The National Football League Our Pledge

The National Football League assembled in Annual meeting at Detroit, Michigan, the 6th day of February, 1926, places itself on record as unalterably opposed to any encroachment upon college football, and hereby pledges its hearty support to college authorities in maintaining and advancing the interest in college football and in preserving the amateur standing of all college athletes.

We believe there is a public demand for professional football as has been clearly demonstrated by the wide interest manifested and, to the end that this League may not jeopardize the amateur standing of any college player, it is the unanimous decision of this meeting that every member of the National Football League be positively prohibited from inducing or attempting to induce any college player to engage in professional football until his class at college shall have graduated, and any member violating this rule shall be fined not less than One Thousand Dollars, or loss of its franchise or both.



6000 SWELTERING FANS WITNESS STUBBORN BATTLE.
MORAN SCORES FOR JACKETS

With "Old Sol" as referee, and General Humidity as umpire, Frankford and Akron opened the 1926 grid season in Frankford, deadlocked at 6-6. The day was more suitable for a swimming meet and those loyal fans who have wished for football in summer had their fill last Saturday.

The first quarter was thrill-less with the exception of a 26-yard sprint by Moran around Akron's right end, ending when Pollard, Akron's safety man, brought him to earth.

In the second period both teams scored 6 points. Akron scored first on a forward pass from Pollard to MacComk, who dodged his way 30 yards to the goal line. Rohleder's attempt for the extra point was blocked.

The Jackets immediately retaliated. Terrific line plunges by Stockton and a forward pass, Smythe to Hap Moran, placed the pigskin on the 2-yard line, where, in the second play, Moran took it over.

Budd failed to kick the goal that would have given Frankford a 1-point lead.

Opening another aerial attack with Chamberlin on the receiving end, the home eleven took the ball to the 8-yard line as the half ended.

Akron was completely outplayed in the second half, determination saving the Westerners from defeat. They failed to register a first down in the last two periods while Frankford added three to its total.

Both teams, in the half, had a chance for a goal from the field, Rohleder's placement kick from the 48-yard marker falling short and Tex Hamer's attempt from the 22-yard line proved a failure.

Frankford's forwards proved a venerable stone wall for Pollard's clan.

Aside from Paddy Driscoll, the Chicago Bears have seven new faces in their squad. The additions include Lyman, a pro veteran and the following half-dozen ex-collegians: Evans, Tyler, Buckler, Senn, Lemon and Rannes.

Brick Mueller heads the Los Angeles Collegians who made their bow in Joe Carr's circuit this season. Mueller has rounded up a club composed of the best players to be found along the Pacific coast.

Three members of Michigan's great 1925 eleven, Gregory, Grubbe and Edwards, made their pro league debut this season with Detroit. Edwards is the tackle that the "other loop" was claiming had signed with Grange's club.

The buildings are sheet rock half way up with screen and canvass tops and board floors. Each one has running water and electric lights, plenty of blankets and linen were furnished and every man had a separ-

ate bed, two to a cottage.

Mr. Esibill and Mr. Carey of the company were in personal charge, their chef kept the fellows well fed and Jimmie Mullaney, the caretaker, was everywhere, running errands, working the victrola, dancing and handing out a line of fun pretty hard to beat.

Alf Davis, a promising local boy, practiced with the team at the Golf Club every afternoon and Bob Latimer, of the old Frankford Athletic Association of twenty years ago, was out one afternoon.

The members of the team will always remember Wildwood as everything possible was done for their comfort. The golf club gave the use of their grounds for practice, the Dayton Hotel turned a bus over to them as conveyance to and fro every day. The Board of Trade tendered a dinner to the boys at the club, various dealers donated gas and repairs to autos and a crowd was always on hand to watch the daily practice. There are many Yellow Jacket fans in Wildwood, some are regular attendants at the games and more are planning to come up each week this year.




