WATCH OUT FOR THE DODGERS

The New York Giants hopes of gaining the playoff for the Eastern Division title face a new obstacle this season. The Brooklyn Dodgers, now perched on top of the race for the sectional title, are all set to break the Giants' long streak of supremacy in interborough gridiron rivalry.

Potsy Clark has a young team made up mainly of hustling recruits and his offense is built around Ace Parker, who with each game develops increasing stature as the outstanding all-around back of the National League. The Dodgers have been further strengthened for the title chase by the acquisition of Scrapper Farrell, who ripped the Giant line to shreds when the Pirates played here last week.

With Farrell giving Brooklyn a constant threat in the center of the line and Parker to run off the tackles, pass and kick it looks as if Steve Owen's huskies are in for a busy day next Sunday.

The contest looms as an even test. If you remember it was last Thanksgiving Day that a Dodger team not up to the current one in ability battled New York to a 13-13 deadlock. It has been a long time since Brooklyn won in football from the Giants and that will make the Dodgers all the tougher to beat.

Jack McBride turned the trick back in 1930, the only time the Dodgers did beat the Giants and perhaps another former Giant—Tony Sarausky, will be the one to do it again.

Watch out you Giants. For the Dodgers and Potsy Clark want victory next Sunday over any on the schedule. And in that frame of mind Brooklyn will be tough to overcome.

The Brooklyn contest next Sunday is the last home game for two weeks. The Giants after meeting Brooklyn will be called upon to face the Chicago Cardinals in the Polo Grounds, Sunday, November 6. Tickets for the Brooklyn game will be placed on sale TUESDAY morning in the Football Giants office, 11 West 42nd Street, Room 1740. Remember if you desire the same seat for every Giant home game you can make a season reservation and it will be held for you without extra charge.

CUFF NEARS TOP

Byron "Whizzer" White, Rhodes Scholar All-America from Colorado U. now playing for the Pittsburgh Pirates, is the leading ground gainer of the National Football League. Ward Cuff, New York Giants ace, has jumped from sixth to a tie for third in scoring, and Don Hutson, Green Bay Packers end, rose from fourth to second in pass receiving.

"Whizzer" White has gained 216 yards. "Scraper" Farrell, Pittsburgh Pirates ace traded to Brooklyn, is third with 176 yards, nine yards ahead of Boyd Brumbaugh, Brooklyn Dodgers receiver.

A two-way tie still exists for scoring honors between Joe Carter, Philadelphia end, and Hutson, each with 24 points. Cuff joined Clarke Hinkle, Green Bay, in a tie for third with 20 points. Andy Farkas, Washington, is close behind with 19. Cuff and Ralph Kercheval, Brooklyn, each kicked another field goal continuing their fight for laurels in this department. Each now has three successful placements, while Bill Reissig, Brooklyn, and Hinkle have kicked two.

Ed Danowski, New York Giants forward passer, further entrenched himself in first place for aerial honors, with the most completions and most yards gained. He now has completed 36 out of 61 for 438 yards and 59% efficiency. By continuing his present pace, Danowski would set a new National League record for completions, shading the 81 successful tosses made by Sammy Baugh last year.

Corby Davis, Cleveland; Arnie Herber, Green Bay; Ralph Kercheval, Brooklyn; Edgar Manske, Pittsburgh, and Leland Shaffer, New York, each scored two touchdowns for 12 points.

NEW SCORING MARKS

The phenomenal surge of the Washington Redskins, which gave them the best averages in all offensive departments of play for the third consecutive week, has been instrumental in elevating National Football League marks in scoring and passing above the record-breaking standards of a year ago.

This was revealed by team statistics for the fifth week of play, which shows Washington headed for new records in forward passing, scoring and ground gaining. The National League champion has completed 42 out of 78 passes for 53% efficiency, gained an average of 304 yards per game in four games, and tallied 86 points.

The New York Giants have a 50% average in passing, with the Chicago Cardinals and Green Bay Packers close behind with 48% and 47%. The entire league average is 42% or four per cent better than in 1937 when a record was established.

The figures also reveal that National League scoring is 3 points a game better than in 1937 when a new mark was also established in this department. Green Bay has scored 85 points, only one less than Washington, while Cleveland has 71 and Philadelphia 70. There were only two shutout games in 22 played this season as compared with five in 20 games in 1937 at this date.

New York is second in ground gaining with a 241-yard average and Green Bay is third with a 237-yard average, four better than Detroit. The Chicago Bears lead on defense, having held opponents to a mere 114 yards and 6.6 points per game.

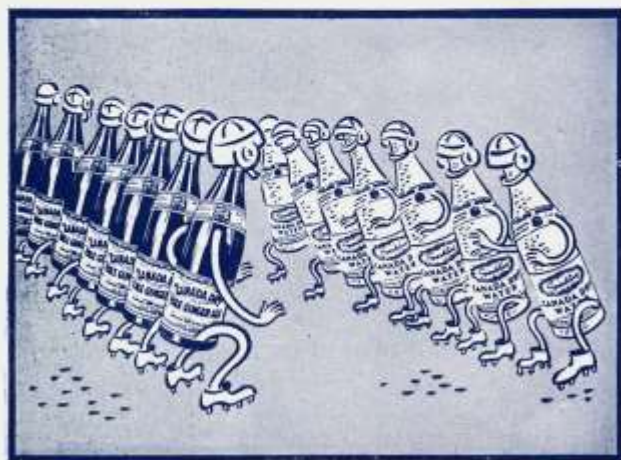

PRO RULES

There are differences in rules for games played in the National Football League and under intercollegiate rules. We would like to call your attention to these major differences:

1. The goal posts are on the goal line (not ten yards back).
2. Forward passes are permitted from any point to the line of scrimmage (not thrown from five yards behind line).
3. The penalty for a forward pass thrown beyond the line of scrimmage is loss of down and five yards from the spot such pass is made.
4. A forward pass on fourth down is not a touchback if it goes over the goal line providing the pass originated outside the 20-yard line. In other words if the pass was thrown from the 25-yard line on fourth down it reverts to the defending team at that point.
5. On a kickoff the receiving team is not required to have five players within five yards of the restraining line. Kickers are permitted to use tees in making kickoffs.
6. The penalty for clipping is 25 yards (not 15).
7. The ball is not dead when the runner touches the ground unless definitely in the grasp of an opponent and all forward progress stopped.
8. Substitutes may talk to teammates immediately on entering game.
9. Any two players of either team may re-enter the game once in the fourth quarter.
10. When a penalty is inflicted inside the 10-yard line it shall be only half the distance to the goal line.

Tuffy Leemans continues to trail Hank Soar as the leading ground gainer of the squad. Soar has a 23-yard edge in ball carrying. There is no question of Ed Danowski being the best passer, but Leland Shaffer is only one catch behind Soar as the leading pass snatcher.

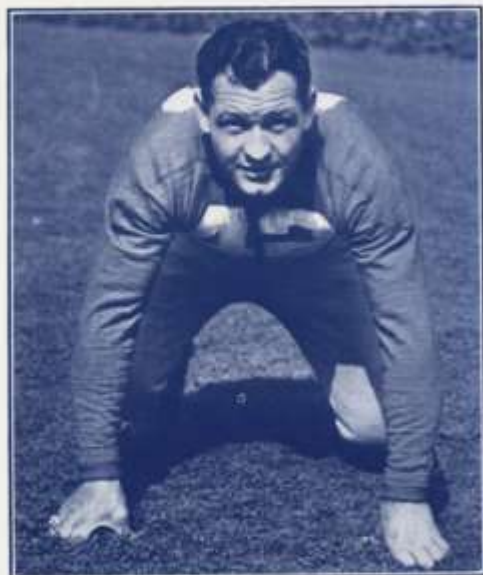

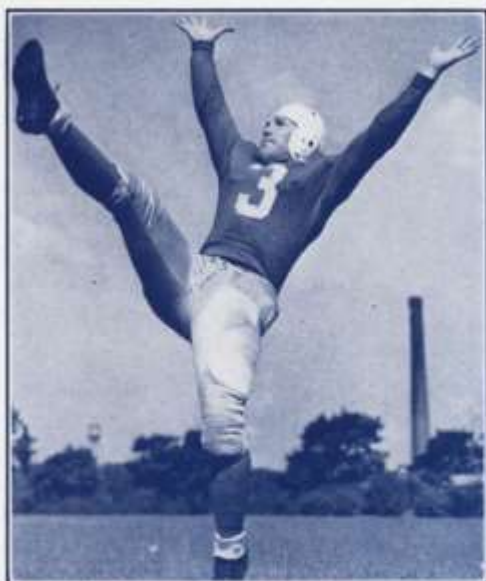

The New York Football Giants have established an annual trophy to be known as the Leonard Grant Memorial to be won outright by a schoolboy football player of the metropolitan area each year.

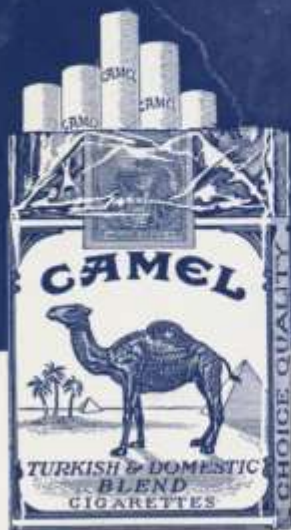
