




Picking National League Eleven

First Expert—Well, let's wait to settle that. The best tackles, I would say, are Adams of Green Bay and Sears of the Steagles.


Second Expert—You say, huh? Well, what about Cope of the Giants? What about Rymkus of the Redskins? I almost forgot Al Blozis.

Second Expert—Well, this here Nix of the Giants is no punk, either.



Frank Stevens—Gentlemen, suppose we adjourn this for another week. Personally, I like that Creighton Miller.







Capt. Gelatka, fighter plane pilot, has won the Air Medal and Distinguished Flying Cross in operations in the South Pacific. He has been cited twice for combat activities in the Paupan and Darwin areas.

Howie Yeager, a fine end, got the Soldier's Medal for Heroism for thrice entering a blazing, crashed plane to remove its two occupants. In this act of heroism, Lieut. Yeager suffered severe burns about the face, hands and legs and spent quite a time in the hospital.

JOHN KARCIS

CHARLEY AVEDISIAN

The football season is reaching its climax. Many players now with the Giants will be missing when the 1944 season opens. Many will go into service. However, we all hope that before another gridiron campaign rolls around, the Axis will be licked and we will be able to return to a peacetime basis. And when that basis comes back, football will share in the greatest sports boom in the history of the country. Meanwhile, here is a handful of little stories about some of the men who have been battling in the colors of the Giants. Let's go!

HEIN, MEL-Center

Thirteenth year with Giants. Age 34; 233 pounds; 6 ft. 4. Came out of brief retirement to play this season. Joined Giants in 1931. Ranked second best center in National League that season. League's No. 1 pivot following eight years, a record far beyond all other league players. Performed in 136 championship games without missing one. Also took part in numerous All-Star and exhibition contests. Needed time-out only in two games. One of the most remarkable iron-man achievements in sports. Giant team captain. Played four years high school football; also four years at Washington State, winning All-American honors. After the 1942 season joined the Union College faculty as member of the physical education department.

KARCIS, JOHN (BULL)-Back

Carnegie Tech., 1929-31. Third season with Giants. Thirty-three years, 225 pounds, five feet nine inches. Outstanding line smasher. Played with the Maramen 1938-39. Last year played and coached the Detroit Lions. Joined the New York squad just before the opening league contest.

KINSCHERF, CARL-Back

Colgate U., 1940-42. First season with the Giants. Twenty-three, six feet one inch, 185. Single. Flashy, speedy ball runner, hard to bring down once in the clear. Football and basketball in college. Home—Boonton, N. J.

LEEMANS, ALPHONSE (TUFFY)—Back

George Washington U., 1934-36. Eighth season with Giants. Thirty years; 202 pounds; six feet one inch. Starred in football in college. Captain senior year. All-League in 1936, his first season as a Giant. Regained all-league honors in 1939 as No. 1 ball carrier. Gained over 3,200 yards from scrimmage. Each year was the Giants' backfield ace and league's most consistent ground gainer. Came back this season as the new Giant backfield coach. Returned to playing competition just before the first league game with the Phila.-Pitt. Eagles

Oct. 9. Born in Superior, Wis. Resides in Silver Springs, outside Washington, D. C.

ADAMS, O'NEALE (SNOZ)-End

Arkansas U., 1940-42. Second season with the Giants. Twenty-four; six feet three inches; weighs 195. Single. Football, basketball and track in college. Quickly made good as Giant rookie, especially as pass catcher. Scored four touchdowns. In first league game against Washinton, completed forward pass for 66-yard touchdown. Birthplace and home—Beebe, Ark.

ADAMS, VERLIN-End

Attended Morris-Harvey College. First season with the Giants. Twenty-five; six feet; 205. Married. Football, baseball, basketball in college. Crashing type of end, fast down field.

AVEDISIAN, CHARLEY (BULL)—Guard

Providence U., 1939-41. Second season with the Giants. Twenty-six; five feet nine inches; shortest man on the squad; 200 pounds. Played in American Association after graduating. Regular Giant guard last year. Birthplace—Hoboken, N. J. Home—Pawtucket, R. I.

BARKER, HUBETH (DEADEYE)-Back


Arkansas U., 1940-42. Second season with the Giants. Twenty-four; five feet eleven inches; 200. Single. Effective line smasher. Left-handed forward passer. Birthplace and home—Welch, Ark.

BLOZIS, AL-Tackle

Georgetown, 1940-42. Second season with the Giants. Twenty-four; six feet seven inches; 250. Outstanding as Giant rookie. Rates to be one of the National League's leading tackles this year. Competed in 1942 Chicago and Philadelphia All-Star games before reporting to Giants.

Star tackle on Georgetown's 1938 and 1939 unbeaten elevens. Record-breaking world's champion shot-putter. Competed in 55 track events in college, never losing a decision. 1942 Intercollegiate, National Indoor and Outdoor AAU champion. Home—Jersey City.

GIANTS HOLD MASTER EDGE

IN SERIES WITH DODGERS

Today the Giants and the Dodgers meet on the gridiron for the thirtieth time in a series which was started in 1926. In spite of the fact that the New York club holds the master edge, with 434 points to 163, and 21 victories against 5, with three ties, it has been one of the most thrilling and robust relationships in the National Football League.

It will be recollected that early in the season the Giants scored a 20 to 0 victory in Flatbush, over a Brooklyn club which hardly had got organized. Yet, even that contest was a vehement one from start to finish.

The Giants this afternoon seek three straight over the Dodgers and some measure of revenge for the four in a row which Brooklyn achieved against the New York club until Steve Owen's men gained a 10 to 0 success in the second meeting of 1942. In the first game last year Brooklyn was the victor, 17 to 7.


When the series started, the Giants got eight out of nine before they were halted in a 10 to 10 tie. The New York eleven won the first two, then was nosed out 7 to 6, and followed with six in a row before the Dodgers accomplished that 1933 deadlock.

Into this series on the gridiron has been transmitted all the intense rivalry which makes New York-Brooklyn meetings so thrilling in the National Baseball League. No matter what the Dodgers and the Giants may have done in previous appearances of any season, their own battles throw the dope book into the ash can.
