DANOWSKI IN PASSING FORM

Ed Danowski is rapidly approaching the forward passing form that enabled him to set a league record last season. Big Ed has thrown 60, completing 28 for a gain of 301 yards, which is almost a 50% average.

Tuffy Leemans not only is leading the Giants in ground gaining but also the league. His 118 yards against the Cardinals enabled him to pass Cliff Battles of Boston. Three Giant players, Winnie Anderson, Gene Rose and Dale Burnett have each caught six passes.

The Champs are Coming

The Detroit Lions, champions of the National Football League, make their first appearance in the Polo Grounds next Sunday. The Lions, hailed far and wide as the greatest team in the league for the past three years, bring one of the strongest backfields that has ever trod the local field.

It is the same eleven that last fall ended the Giants reign as holders of the Ed Thorp Memorial Trophy when they won the playoff game, 26 to 7, with a spurt in the closing period.

Coached by Potsy Clark, former Kansas and Butler tutor, the Lions have one of the most varied offenses in modern football. Potsy's teams at Portsmouth and now at Detroit are one of the few to hold an edge over the Giants. Since 1930 the Clark coached teams have won five while losing only three times to the Owen tutored array.

Dutch Clark, tabbed as the greatest quarterback of all time,

is again leading the Lions with able assistance from Ernie Caddel, former Stanford ace, and an all-league halfback last year. Clark was also an all-league player and led the scorers of the league, while Caddel was second in ground gaining and high in the high scoring ranks also.

Running with these two aces is Glenn Presnell, former Nebraska star, who two weeks ago completed a 65-yard pass against the Dodgers. Ace Gutowsky, hard hitting fullback; Bill Shepherd, former Western Maryland star who topped the college scorers two seasons back; and Buddy Parker

of Centenary are also dangerous ball carriers.

The Detroit Lions, National League Champions, who meet the Giants here next Sunday, are at present topping the pro gridiron race as the best defensive team of the circuit. The Lions have yielded only 668 yards to their opponents in four games and have only 27 points scored against them.

The Chicago Bears, present unbeaten pace setters in the Western Division, are sweeping all branches in offense. They have gained 1423 yards in five games and scored 107 points.

The Giants are still second to the Pittsburgh Pirates in forward passing with a mark of 30 completed in 70 tosses as against the Pirates record of 50 completed in 99 attempts. Detroit has a slightly better average with 22 good in 42 tosses but with one less game and only half as many passes attempted is not ranked above the other two elevens, but they are good enough to give the Giants plenty to worry about in the air, too.

KNOW PRO FOOTBALL.

RULES OF MAJOR LEAGUE FOOTBALL SUMMARIZED BY WILFRID SMITH

Professional football, in the past three seasons, has altered the code of rules under which colleges and universities play the game. The changes have not been numerous but they have been important.

The most important change permits forward passes to be thrown from any point behind the scrimmage line. The college rule permits forward passes from any point FIVE yards behind the scrimmage line.

In professional football the goal posts are on the goal lines.

Professional football declined to adopt the "dead ball" rule of the collegiate code.

Flying blocks and flying tackles are permitted in the professional game. The professional rule against clipping, that is, knocking down an opponent from the rear, is strictly enforced. The penalty is loss of 25 yards, as compared with the collegiate rule which penalizes infractions with the loss of 15 yards.

Professional players may be stationed any place on the field so long as they do not advance within 10 yards of the ball before it is kicked.

At the kickoff, the pros may kick from a dirt tee. Substitute players may communicate with their teammates immediately on entering the game. Coaches must be notified when the limit of three times out have been taken in a half.

When the ball carrier is run out of bounds or is tackled at any point within 15 yards of the side line, the ball will be placed in play at a corresponding point 15 yards from the side of the field.

Offside penalties on the defense within its own 10 yard line have been minimized. Instead of loss of five yards, customary rule, the penalty in this area now is half the distance to the goal.

Here are the two most important changes in the pro rules for this fall:

1. A fumbled ball, except fumbles resulting from lateral passes, may be advanced by either team, no matter whether the ball strikes the ground or not. On fumbled laterals, the rule remains the same. The offense may recover and advance; the defense only may recover unless the ball is caught in the air. Then it may be advanced. Fumbled kicks may be recovered by the kicking team. They can not be advanced unless the receiver of the kick gains possession and then fumbles when tackled.

2. The penalty for two forward passes on the same down has been changed. In the past there have been several instances where a forward pass was completed successfully and after the ball had been advanced for a long gain, an attempted lateral pass actually became a second forward pass. Under the collegiate rule the ball is brought back to the point at which it originally was put into play. The new professional rule provides for a loss of FIVE yards from the point at the second and illegal forward pass.
