

THE CARDINALS ARE NEXT

The New York Giants have an open date Sunday but they'll need it to get ready for the invasion of western teams which starts two weeks from today when the Chicago Cardinals invade the Polo Grounds.

The Cardinals in their last appearance here two years ago nosed out the Giants,

14 to 13, and they have the power and speed to do it again.

The Chicago team brings the classiest aerial attack of pro football into New York. With Jack Robbins and Dwight Sloan, stars for Arkansas last fall, the Cards boast two of the leagues best tossers. Robbins is close to ousting Ed Danowski from the leadership in tossing passes. Robbins has completed 40 passes in 73 attempts for a 54% average, only a few points less effective than Big Ed.

On the receiving end of these tosses are two of the most elusive ends in football— Gaynell Tinsley, all-league flanker from L. S. U., and Bill Smith, former all-league wing from Washington. Tinsley is at present topping the league in pass snatching

with 26 catches while Smith has caught 14.

The Cards in Conway Baker of Centenary and Tony Blazine of Illinois Wesleyan boast two of the finest tackles in football and they have been further strengthened by the addition of Al Bartbatsky of Fordham in the past week. Such sensational runners as Doug Russell, who led the league in ground gaining three years ago and recently booted a ball 74 yards in the air against the Bears; Jimmy Lawrence, former T. C. U. all-America; Frank Patrick, Pitt's star fullback, along with Milt Popovich of Montana, form a formidable combine to put against the Giants.

The Giants are idle next Sunday but there is plenty of football for you. Over at Ebbets Field, Sammy Baugh and the Redskins will meet the Dodgers in a National League game, and in Jersey City at Roosevelt Stadium the future Giants, our Jersey

City Giants, meet the Brooklyn Eagles in an American Association clash.

DANOWSKI BEST PASSER

Ed Danowski, New York Giants are forward passer, further entrenched himself in first place in the closest race the aerial department has developed in the history of the National Football League, according to statistics for the sixth week of play. Big Ed, former Fordham flash, has completed 45 out of 76 tosses for 523 yards for a 59% average.

By continuing his present pace, Danowski will establish two new individual records for the season. He is two passes a game ahead of the 1937 schedule of Sammy Baugh, who completed 81 passes for a new National League mark a year ago, and he can also whade Baugh's 11 game mark of 1127 yards gained on completions.

There are five players in the league who have an average of 50% or better. Jack Robbins, Arkansas flinger in his first year of professional football with the Chicago Cardinals, jumped to second in passing this week with 40 completions out of 73 tosses for 474 yards and a 54% average.

Don Hutson, Green Bay end, and Ward Cuff, Giants back, broke their first place tie in scoring and field goal kicking. Hutson has tallied 31 points. Cuff has booted four field goals to lead Ralph Kercheval, Brooklyn, by one.

Jay Arnold, Philadelphia: Lloyd Cardwell, Detroit: Max Krause, Washington: Jimmy Lawrence, Cardinals: and Wilbur Soriet and Whitzer White of Pittsburgh, have each scored three touchdowns for 18 points.

PACKERS LEADING SCORERS

The Green Bay Packers took a commanding lead for scoring honors and other Western Division teams played prominent parts in seven changes for National Football League team laurels in the sixth week of play. Green Bay has 120 points in six games.

Washington also relinquished undisputed leadership in forward passing when the New York Giants jumped into a two-way tie in this department. Each team has a 50% efficiency record. The Chicago Cardinals are still third with 80 completions out of 161 for 49%.

Washington retained first place in ground gaining with a 271-yard average in five games. Detroit and New York overtook the Chicago Bears for defensive honors. The Lloons have had only 42 points scored against them, and the Giants have allowed opponents an average of only 165 yards.





PRO RULES

There are differences in rules for games played in the National Football League and under intercollegiate rules. We would like to call your attention to these major differences:

- The goal posts are on the goal line (not ten yards back).
- Forward passes are permitted from any point to the line of scrimmage (not thrown from five yards behind line).
- The penalty for a forward pass thrown beyond the line of scrimmage is loss of down and five yards from the spot such pass is made.
- 4. A forward pass on fourth down is not a touchback if it goes over the goal line providing the pass originated outside the 20-yard line. In other words if the pass was thrown from the 25-yard line on fourth down it reverts to the defending team at that point.
- On a kickoff the receiving team is not required to have five players within five yards of the restraining line. Kickers are permitted to use tees in making kickoffs.
- 6. The penalty for clipping is 25 yards (not 15),
- The ball is not dead when the runner touches the ground unless definitely in the grasp of an opponent and all forward progress stopped.
- 8. Substitutes may talk to teammates immediately on entering game.
- 9. Any two players of either team may reenter the game once in the fourth quarter.
- When a penalty is inflicted inside the 10-yard line it shall be only half the distance to the goal line.






