadell and Hutson have 18 each.

Ball carrying honors still rest with Cadell, who boosted his total to 205 yards in 23 attempts for an average of 8.9 yards per clip. Earl "Dutch" Clark, also of Detroit, has a shade better average for second place than Cliff Battles, Boston Redskins.

Ed Danowski, of the Giants and Fordham, is the League's best forward passer with a 47% average of 16 completed in 34 throws for 201 yards. Luke Johnson, Chicago Bears end, leads the pass receivers with 7 successful catches. Tod Goodwin, Giants, has caught 6. Ralph Kercheval, Brooklyn Dodgers, has booted 3 field goals to lead the circuit in his specialty, but Armond Niccolai, Pirates, still has the longest three-pointer to his credit, a 47-yard placement.

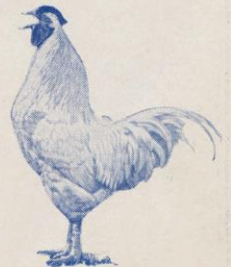

## The National Football League

### RULES OF MAJOR LEAGUE FOOTBALL SUMMARIZED BY WILFRID SMITH

Professional football, in the past three seasons, has altered the code of rules under which colleges and universities play the game. The changes have not been numerous but they have been important.

The most important change permits forward passes to be thrown from any point behind the scrimmage line. The college rule permits forward passes from any point FIVE yards behind the scrimmage line.

In professional football the goal posts are on the goal lines.

Professional football declined to adopt the "dead ball" rule of the collegiate code.

Flying blocks and flying tackles are permitted in the professional game. The professional rule against clipping, that is, knocking down an opponent from the rear, is strictly enforced. The penalty is loss of 25 yards, as compared with the collegiate rule which penalizes infractions with the loss of 15 yards.

Professional players may be stationed any place on the field so long as they do not advance within 10 yards of the ball before it is kicked.

At the kickoff, the pros may kick from a dirt tee.

Substitute players may communicate with their teammates immediately on entering the game. Coaches must be notified when the limit of three times out have been taken in a half.

When the ball carrier is run out of bounds or is tackled at any point within 15 yards of the side line, the ball will be placed in play at a corresponding point 15 yards from the side of the field.

Offside penalties on the defence within its own 10 yard line have been minimized. Instead of loss of five yards, customary rule, the penalty in this area now is half the distance to the goal.

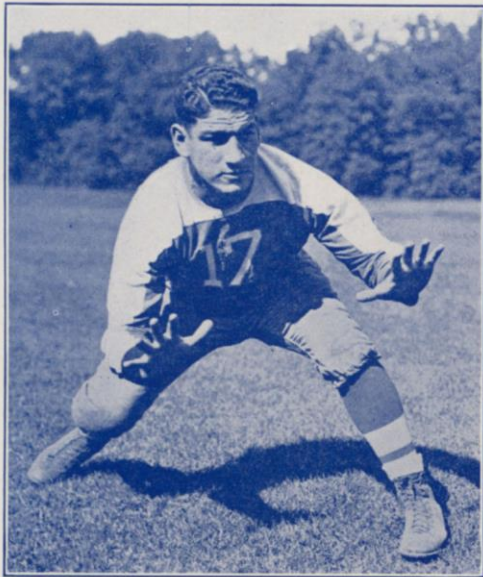
**Here are the two most important changes in the pro rules for this fall:**

1. A fumbled ball, except fumbles resulting from lateral passes, may be advanced by either team, no matter whether the ball strikes the ground or not. On fumbled laterals, the rule remains the same. The offense may recover and advance; the defense only may recover unless the ball is caught in the air. Then it may be advanced. Fumbled kicks may be recovered by the kicking team. They can not be advanced unless the receiver of the kick gains possession and then fumbles when tackled.

2. The penalty for two forward passes on the same down has been changed. In the past there have been several instances where a forward pass was completed successfully and after the ball had been advanced for a long gain, an attempted lateral pass actually became a second forward pass. Under the collegiate rule the ball is brought back to the point at which it originally was put into play. The new professional rule provides for a loss of FIVE yards from the point at the second and illegal forward pass.

A second incomplete forward pass in the end zone constitutes a touchback and loss of the ball to opponents on their 20 yard line. This is the rule in the collegiate code. It also is the professional rule unless the second incomplete pass into the end zone is thrown when the ball was put into play from a point back of the opponents' 20 yard line. In this case the ball passes over to the opponents at that point rather than the 20 yard line.

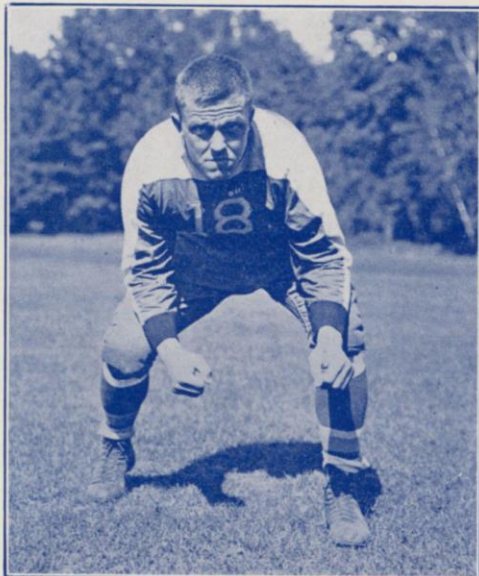

**TOD GOODWIN**

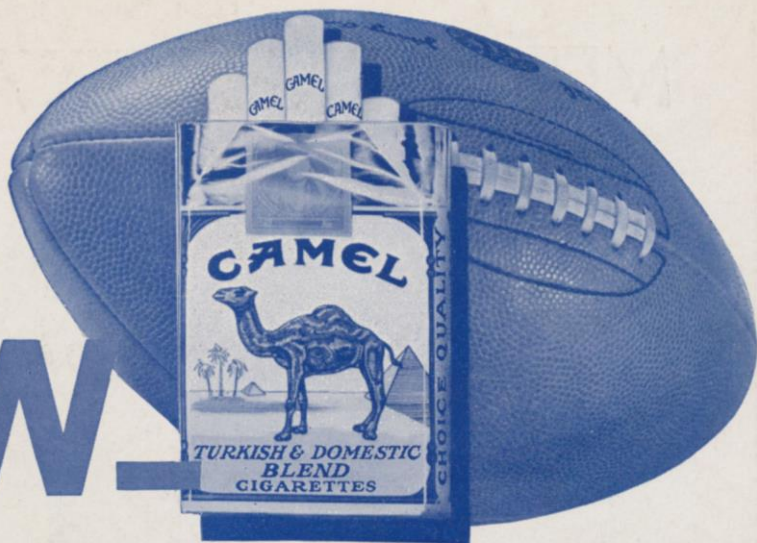
