



THE FIFTEENTH SEASON

The New York Football Giants, current champions of the National Football League, today inaugurate the fifteenth season of professional football in the Polo Grounds. For the first time the Giants open their home campaign minus a defeat, but the task of defending the laurels won last fall is an imposing one.

Steve Owen, coach of the Giants, is starting his ninth season as local tutor and the task confronting him is the hardest he has yet faced. No team has retained its title since the league was split into an Eastern and Western division.

The competition is tougher for all the clubs in the league have improved. The Giants have practically the same squad that won the title only three rookies making their debut in today's contest. Eddie Miller, 164 pound back from New Mexico; Al Owen from Leonia, N. J., who went to Mercer College; and Doug Oldershaw, guard from Santa Barbara, were the three newcomers to win a place on the squad. All three have definitely proven their worth in three road tests.

The Giants face five more tests in the Polo Grounds, a game with the Dodgers at Ebbets Field and a critical trip to Detroit to oppose the Lions, who are currently half a game ahead of the sensational Chicago Bears. The Bears invade the Polo Grounds next Sunday and there is no question the Giants will have their hands full then, for the Chicago eleven has been rolling up tremendous scores and showing record breaking speed and power gaining on the ground and in the air.

Such powerful newcomers as Sid Luckman of Columbia, Bill Osmanski of Holy Cross, Bob McLeod of Dartmouth, Billy Patterson of Baylor, added to a backfield that already boasted such stars as Joe Maniaci of Fordham, Bernie Masterson, and Jack Manders operating behind the biggest forward wall of the circuit makes the Bear invasion next week a crucial one for our Giants.

BEARS SHOW THE WAY

The Chicago Bears are showing the way with one of the strongest attacks ever soon in the major leagues. All existing National Football League offensive records are in jeopardy according to team statistics for the fourth week of play. League forward passing and soring, and team forward passing, sooring and ground gaining averages are far should of all present records in these departments.

The Bears have an average of 358 yards and have tailled 413 points for an average of 28 a gaine, which is 67 yards and 8 points higher than present league records. Scoring for the entire league is two points a game higher in nineteen games than the record high established has season.

PRO RULES

There are differences in rules for games played in the National Football League and under intercollegiate rules. We would like to call your attention to these major differences:

- The goal posts are on the goal line (not ten yards back).
- Forward passes are permitted from any point to the line of scrimmage (not thrown from five yards behind line).
- The penalty for a forward pass thrown beyond the line of scrimmage is loss of down and five yards from the spot such pass is made.
- 4. A forward pass on fourth down is not a touchback if it goes over the goal line providing the pass originated outside the 20-yard line. In other words if the pass was thrown from the 25-yard line on fourth down it reverts to the defending team at that point.
- On a kickoff the receiving team is not required to have five players within five yards

of the restraining line. Kickers are permitted to use tees in making kickeffs.


- The penalty for clipping is 25 yards (not 15).
- The ball is not dead when the runner touches the ground unless definitely in the grasp of an opponent and all forward progress stopped.
- Substitutes may talk to teammates immediately on entering game.
- Any two players of either team may reenter the game once in the fourth quarter.
- When a penalty is inflicted inside the 10-yard line it shall be only half the distance to the goal line.
- A fumbled ball which strikes the ground may be advanced by an opponent when he recovers it.
- On out of bounds kickoffs the ball is put in play on the 45-yard line (not the 35-yard line).


