New York's First Eleven in the National Football League

NEW YORK, now the football center of the country, formally makes its debut in the National Football League, whose championship games throughout the Middle West are marked by the same intercity rivalry and enthusiasm that features the annual baseball races in the two big leagues.

The National Football League in no way conflicts with college football, which is one of the finest of all sports.

The National League rigidly enforces its rule that no team can play a college player while in college nor can a college player be used under an assumed name. The object of the National League, which now has twenty-two teams in twenty-one cities as far West as Kansas City, is to provide spectacular entertainment for the rapidly growing number of football enthusiasts and to afford an opportunity for numerous worthy young men to earn extra income which will enable them to gain a better start in their professions.


The New York Giants' management regards itself fortunate in the engagement of Bob Folwell as coach of the first league team to represent this city. Folwell has been prominently identified with football for over twenty years—first as star player and captain at the University of Pennsylvania and as winning coach at Lafayette, Washington and Jefferson, University of Pennsylvania and the United States Naval Academy.

The veteran coach quickly set about to assemble one of the most remarkable teams in the game's history. With seven former All-Americans in its lineup the Giants promise to be a strong contender for the league championship although all its opponents have been especially reinforced to meet the new rival from New York.

Any one of the Giants' stars would "make" the average strong eleven. But Coach Folwell has on the New York team some of the greatest stars of all time—Jim Thorpe, famous Indian who is flashing old-time brilliancy; "Century" Milstead, one of Yale's greatest tackles; Bob Nash, former All-American at Rutgers who captains the Giants; Lynn Bomar, the best end the South developed, who came here especially to help New York win its first football championship; Arthur Carney, a graduate of the local public schools who captained the Navy eleven in 1923 and earned All-American honors at guard the same season; Ed McGinley, who was All-American tackle at Pennsylvania last season; Joe Alexander, whose center play at Syracuse is still a model for players throughout the country and numerous other stars like Jack McBride, whose three field goals won for Syracuse against Columbia last year.


Coach Folwell has moulded all these players into a smooth running machine after many practice drills at the Polo Grounds—a task that was made easier because each player is keen to bring a championship team to New York as well as continuing the personal thrill and enjoyment of playing the game.

The Giants will play all home games at the Polo Grounds.




"CENTURY" MILSTEAD





What a Famous Coach Says About the New York Giants

By ROBERT FOLWELL (Former Navy and Penn Coach)

EVERY one of the twenty-two Giants is a post-graduate of football. Each member of the squad has demonstrated his mental and physical qualifications. Seven of our players were rewarded with All-American honors.

My task as the coach has been to co-ordinate all this wonderful talent into an efficient machine as no eleven can be consistently successful without high-class team work.

Long practice drills have been held daily at the Polo Grounds and it has been gratifying to me to see the spirit of co-operation and enthusiasm on the part of each player. We are all agreed that results must count first in the winning of regular positions on the team and former reputations will not aid any member of the Gaints squad unless he is prepared to make it good on the actual playing field.

National League championship games are some of the most thrilling I have ever seen. Not only is each position expertly played but the entire progress of the encounter is marked by intense rivalry.

Last year Cleveland, with an unusually powerful and versatile team, won the league title. The Giants should be a strong contender for the championship although we anticipate exceptional opposition from each team.

The standard of football played in the National League this season will be a revelation to football fans.

It will only be necessary to see the New York Giants in action against any league opponent once to be convinced that football is reaching a higher plane of development.



1976 GIANTS STADIUM

Today, October 10, 1976 marks the opening of Giants Stadium. This date will take its place next to the two other Sundays in October which have marked 1973, the Giants had earned six more Eastern Championships. the beginnings of new eras in the team's history.

On October 18, 1925 the late Tim Mara, founder of the National Football League in New York, led his team into the Polo Grounds against the Frankford Yellow Jackets and the Giants went on to play at the old ball park for the next thirty years. During those years the Giants won three World Championships, 1927, 1934,1938, and were eight times Eastern Champions.

October 21, 1956 the Giants opened their first season at Yankee Stadium against the Pittsburgh Steelers. They went on to win the World Championship

that year and before the final gun closed the "Stadium Era", on September 23,

Entering Giants Stadium in their 52nd season, the Giants have played for the World Championship fourteen times, a record unequalled by any other team in the NFL.

To comemmorate the opening of Giants Stadium, the Giants have prepared this souvenir gift-pack for all the fans attending today's game with the Dallas Cowboys. In addition to the Stadium picture, the pack contains an opening day bumper sticker and an exact reproduction of the original game program from the first home game ever played by the Giants.
