It has also tended to speed up the game and results in more plays being run off during the game.

The Brooklyn Dodgers, under their new coach, Potsy Clark, are slated

to invade the Polo Grounds next Sunday and it goes without saying that this will be one of the high spots of the year for it was the Brooklyn club which kept New York from the title last fall with a 10 to 10 deadlock.

The Dodgers like the Giants have many new faces in the lineup and have also been improving with every start so that no easy time awaits the New York eleven.

PACKERS LEAD GIANTS

The Green Bay Packers, after a slow start, came back strong during the past week of play to take the lead for team offensive honors in the National Football League. The Packers, 1936 League champions, now lead the circuit in scoring with 69 points in four games, and have the best ground gaining record with 1096 yards for an average of 274 a game. The Giants, with a 269 average, are second best in the league.

Passing honors were retained by the Washington Redskins. This team has now completed 47 out of 103 aerials for 45 per cent efficiency. The New York Giants and Chicago Bears, leaders in the Eastern and Western Divisions respectively, have the best defensive records. The Giants opponents have gained only 401 yards in three games for a 133 yard average, and only two safeties have been scored against the Bears in three games.

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SCHOOLBOY CONTEST

The annual New York Giants competition for scholastic athletes will get under way next Sunday when Brooklyn and Long Island schools will send representatives. The competition this year is to be for the entire regular backfields of the competing schools.

The four competitors will run a relay each man running fifty yards and handing the ball to his teammate at the end of the sprint. The entire relay to cover the length of the gridiron and return.

KNOW PRO FOOTBALL

Complete records of all players and teams of the National Football League, the playing code and other pertinent information regarding pro football is contained in the National Football League Guide which can be obtained at all Spalding's stores and also in most other sporting goods stores.

THE NATIONAL FOOTBALL LEAGUE

Following are the major differences in rules between professional and college football games:

The goal posts are placed on the goal line.

The ball must be put in play at least 15 yards in from the sideline, being moved 15 yards in after any play that ends closer than 15 yards to the nearest sideline.

The penalty for clipping from behind is 25 yards.

The ball is NOT dead when a player slips or is thrown to the ground, the ball being in play until the whistle is blown.

Defensive linemen are allowed to use their hands on the head, face or bodies of offensive players.

Fumbles, except on punts or lateral passes, may be advanced. Punts and lateral pass fumbles may be advanced only after "possession and advance" has been established.

Substitutes may talk with teammates immediately upon entering the game,

A forward pass may be thrown from any spot behind the line of scrimmage.

On a forward pass followed by an illegal lateral pass (the second pass being forward instead of lateral or backward) the ball is put in play at a point 5 yards behind where the illegal pass was thrown.

On the kickoff the receiving team does NOT have to have five men within its 45 yard line.

The flying block and flying tackle are permitted.

Penalties within the ten-yard line are only half the distance to the goal line.
