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
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
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No. 11. ERNIE NEVERS

Played one year with the high school on the coast in 1921, entered Stanford U. 1922, and played on the Varsity team 1923-24 and 1925. With Eskimos 1926-27. 1928, helped coach Stanford, with "Pop" Warner. 1929, coached and played with Cardinals. Leading scorer of the National League in 1929 and considered by the leading coaches of the country as the "All-time" American Fullback. 26 years old and married.

No. 12. CHAS. "Chuck" KASSEL

6 ft. tall, 190 lbs., 25 years old, married, right end. Graduate of Proviso Township High School and Univ. of Illinois, where he played Varsity football for three years, Capt. of team in 1927. Chosen as "All-American" end in 1924 and 1925. With Phil. Yellowjackets in 1928 and Chicago Cardinals, 1929. Holds 5 major letters from the Univ. of Illinois. Considered one of the best ends in the National Pro League.



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
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No. 21. JESS TINSLEY


No. 16. MICKEY ERICKSON

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
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


No. 19. JAKE CRAWFORD WILLIAMS


No. 24. ROY "Bullet" BAKER

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
No. 30. WM. A. BOYD, JR.


No. 28. MACK FLENNIKEN

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
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
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
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


No. 15. HERBERT BLUMER
