SOAR IS SOARING

Giant fans will have their first chance today to see Hank Soar, brilliant newcomer, who has been the sensation of the first three games away from home. Soar got his chance when Tuffy Leemans hurt his ankle in the first half of the Washington game and in the past two games he has piled up 217 yards averaging better than four yards per attempt. On top of that he had runs of 20 and 60 yards nullified by penalties.

Ed Danowski is close to his three year record of having completed 49 per cent of his tosses for he has completed 18 out of 41 for 244 yards. Kink Richards with two touchdowns is top scorer with 12 points, and he had two touchdowns taken away by official decisions.

Giants Open Thirteenth Season

The New York Football Giants today welcomes back to the Polo Grounds their many old supporters and those who are just becoming acquainted with football as played in the National Football League. Coach Steve Owen is beginning his seventh season as head tutor of the Giants. It was those same Redskins, reinforced by Sammy Baugh, who handed the Giants their lone defeat of the season, but the Giants outgained Ray Flaherty's charges and have been improving with every start.

There are many newcomers in Giant uniforms this fall. In fact only ten of the twenty-five men in uniform today were on the squad last fall and it has taken these rookies some time to settle down. In fact they are still improving and will need the experience to be gained this season to reach the stage of excellence Coach Owen predicts for them in the not so distant future.

Not only will you see many new players but the offense is vastly altered. Giants operate from a shift this season and the result has been that the Giants now have the best offensive record in the league. It has also tended to speed up the game and results in more plays being run off during the game.

The Brooklyn Dodgers, under their new coach, Potsy Clark, are slated to invade the Polo Grounds next Sunday and it goes without saying that this will be one of the high spots of the year for it was the Brooklyn club which kept New York from the title last fall with a 10 to 10 deadlock.

The Dodgers like the Giants have many new faces in the lineup and have also been improving with every start so that no easy time awaits the New York eleven.

One of the largest crowds of the season is expected for this game so if you want to be sure of good seats secure yours early from the office of the New York Giants, 11 West 42nd Street. The prices are the same as last year—\$2.20 for a reserved seat and the only way you can secure your reserved seat is to purchase it in advance. The sale opens tomorrow morning. PACKERS LEAD GIANTS

The Green Bay Packers, after a slow start, came back strong during the past week of play to take the lead for team offensive honors in the National Football League. The Packers, 1936 League champions, now lead the circuit in scoring with 69 points in four games, and have the best ground gaining record with 1096 yards for an average of 274 a game. The Giants, with a 269 average, are second best in the league.

Passing honors were retained by the Washington Redskins. This team has now completed 47 out of 103 aeriels for 45 per cent efficiency. The New York Giants and Chicago Bears, leaders in the Eastern and Western Divisions respectively, have the best defensive records. The Giants opponents have gained only 401 yards in three games for a 133 yard average, and only two safeties have been scored against the Bears in three games.

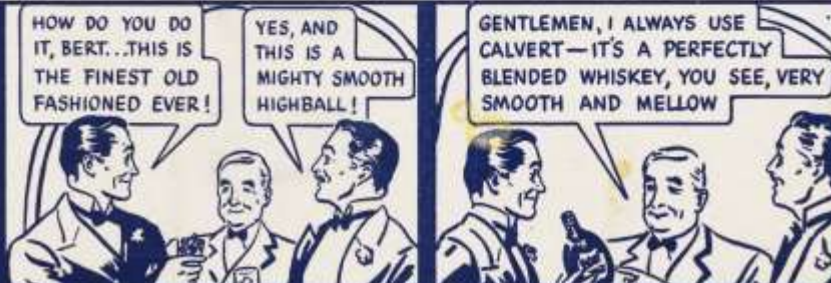

The annual New York Giants competition for scholastic athletes will get under way next Sunday when Brooklyn and Long Island schools will send representatives. The competition this year is to be for the entire regular backfields of the competing schools.

The four competitors will run a relay each man running fifty yards and handing the ball to his teammate at the end of the sprint. The entire relay to cover the length of the gridiron and return.



KNOW PRO FOOTBALL

Complete records of all players and teams of the National Football League, the playing code and other pertinent information regarding pro football is contained in the National Football League Guide which can be obtained at all Spalding's stores and also in most other sporting goods stores.

THE NATIONAL FOOTBALL LEAGUE

Following are the major differences in rules between professional and college football games:

The goal posts are placed on the goal line.

The ball must be put in play at least 15 yards in from the sideline, being moved 15 yards in after any play that ends closer than 15 yards to the nearest sideline.

The penalty for clipping from behind is 25 yards.

The ball is NOT dead when a player slips or is thrown to the ground, the ball being in play until the whistle is blown.

Defensive linemen are allowed to use their hands on the head, face or bodies of offensive players.

Fumbles, except on punts or lateral passes, may be advanced. Punts and lateral pass fumbles may be advanced only after "possession and advance" has been established.

Substitutes may talk with teammates immediately upon entering the game.

A forward pass may be thrown from any spot behind the line of scrimmage.

On a forward pass followed by an illegal lateral pass (the second pass being forward instead of lateral or backward) the ball is put in play at a point 5 yards behind where the illegal pass was thrown.

On the kickoff the receiving team does NOT have to have five men within its 45 yard line.

The flying block and flying tackle are permitted.

Penalties within the ten-yard line are only half the distance to the goal line.
