## Jackets Today Seek to Avenge Early Season Defeat by Giants at New York

*Local Team in Excellent Shape. Friedman and Cagle with Visitors*

Beat the Giants!

That's the slogan of followers of the Frankford football eleven as the season closes this afternoon.

It looked for a time as if the final game of the season here would decide the championship of the National League, but that defeat of the Giants last Sunday by the Brooklyn Dodgers put them completely out of the running.

One happy man was Jack McBride. It was late in the fourth period that the former Giant scored the touchdown that tied the score at 6 to 6. Then he threw off his headgear, stepped back and kicked the extra point that may have robbed the Giants of a championship.

Frankford fans hope that some Jacket steps back today and kicks the point that beats those New Yorkers. The Gothamites have with them for the first time in this city Chris "Red" Cagle, former Army star. He is listed in the Giants' starting line-up along with Benny Friedman.

The latter regarded as the greatest forward passer of all time hopes to repeat the success he scored against the Jackets earlier in the season in New York, Herb Joesting, Mally Nydahl and the rest of the Jackets are out to close the home season in a blaze of glory.

New York is coached by L. S. Andrew who has been associated with Cleveland and a number of the other Giant players for many

years. Friedman was at Cleveland with Andrew and then they moved to Detroit and when Friedman came to New York or rather Detroit was purchased by the Giants, Andrew came along.

Look over the Giants. At Cleveland, Friedman, Sedbrooke and Feather, three of the four starting Giant backs, played together. Then they moved on to Detroit and all came to New York. They have been together for years along with Westoupal, the center, and one of the Owens.

The big noise with the New Yorkers right now is Cagle and the former Army star certainly has an interesting history. He has played in two games to date and admits that pro football is a tough racket, but he feels confident of making just as good a record as Friedman.

Cagle attended Merryville High School, Merryville, La., and graduated from Southwestern Louisiana Institute, Lafayette, prior to entering West Point. At the institute he was on the pro football, baseball, basketball and track teams, making his letter in each sport. On the basketball team he was forward, on the baseball team a pitcher, and on the track team he ran the century and put the shot.

At West Point, beside gaining All-American honors at football, he was second in the shot.

## Green Bay Downs Jackets in Turkey Day Battle on Wind-Swept Gridiron, 25-7

### *Packers' Aerial Attack and Costly Fumbles Disastrous as Westerners Regain League Lead*

About 8,000 dyed-in-the-wool grid fans braved the icy winds on Thanksgiving Day to see Green Bay and the Jackets in their annual Thanksgiving Day grid fracas, the sixth year the Packers have been the Turkey Day attraction. And they saw a bewildering aerial attack and costly fumbles send the local eleven down to the worst defeat since the meeting of these two rivals, 25 to 7.

Frankford received the kick-off and several plays took the ball to midfield where Pharmer fumbled and Green Bay recovered. The Packers kicked over the goal line, but Pharmer, kicking into a strong wind, the ball only reached the 28-yard line. An aerial toss, Dunn to Blook, netted the first score. They failed to make the extra point.

Green Bay made its second score in the second period when Lewellen passed to Blood for another touchdown. Again they failed to score the extra point. The remainder of the period resulted in a punting duel.

Following the kick-off opening the second half, Herber, of Green Bay, fumbled on his

17-yard line and Wilson recovered for the Jackets. Pharmer and Joesting carried the ball to the 5-yard line where a pass Pharmer to Joesting netted a touchdown and Pharmer scored the extra point, making the score 12 to 7.

It looked as if Frankford could push over another touchdown and take the lead as they were more than holding their own against last year's champions. Frankford kept hammering at the Packers' goal line the remainder of the period, but in the last quarter, with the gale winds behind them, things took on a different aspect. An exchange of punts drove the Jackets back to their 7-yard line. An intercepted pass and a 30-yard run through center gave Green Bay its third touchdown, Dunn kicking the extra point.

Another intercepted pass and another aerial toss, Dunn to Herber, scored another six-pointer, but the placement kick was blocked, making it 25 to 7. The Packers intercepted another aerial following the kick-off and the ball rested on the Jackets' 8-yard line as the game ended.

## Frankford Again Downs Clifton Heights in Rainy Sunday Tilt, 19-0

*Steponovitch, Halicki and Kostos Score for Jackets*

Frankford Yellow Jackets invaded Kent Field last Sunday for the second time this year and followed up its early season victory by sending Clifton Heights reeling under three touchdowns, 19 to 0. Four thousand fans braved threatening clouds to witness these bitter rivals in action. The rain held off during the first half, but a steady downpour which started during the intermission, dampened the enthusiasm of the crowd and the players alike.

The Yellow Jackets pushed over a touchdown in each of the first three periods to clinch the verdict. Mally Nydahl was the spark in the Frankford offense in the first half. On the very first play from scrimmage he raced 55 yards on a wide end run. Nydahl climaxed the march with a zipping 15-yard pass to Steponovitch, who raced 10 yards across the final chalkmark.

The same star started the Yellow Jackets on the way to their second score with a sensational 35-yard dash around left end placing the ball on the alien 20-yard mark. Then Joesting and Halicki carried the ball on line plunges to the 5-yard mark, when the latter slipped over the goal. Halicki also added the extra point.

A 16-yard pass, Goodbread to Kostos, completed a drive from Frankford's 44-yard line in the third quarter. The Yellow Jackets threatened several times late in the game, but were repulsed by the Clifton eleven which fought grimly to the very end.

Clifton had one scoring opportunity in the second period when Wall punted from his 20-yard line and the ball touching a Frankford player, Desmond fell on it for Clifton. Wall then hurled a long forward to Rogers, on Frankford's 1-yard line. It was not completed, but the officials claimed interference and gave Clifton the ball. Four attempts to score failed, Frankford receiving the ball on the 7-yard line.

The work of Desmond at end was the outstanding feature on the Clifton eleven. The offensive playing of Homan and Goodbread was a feature of the second half playing of Frankford.

The much-vaunted aerial attack of Clifton failed to function, but much to the surprise of the fans, Frankford unleashed an aerial offensive, and beat Charlie Rogers' cohorts at their own game. Frankford has been lacking in this department all season, but showed wonderful improvement last Sunday.

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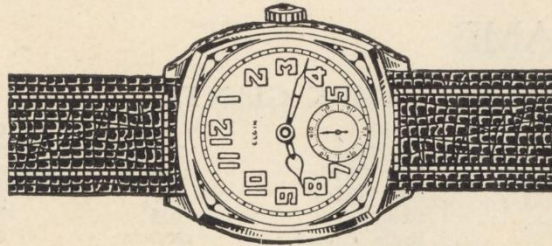
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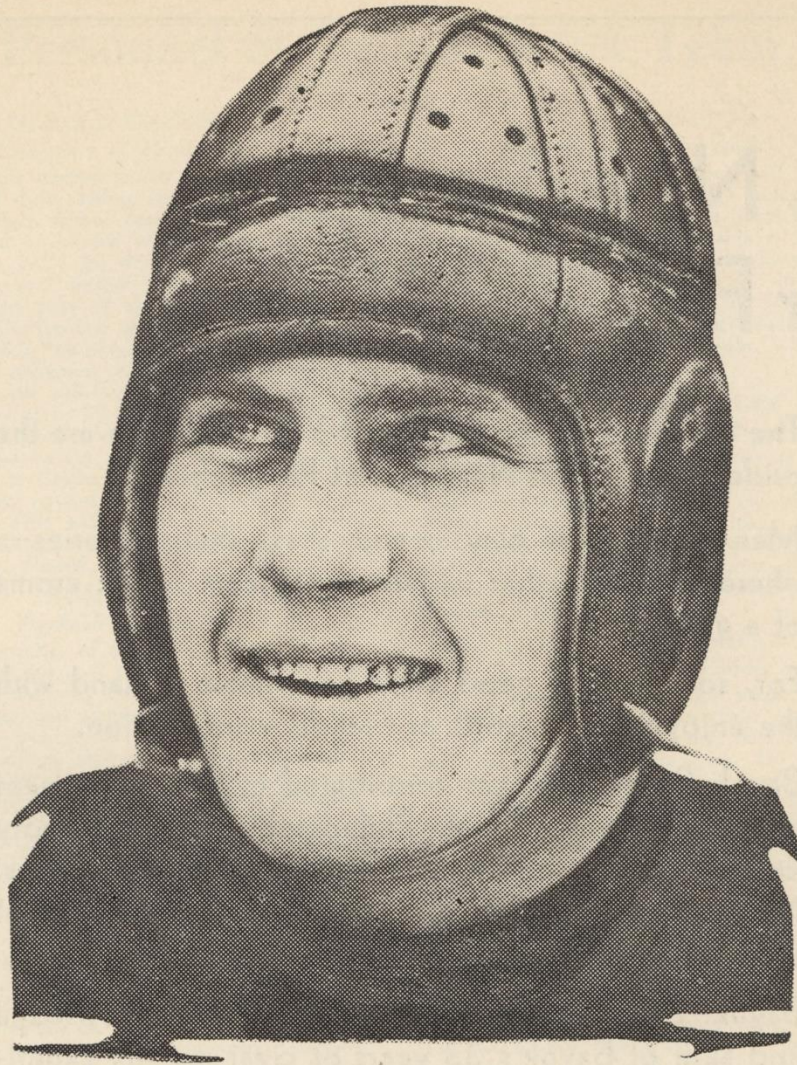

## Herb Joesting

*Famous All-American Fullback and Triple-threat Star from Minnesota  
With Yellow Jackets*

**P**ERHAPS the greatest individual player that ever has worn the Frankford colors. He is variously known as the Battering Ram, the Thunderbolt and First-Down Joesting. He is Minnesota's first candidate in football's hall of fame. Joesting in his three years of play in the Western Conference was the outstanding back in the Big Ten and was given the post of fullback in 1926 and 1927 on the first All-American teams.

Beginning his varsity football in 1925, Herb played a big part in the triumph which the Gophers scored over "Red" Grange and his Illinois playmates—the same Zuppke-coached eleven which galloped over Penn on Franklin field that year.

Joesting's star came far from reaching its zenith in his first year, but in 1926 he rose to the heights as the greatest smashing fullback. That year he ripped through opposing lines for 838 yards in eight games against such teams as Notre Dame, Wisconsin and Iowa.

"Red" Grange, the Galloping Ghost, rolled up 1,024 yards in 1925, but the Wheaton iceman made all of his yardage in open field running. "Red" never found it healthy to punt the line.

In one game in Butler in 1926, Joesting made 179 yards in 21 minutes of play while he reeled off 150 yards in 40 minutes against Michigan. During that season he carried the ball 168 times for a mean average of  $5\frac{1}{2}$  yards, but it was not ball carrying alone that earned Joesting a berth on the All-American in 1926 and 1927. The great fullback proved to be one of the most accurate long distance passers in the country.

Since he joined the ranks of the pro gridgers, Joesting has been performing in the same dashing style.

Herb is considered by many followers of college football as the greatest fullback who ever lived, not barring Coy, Hare or Heston and while you might consider the biggest thing about Joesting is his football ability you are mistaken—it is his character, an ornament to the football field and one of the finest of men.

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The traditions of the Frankford Yellow Jackets are the pride of the Great Northeast of Philadelphia.

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# Personnel of Yellow Jacket Team

## HAROLD HANSON

*University of Minnesota*

Hanson has starred in his position since his high school days, being captain of the state champion high school team of Minnesota in 1923. At the University of Minnesota in 1924, 1925, 1926, 1927, he developed into an All-American guard under Coach Doc Spears. After his first year of varsity football he was picked All-Conference guard (Big Ten Conference) and in his second year made Rockne's All-Western selection and received honorable mention on the All-American team. His outstanding playing in his senior year brought him national selection of All-American honors and he was chosen on the all-star team for the East-West game in California. Hanson also played on the varsity basketball and baseball teams at Minnesota. This will be Hanson's third year with the Yellow Jackets. Height, 6.1; Weight, 205; Position, Guard.

## TOM JONES

*Bucknell University*

Jones is another of the rugged football men developed in the coal region of Pennsylvania. This section has sent more outstanding players to the college and professional game than any other single section of the country. Jones received his college training at Bucknell under the direction of Coach Carl Snavelly, who has developed many of the stars on this and past Yellow Jacket teams. Jones is rough and his nickname "Piano Legs" describes his natural physique. Height, 5.10; Weight, 208; Position, Guard.

## TONY KOSTOS

*Bucknell University*

Kostos started as a back at Mount Carmel High School and developed into a guard at Bucknell University, playing there in 1923, 1924 and 1925, captain in 1926. He entered professional football with the Philadelphia Quakers in the Red Grange American League in 1926. The late Bob Folwell, Coach of the Quakers, found that Kostos had the attribute for a remarkable end. After playing end in 1926, he joined the Yellow Jackets and has played at that position during 1927, 1928 and 1929. Height, 5.11; Weight, 190; Position, Center.

## HENRY HOMAN

*Lebanon Valley*

"Two-Bits" Homan, the smallest bit of football talent in professional ball. Small in stature, but huge in ability. Homan came to the Jackets in 1925, after leading the Lebanon Valley College team for four years. The 1930 season will be his sixth with the Jackets. His remarkable ability as a safety man receiving punts and his sure receiving of passes have become nationally known. His years of experience at quarterback have given him the confidence and strategy to successfully lead the team under any condition. Weight, 148; Height, 5.5; Position, Quarterback.

## CLYDE CRABTREE

*University of Florida*

Crabtree started his football as a freshman at the University of Northwestern and transferred his varsity football to the University of Florida. The last two years he has been picked on the All-Southern team and was mentioned for All-American in 1928-1929. Crabtree has led the Florida Alligators through three successful seasons. His passing has won many games for this team. Height, 5.10; Weight, 150; Position, Quarterback.

## EDDIE HALICKI

*Bucknell University*

Halicki captained the Bucknell team and played four successful years of college football. Halicki has won fame by his place kicking. A consistent passer and an excellent receiver of passes. Knute Rockne has assured Mayor James J. Walker, of New York, by telephone from South Bend, Ind., that he would definitely assemble a team of former Notre Dame football stars and send them into action against the New York Giants on December 13th in a game for the benefit of the unemployed.

Any doubt that Rockne would agree to pit his all-star team against a professional squad was dispelled when he told the mayor he had volunteered the services of such a team and was ready to have them play any opponent.

Rockne said he expected that his famous "Four Horsemen" of 1924 would ride again, Stuhldreher, Crowley, Layden and Miller doing their stuff behind as many of the "Seven Mules" as could be rounded up.

The famous mentor of Notre Dame added that he would come to New York to coach his all-star array as soon as possible after Notre Dame's game with Southern California on December 6th.

Benny Friedman and Chris Cagle are expected to be in the line-up of the opposing Giant team.

Almost at the same time that the Mayor's committee announced its proposals, Tim Mara, owner of the New York Giants, offered the news that Cagle, All-American halfback with Army in 1928 and 1929, had signed to play with the Giants for the remainder of the season. Cagle has been coaching at Mississippi A. and M. this year without much success and has decided that he prefers playing to coaching.

put and a member of the tug of war teams.

Cagle went to West Point in 1926 and remained there until last year. When he left the South for West Point he had the greatest record of any football player in the secondary colleges in the South and a forward pass mark that never has been approached by any one else.

In 1923 against Louisiana State University, a Southern Conference eleven, Cagle threw 33 passes and completed 22 of them. In 1924, Cagle threw a total of 125 passes, 67 of which were completed. This was 53.6 per cent completion for the season.

So before Cagle began tossing long ones for the Army he was tossing them good enough in the South to knock the eye out of an oyster at 40 paces.

And those runs—he didn't learn them just at West Point. Long before he went there he was tripping the light fantastic through the opposi-

tion for multitudinous yards and miscellaneous touchdowns.

In his four years at Southwestern, Cagle scored 306 points. He made 86 points in his final season. He scored 42 touchdowns in four years, kicked two field goals and turned in 47 points after touchdown. He ran back ten punts and three kick-offs for touchdowns during his career.

No figures were kept on Cagle's yardage during his first two years at Southwestern, but the records of 1924 and 1925 shows what kind of a ball carrier he was even then:

1924—Carried the ball 65 times for a total gain of 369 yards and an average gain of 13.5 yards.

1925—Carried the ball 89 times for a total gain of 1,048 yards and an average gain of 11.7 yards. Cagle, despite his remarkable record was never picked on an All-State nor an All-Southern I. A. A. nor an All-Southern team.

Cagle at present is 25 years of age. He was born on his father's big cattle farm at Merryville and there went to school as a youngster. He is the oldest of eight children and was named after Christian Keener, who some 40 years ago was a Methodist Bishop known from one end of Louisiana to the other.

Cagle's father in speaking of "Red" said, "He was always accurate, even as a child, throwing rocks, sticks, brickbats wherever he meant them to go, but I never expected these minor traits to attract the football world in so short a time."

Frankford fans are, no doubt, anxious to see the great Cagle with Benny Friedman. The game also gives them a chance to see again in action such players as "Hap" Moran, who played here, and the veteran Rudy Comstock, who is playing at guard for the Giants.

## National Pro League President Fines Bears for Using Savoldi

Joe F. Carr, President of the National Professional Football League, has fined the Chicago Bears' professional football team \$1,000 for using Joe Savoldi, former Notre Dame fullback, in its Thanksgiving game with the Chicago Cards in violation of the league rules.

Carr announced the fine after considering charges that the Bears had used Savoldi in violation of a rule which prohibits college football stars playing in the league until their college classes have been graduated.

Savoldi was one of the Bear mainstays in their 6 to 0 victory over the Cards. The former Notre Dame star, who left school recently, made the only touchdown in the game.

Although the Bears claimed no rules had been violated, Carr said he felt that an offense had been committed, but granted the Chicago club right of appeal to the Executive Committee for the ruling.

Carr said he would not rule on Savoldi's future eligibility unless a further offense against the league's regulation is committed by the Chicago Bears with whom Savoldi was signed.

Savoldi's plunging had played a big part in Notre Dame's victories over Southern Methodist, Navy, Pennsylvania, Indiana, Pittsburgh and Carnegie Tech. He seldom started a game, but was sent into the fullback position when Notre Dame was ready for the scoring punch or if the offensive lagged. He was a native of Three Oaks, Mich.

Savoldi withdrew from school after an investigation disclosed he had married a South Bend, Ind., girl early in 1929. He claimed he never lived with her. A divorce suit, instituted in South Bend, site of Notre Dame, and which was withdrawn soon afterward, disclosed the marriage shortly before the Pennsylvania game on November 8th.

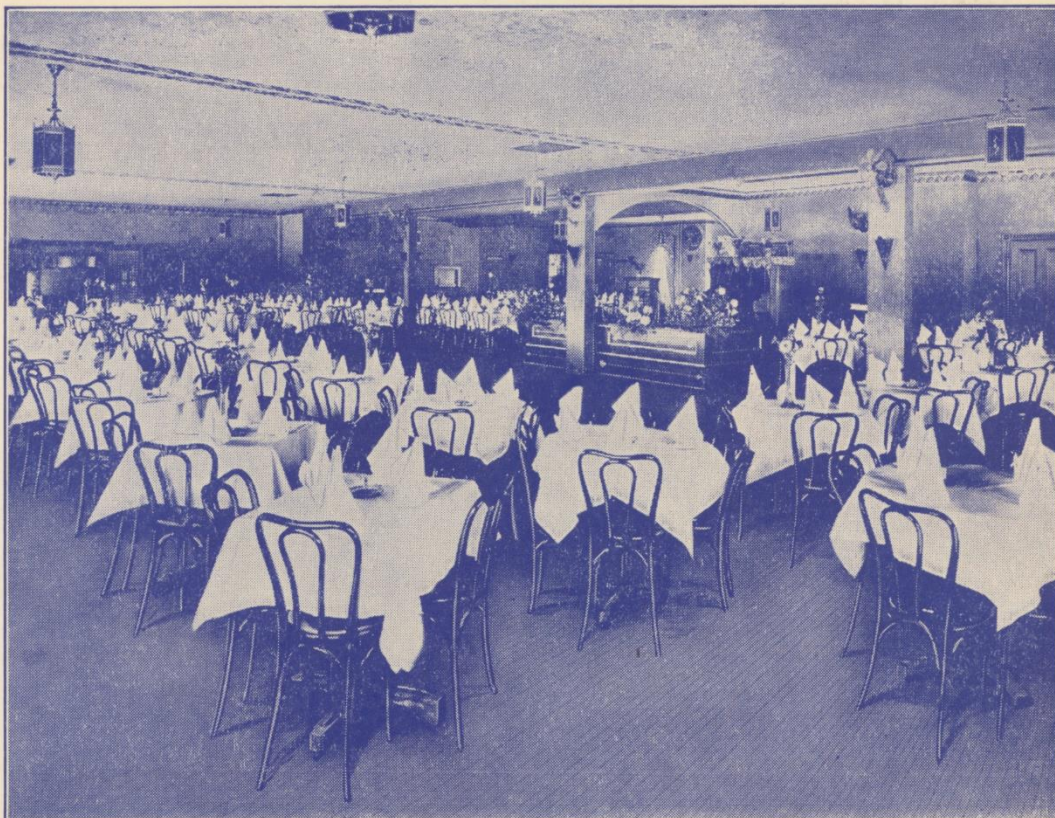

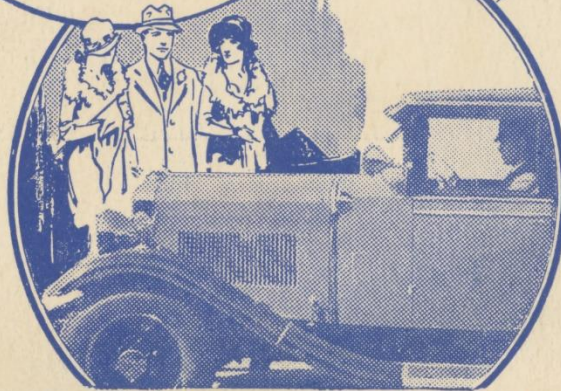
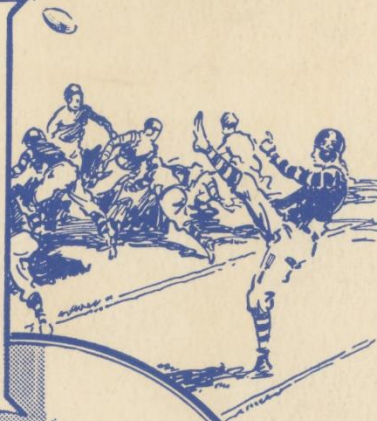
