

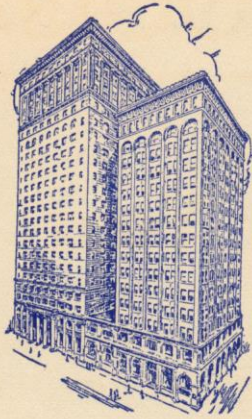

Preparing for Next Year

MR. STAGE MANAGER, ring down the curtain on the National League Professional Football season. Today the last game of the year is played, and what a climax!

The New York Giants, champions of the Eastern Division, are the final attraction, presenting the outstanding college player of 1932, Harry Newman, Michigan's All-American quarterback. Regardless of the outcome of today's fuss, the Giants will tackle the Chicago Bears next Sunday in a play-off game to determine the championship of the league.

An effort was made by the local management to play the Boston Redskins here next Sunday, but the Boston club refused the game. In other words, the local fans must wait until next year before they can see the Redskins in action.

While the season is ended, it doesn't mean the work of the Eagles' management is concluded. It is only beginning. Already plans are being formulated to assemble a greater club for next season. No stones will be left unturned in an effort to give Philadelphia the winning team it deserves.

Already, Bert Bell, Lud Wray and Jack Potter have succeeded in making a deal that will prove highly beneficial to the Eagles next season. The club parted with a goodly sum of ready cash in order to secure the services of Jim MacMurdo and Dale Waters, a husky pair of tackles, from the Boston club.

MacMurdo was an All-American at Pittsburgh only a few years ago, and Waters, had he played with an outstanding team, would most certainly have been selected as MacMurdo's running mate. Waters carried on for dear old Florida, where oranges get more recognition than football players. Still, that doesn't mean Waters wasn't All-American calibre. He weighs 215 pounds and is extremely fast. MacMurdo weighs 220 pounds.

The Eagles are to be congratulated for making this deal. It cost a considerable sum of money, but proves the management is willing to expend cash in order to mold a winner.

Only the other day the Eagles sent offers to the Green Bay Packers and Portsmouth Spartans for two outstanding backs. From the Packers the Philadelphia team wants Clark Hinkle, Bucknell hero of yesteryear. Hinkle gave one of the greatest exhibitions of football ever seen here last Sunday.

The other back desired is Glenn Presnell, quarterback of the Spartans, rated the best all-around back in the circuit. With Presnell and Hinkle teamed with Swede Hanson and possibly Jack (Ripper) Roberts, the Eagles would have one of the most sensational backfield combinations ever put together; one that would surpass the famous Four Horsemen of Notre Dame.

Of course, it isn't easy to get players like Hinkle and Presnell. After all, they are valuable to their clubs and other teams in the circuit would be willing to bid for their services. However, the Eagles feel if these players can be bought the Philadelphia bid will surpass that of any other club.

Coach Lud Wray will leave shortly for the Pacific Coast, where he will make several stops in order to sign players for next season. Wray is certain to pick up three or four of the best linemen in the West. He will also see the Rose Bowl game between Stanford and Columbia and will make efforts to sign the best men in that game.

It's been a very successful season for the Eagles. Philadelphia has seen whirlwind football, but it is only a sample of what can be expected in future seasons. The Eagles deserve your support. Don't forget them next year.
