
BILL PASCHAL—Champion Ball Carrier Leads Giants' Attack
The New York Giants' 1944 offense is spearheaded by
Bill Paschal, the National League's leading ground gainer.
With only three minutes of college competition at Georgia
Tech, Paschal, green but willing rookie, joined the New
York Club last season. The blond 23-year Georgian quickly
adjusted himself to new surroundings and raced through
all opposition to the league's ball carrying title, 572 yardsin 147 rushes.



ARNIE HERBER—Now Pitching for Giants
Arnie Herber, who pitched to Don Hutson to form the gridiron's All-time No. 1 battery, now heads the Giants' aerial attack. The stocky 33-year wizard still operates with much of the power and skill that enabled him to score many torward passing records during the 11 years he made history with the Green Bay Packers. Herber stopped in 1941 to devote all his time to business in Wisconsin.



KEN STRONG—Now Kicking for Giants
The New York Giants' latest kicking specialist is Ken
Strong, who still boots 'em over from mid-field. One of the
game's greatest all-time stars, Strong helped restore the
foot in football in twelve years of pro competition, as he
punted and scored field goals with remarkable success.
The 37-year veteran culminated his sensational New York
U, career with 162 points in his senior year, more than
anyone ever tallied in the sport's long history.



FRANK LIEBEL—Giants' Star Pass-Catching End
Honorably discharged from the Marines in 1942, Liebel
signed with the Giants last season and soon attracted
attention with his fast end play and pass-receiving ability.
The former Norwich U. star showed great improvement this
season. His clever catch of Nix's long pass and brilliant
run for the touchdown was one of the vital plays in the
Giants' 31-4 victory over the Redskins that deadlocked the
Eastern championship.

# Howard Livingston Latest Sensational Owen Product

Livingston came to the Giants with only one year of Junior college experience in California. He had been discharged by the Navy. Standing 6 feet 1 in height, and tipping the beam at 192 pounds, Livingston presented the physical material. Now Owen is moulding it into a fine back.

It won't be long before Howard Livingston shows up as the tailback of the Giants—the most vital cog in the offensive machine.

Livingston is the snaky hips type of runner. He can kick, he can pass. As yet, a trifle green. As yet, not so familiar with professional football practice, and the National League picture.

But keep an eye on this lad from California. He just can't miss. He can run 100 yards under 10 seconds. He has a high competitive spirit. Another spectacular figure in the long line of great backs developed by Stout Steve.

# Brilliant Veterans Still Carry On for New York Eleven

THERE are some dazzling newcomers among the New York Giants. There are quite a few green hands who, under the expert tute-lage of Steve Owen, Tuffy Leemans, Red Smith and Leland Shaffer, have grown into fine players just within the space of the few games played by the 1944 outfit.

But there are also some standbys—veterans who maintain the high quality of Giant play, who furnish the stabilizers in the clutches. It is possible that many fans take these heroes of many campaigns of hard play for granted.

There are, too, thousands of new professional football patrons who may not be familiar with the histories and backgrounds of some of these New York standbys. Here is some dope on a few of them:

#### MEL HEIN-Center.

Washington State, 1929-31. Fourteenth season with Giants. Mel is 35 years old, stands six feet four inches and weighs 232 pounds. All-America center in college. Joined Giants in 1931. Ranked second best center in National League that season. League's No. 1 pivot following eight years, a record far beyond reach of all other league players. Performed in 125 championship games without missing one. Also participated in many All-Star and exhibition contests. Only needed time-out in two games. One of the most remarkable iron-man achievements in sports. Giant team captain. Signed to coach Union College football in 1943. Off-season occupation—aeroplane factory. Birthplace—Redding, Cal. Home—New York.

#### HANK SOAR—Halfback

Providence, 1935-37. Eighth season with Giants. Hank is 29 years old, stands six feet and weighs 218 pounds. One season with Boston Shamrocks. Fine runner and pass defender. Took pass to give Giants title win over Green Bay in 1938. Led Giant ground-gainers in 1937. Off-season occupation—millwright and baseball umpire. Birthplace and home—Alton, R. I. Married.

#### FRANK LIEBEL-End

Norwich U., 1940-42. Third season with Giants. Frank is 25 years old, stands six feet one inch and weighs 202 pounds. Outstanding in football and basketball in college. Birthplace and home—Erie, Pa.

#### FRANK COPE—Tackle

Santa Clara, 1935-37. Seventh season with Giants. Frank is 28 years old, stands six feet three inches and weighs 232 pounds. Football captain in college. Became first-string Giant tackle in 1939. Birthplace and home—Hayward, California.

#### WARD CUFF-Halfback

Marquette, 1935-37. Eighth season with Giants. Cuff is 30 years old, stands six feet one inch and weighs 198 pounds. All-time Giants high-scorer with 205 points. Two years National League field-goal kicking champion, although he never kicked in college. Each season has been one of the leading backs in the pro circuit. Offseason occupation—coaching at Marquette. Birthplace—Redwood Falls, Minn. Home—Milwaukee, Wis.

#### O'NEALL ADAMS-End

Arkansas University, 1940-42. Third season with Giants. Adams is 25 years old, stands six feet three inches and weighs 195 pounds. Football, basketball and track in college. Off-season occupation—Rancher. Birthplace and home—Beebe, Ark. Single.

#### CHARLES AVEDISIAN—Guard

Providence U., 1939-41. Third season with Giants. Charlie is 27 years old, stands five feet nine inches and weighs 195 pounds. Played in American Association. Off-season occupation—physical culture education. Birthplace—Hoboken, N. J. Home—Pawtucket, Rhode Island.

The editor of this programme has dug out of the past the first five all-league teams picked officially, starting in 1931. How many of these stars did you see play? How many can you recall?



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# Philadelphia Victorious Against Giants In Only Four Games

THE National League series between New York and Philadelphia goes back to 1933. In eleven years, the two clubs have met 22 times, home and home each Fall. Only four times have the Eagles been able to take the measure of Steve Owen's men. That is a truly remarkable record.

Greasy Neale's outfit beat the Giants in Philadelphia last year 28 to 14, but when the Eagles showed up on the banks of the Harlem they were mauled by 42 to 14.

Philadelphia took its first game from New York in 1934, 6 to 0, after the Giants had made it three straight against that eleven.

In 1936, Philadelphia won again, 10 to 7, and in 1938, it scored its third triumph over the Polo Grounders, 14 to 10.

Neale's coaching system is founded on the T formation. However, he has a lot of his own private variations. Greasy always has been an adapter and offensive football innovator. His defensive tactics have not been famous because he holds to the old military idea that the finest defense is a powerful attack.

The Eagles landed here fresh from their 38 to 0 rout of the Boston team, in which Roy

Zimmerman, Greasy's brilliant back, had another grand day. Among his achievements was a 49 yard field goal from placement. Here is the record of the New York-Philadelphia series through the years:
