



A Quarter of a Century of Professional Football

Frankford, a community of Northeast Philadelphia, has been the birthplace of many original ideas, both in business and pleasure. It has always been a sport producing and sport loving locality.

There has been great newspaper comment in the last few years over the respective merits of professional and college football. The Yellow Jackets have represented the Northeast section for a number of years and boasted of a top notch team. They have become known from coast to coast and have been a real factor in the recent building up of professional league football.

Several other cities in our country maintain first class professional football teams, but where is a community that can go back

but where is a community that can go back twenty-five years and more and show a

football team of similar rating.

Today there is the Frankford Athletic Association owning a splendid ground and supporting a football team equal to any in the country—THE YELLOW JACKETS.

In 1899 there was a Frankford Athletic

Association with grounds at Wistar Park, what is now Oxford Ave. and Harrison St., supporting a football team without a peer at that time. Today the Yellow Jackets play the teams in the National Professional Football League, in the old days the games were hard to arrange. Penn Scrub, Princeton Scrub, the Carlisle Indians were among the contestants.

The present Association is composed of sport lovers of the community who pay ansport lovers of the community who pay annual dues to belong. The same thing was true of the other Association. The Directors work for the love of the thing, simply interested in producing clean sport for the community without financial dividends; that was precisely the story in the days past. This community not only boasts of having minimated the worst and least it was always. originated the sport and kept it up, always a leader in it, but is going to produce both teams in person. Besides the present day team of the Frankford Yellow Jackets here at the Stadium today, we also have the old timers, the original team of 1899, in their football togs.

The old picture of the team, taken on Wistar Park Field in 1899 will be retaken on the Yellow Jacket Field. This is something unique without a parallel in the annals of

MANY CITIZENS OF OUR COMMUNITY KEEP UP THEIR INTEREST IN FOOTBALL

Many communities start real activities or maintain interest in different affairs for short periods, but Frankford has always gone in for sport. Real sport, top notch stuff, indoor and outdoor, new sports and old time games, all have been, are and will be represented in and by Frankford as long as there is a Frankford.

The records of the various teams, present or past, are worthy of scanning. The home town has always held its own with the best. The present F. A. A. supports football alone but the old F. A. A. had a baseball team, a soccer team and a football team.

It is interesting to look back over the old records. Among the stockholders back in 1899 was Uncle Joe Beeson, present at every Yellow Jacket game today. Other men seen every week are J. A. Edgar ,James France, James S. McMaster, Sr., Wm. Overington, Jr. and John A. Quinn, who were officers in the old Association. Other regulars are Edwin Ford, Dr. George Hanna, George Henry, James Hearl, David T. Hart, Wm. Markley, C. E. Outterson and Frank Sidebotham.

Still others who were stockholders in the old F. A. A. are James McMaster, Jr., who is a Director in the present Association;

Joseph J. Toland, Sr., who umpired baseball games; Jesse Purnell, who played and held office; Edward S. Gilmour, who held offices in the old days; Bob Latimer, who played; Francis Moitz, who was a former Director of the present organization. William A. France, who is active at present, and Frank T. Wilson, who was an officer in the old Association and is also of the present. William H. Bratton, who played on the soccer and football teams, El Baker and Howard Galbraith, who played on the baseball teams, Bill Orrell, another baseballer, Harry Schumacker, who played football, and George C. Gilmour, who played football and was the moving spirit in the formation of the old Association can all be seen at the present Yellow Jacket contests.

The old town can hold its head up high in the matter of sport, the town backs all its teams, the residents are stickers no matter how young or how old they are

how young or how old they are.

The account of the 1899 Thanksgiving Day game with Philadelphia and Reading Y. M. C. A., taken from the Frankford Gazette, is interesting; some of those occupying boxes today had them in the old days.

those days) were present. Frankford won 28-0 ,the lineup of the home team was:-Left end, Harry Schumacker; left tackle, Frank Lippincott; left guard, William Mason; center, Philip Griffith; right guard, George Gilmour; right tackle, Charles Heard; right end, Lewis Hornberger; quarterback, Frank King; left halfback, Harry McCormick; right halfback, Robert Latimer; fullback and captain, William Riddell. There is no account of the substitutes, but the summary reads: "Touchdowns, Mc-Cormick, 2; Riddell, Latimer, Hornberger. Goals after touchdowns, Riddell 3. Referee, E. M. Wilson, Haverford College. Umpire, D. G. Gimber, P. & R. Y. M. C. A. Linesman, H. Gransback and Frank T. Wilson. Timekeeper, James Davis. Time of halves, 25 and 20 minutes."

The interesting features are halves instead of quarters, that touchdowns counted five instead of six, that field goals counted five instead of three. Another feature is that in the old days shin guards and nose guards were always used, today neither are seen.

Two official pictures of the 1899 football team were taken that year. In the picture displayed in this Program the players shown are left to right:—

1st Row—Frank King, William Riddell, Jr.

2nd Row—Lewis Hornberger, Robert Latimer, George Gilmour, Philip Griffith, William Mason, William Bratton, William Castor.

3rd Row—Harry Schumacker, Harry Mc-Cormick, Frank Lippincott.

4th Row standing—Charles Heard, Herman Sonneborne and Barter.

The managers of the team were Clarence Swope (between King and Riddell) and Edward Gilmour (between McCormick and Lippincott). The first man on front row in civilian clothes is James Davis, time-keeper.

Local football fans will feast their eyes on an awe-inspiring collection of giants when Ernie Nevers, "The world's foremost athlete," leads his husky Duluth Eskimos on the gridiron to meet the local professional eleven. Those who follow football say that the famous Leland Stanford star has one of the heaviest aggregations ever assembled on a football field. From end to end, the big boys will average much better than 200 pounds and the fleet backfield will go better than 185.

Nevers is one of the greatest drawing cards in the professional game today, and has attracted careful attention wherever he has displayed his brilliant stuff. "Pop" Warner, renowned coach who developed Nevers and the great Jim Thorpe, has pronounced Ernie the greatest football player he has ever seen. And this sweeping statement went for Red Grange and the Four Horsemen. After watching Nevers star against Notre Dame, Knute Rockne called him the greatest backfield man in gridiron history.

Nevers won 13 college letters at Stanford in three years of athletic endeavor. He starred in football, baseball, track, basketball and gymnastics. Last spring, upon graduation, he signed up with the St. Louis Browns of the American League and made a better impression on the fans than any

college pitcher that entered the Major Leagues in many seasons.

Nevers, Fitz-Gibbons, Blood and Gilbert are the "Four Polar Bears" of the outfit. All four are triple threat men of dangerous ability. In the second backfield are the "Four Cubs":—Method, Cobb Rooney, Kelley and Quam.

Showers of meteoric forward passes and trick plays of magic design will be depended upon for the most part by the Eskimos to crush the Jackets.

With only one defeat marked up against them, the powerful giants of the north still have hopes of running away with first honors this season. The only defeat they sustained was put over by George Halas' Chicago Bears, 24-6. It was the first time that the men from the Zenith City saw their goal line crossed or even seriously threatened. In all their games, the Eskies have given dazzling exhibitions of the ultra modern games with just enough old style football to vary their attack.

The style of play was originated by "Pop" Warner at Stanford, where Nevers starred for three years, and was brought East by the latter. Mixed up with the Warner creations is a series of Knute Rockne plays, where it was thoroughly learned by halfback John Blood, who served two seasons on the Irish Squad.

winner, And everyone's thoughts turned towards a


good dinner, Of all the fans present, (and the number was high),




