Ed Danowski is gradually overhauling Sammy Baugh in the passing race and now has 19 completed in 42 attempted to gain 255 yards. Kink Richards is the leading touchdown getter with three six-pointers for 18 points.

The Bears Are Next

The first intersectional game of the season for the Giants brings the undefeated Chicago Bears to the Polo Grounds next Sunday. This struggle, annually one of the highlights of the local National League season will assume additional importance this fall because of the great improvement shown by both squads in their early games.

The word comes back from the West that the Bears are again a big tough bruising outfit similar to the one which garnered the title back in 1932 and 1933. With the Giants also strengthened back to championship form the clash between these two sectional leaders will give the first hint as to the prospective winner of the championship when the playoff is contested in December in the West.

The Bears went through the first four games without a defeat and today meet their strongest rival for

western laurels in facing the Detroit Lions in Chicago. Win or lose that game the Chicago eleven will be the toughest nut Coach Steve Owen's new Giants have been called upon to crack.

Bronko Nagurski is back with the Bears in top shape and piling up yards with those pile driving bull-like rushes of his. Backing him up is Sam Francis, All-America fullback from Nebraska last fall, and by the time the Halas coached outfit hits the Polo Grounds Ray Buivid of Marquette is also expected to be ready for heavy duty. In addition to these ball luggers the Bears have two speedsters in Beattie Feathers and Ray Nolting

backed up by the tossing of Bernie Masterson, whose tosses played such a large part in the Bear win here last fall.


The Bears are the only squad which has earned an even break in the Polo Grounds with honors exactly even in the twelve meetings here. All of which means the Giants will have to be at top pitch to turn back this invasion and

hold onto the leadership in the race for the Eastern Division crown.

The annual Bear-Giant games attract people from all over the East and usually bring out the largest crowds of the season. GIANTS PRESENT STONE WALL

The Green Bay Packers and New York Giants are well on the way to new offensive and defensive records of the National Football League. The Packers, in addition to leading the scorers with 104 points, have gained 1459 yards in 5 games for an average of 291 per game, which exceeds the record 288 average set by the Chicago Bears in 1934.

Opponents have been able to gain only 504 yards in 4 games against the Giants, an average of 126 yards a game. This is 17 yards a game less than the record defensive average of 143 yards set by the Chicago Car-dinals in 1934. The Bears share defensive honors with the Giants having allowed opponents only 11 points.

New York also has an average of 266 for ground gaining to take second place honors, and Washington is third with an average of 261. Detroit is second in scoring with 87 points, and Pittsburgh is third with 78. Washington continues to set the pace in forward pass-ing with 54 completions in 119 tosses for 45 percent efficiency. Green Bay and the Cardinals are tied for second with 44 percent and the Giants are third with 42 percent.

KNOW PRO FOOTBALL

Complete records of all players and teams of the National Football League, the playing code and other pertinent information regarding pro football is contained in the National Football League Guide which can be obtained at all Spalding's stores and also in most other sporting goods stores.

THE NATIONAL FOOTBALL LEAGUE

Following are the major differences in rules between professional and college football games:

The goal posts are placed on the goal line.

The ball must be put in play at least 15 yards in from the sideline, being moved 15 yards in after any play that ends closer than 15 yards to the nearest sideline.

The penalty for clipping from behind is 25 yards.

The ball is NOT dead when a player slips or is thrown to the ground, the ball being in play until the whistle is blown.

Defensive linemen are allowed to use their hands on the head, face or bodies of offensive players.

Fumbles, except on punts or lateral passes, may be advanced. Punts and lateral pass fumbles may be advanced only after "possession and advance" has been established.

Substitutes may talk with teammates immediately upon entering the game.

A forward pass may be thrown from any spot behind the line of scrimmage.

On a forward pass followed by an illegal lateral pass (the second pass being forward instead of lateral or backward) the ball is put in play at a point 5 yards behind where the illegal pass was thrown.

On the kickoff the receiving team does NOT have to have five men within its 45 yard line.

The flying block and flying tackle are permitted.


Penalties within the ten-yard line are only half the distance to the goal line.
