## THE CHICAGO BEARS COACHING STAFF



**T**HE coaching staff of the Chicago Bears for the 1942 season remains the same as in 1941 when they won the National Championship again. George Halas, who is in his twentieth season as coach and twenty-third as president of the Chicago Bears Football Club, has been continuously associated with football for more than thirty years. In his high school days he played with Crane Tech here in Chicago. From there Halas entered the University of Illinois where he had an outstanding football record. From Illinois he enlisted in the Navy and played on the Great Lakes Training Station team along with Charlie Bachman, now coach at Michigan State College; Paddy Driscoll, now member of Bear's coaching staff, and Hugh Blacklock, famous old-time tackle of the Michigan Aggies.

In 1920 Halas organized the Staley Football Team at Decatur, Ill. Later the team was re-named the Chicago Bears and moved into Wrigley Field in 1921. He played end 10 years.

Luke Johnsos retired in 1937 after seven years as an end with the club and became assistant coach, tutoring the ends. Johnsos joined the Bears after graduating from Northwestern University. His excellent play won him all-league honors in 1933.

Hartley "Hunk" Anderson is line coach again for the third season and is considered by most football experts as the greatest strategist ever to teach this department of play. He was a guard on the 1922 team. Anderson's coaching career is long and varied and he has coached at Notre Dame, St. Louis University, North Carolina State College, Michigan, and the Detroit Lions. He is a Notre Dame man.

John "Paddy" Driscoll was added to the staff last year when he resigned as mentor at Marquette University. One of the all-time all-star backs in the post-graduate circuit, he played six seasons with the Cardinals and was with the Bears from 1926 through 1929. He directs the backfield. A Northwestern alumnus.

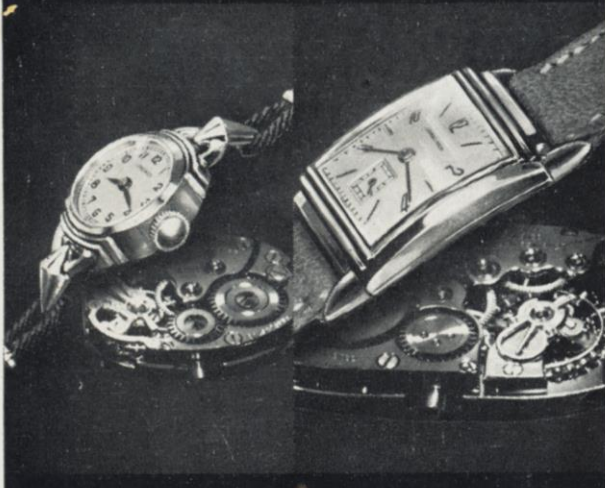

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# PRO WHIRL...

Hereabouts there is some surprise at the part rookies are expected to play in the Giant offense. Western professional fans seem to remember that Tuffy Leemans is still on the New York roster, and whenever they think of Tuffy Leemans in the West they think of trouble. Leemans helped not at all to allay their fears when he threw three touchdown passes last week. The Bears have not been overly successful against passes so far, and what's more they have not had a look yet at the Giants widely publicized O'Neal Adams, a rookie end from Arkansas.

Washington, with the best defensive team in the league, and Sammy Baugh, will find Brooklyn a worthy opponent, and this game undoubtedly will be the best of the lot on the day's schedule. The Dodgers were hurt more spiritually than physically last Sunday and will be in a mood to make amends. Their only casualty against Pittsburgh was Center Tom Robertson, who jammed up an arm somewhat, but will be ready for the kickoff.

Cleveland will match its speed and the passing of Cherokee Jack Jacobs, who turns out not to be a Cherokee after all, but a full-blooded Creek, against the Packers passing combine of Isbell and Hutson. Hutson three times in his career has scored three touchdowns against Cleveland, which alone is sufficient to make the Packers feel optimistic over their chances.

Detroit revealed great improvement at Green Bay last week despite a 38 to 7 defeat, and looks to the Cardinals as an opportunity to break into the win column for the first time. The Lions, feeling more at home in a single wing, averaged six yards per rush against the Packers and took over second place in the league on rushing with a mark of 3.59 per attempt. Tomorrow may be the Lions day.

The matter of the Pittsburgh Steelers in the National Football league championship race will come up for definite denouement in Philadelphia today.

After the Steelers had upset New York, 13 to 10, a fortnight ago, the wags and most of the experts dubbed them a one-week team. The Steelers didn't complain. They didn't even deny it. They merely stepped out and made it an eight-day week by whipping Brooklyn, 7 to 10, the following Sunday.

The week definitely is up now and today the Steelers attempt to avenge an earlier defeat by the Eagles, who have not been able to win since opening with a 24 to 14 triumph over the Pittsburghers on Sept. 13. If they succeed it will be about time that they be given prominent mention in championship calculations.

Bill Dudley and Company, who hadn't yet gotten themselves geared to major league football at the time of the Philadelphia meeting, can move up into a tie for second place in the eastern division with a victory today, provided, of course, that the Chicago Bears do not throw down all the experts by dropping a decision to the New York Giants.

# Giants' 1942 Championship Prospects

The Eastern Champions began this pennant campaign with thirteen veterans, twenty rookies. The first-year men figure to hold the fate of the Giants this season. They have been called upon to plug quickly the vacancies left by more than twenty-five former Giants, who are now in the armed forces and scattered over the world.

The New Yorkers' veteran nucleus is formed of Tuffy Leemans, Ward Cuff, Hank Soar, Dom Principe, Leland Shaffer, Andy Marefos and Al Owen in the backfield. Also Mel Hein, in this twelfth year with the club, at center; Tackle Frank Cope, Guard Bill Edwards, Wingmen Jim Lee Howell, Will Walls and Harry Kline.

Coach Steve Owen was rather fortunate to have promising replacements for every position. But only time will tell how well the freshmen fill the shoes of the departed Giants.

Outstanding in the big rookie crop were Merle Hapes, Mississippi's 1941 All-America fullback; O'Neale Adams, pass-catching end from Arkansas; Paul Stenn, 237-pound tackle from Villanova; Al Blozis, world champion shot putter and former Georgetown tackle; Charley Avedisian, guard from Providence, and Leo Cantor, U.C.L.A. triple-threat star.

Another rookie who is fast crashing into the inner circle is John Chickerneo, Pitt's great 1938 blocking back. Chickerneo was No. 1 on the Giants' 1939 selective list, but temporarily gave up the gridiron to enter business in South America. Hapes, Cantor and Chickerneo have added considerable power to the team's forward passing and punting attack.

Along with their numerous rookies the Giants introduced considerable new offensive weapons. Modified T-formations, Georgetown spread and other razzle-dazzle plays have furnished additional power and deception to the Giants' standard attack.

Steve Owen, who as player and coach has been with the Maramen since 1926, again is in charge of coaching. Bill, his younger brother, tutors the line.

# Owen Brothers Coach The Giants

The Giants have the distinction of possessing the only all-brothers coaching staff. Steve Owen is now in his twelfth season as head coach. Bill, his younger brother, has been line tutor two years. Steve and Bill each weigh 275 pounds.

Steve is the third oldest head coach in National League service. And one of the most successful. Stout Steve took over the coaching reins in the mid-season of 1930. His teams have won two world championships, six Eastern titles. He has been very successful handling players and is ranked the league's foremost defensive authority.

Steve was born and raised in Enid, Oklahoma, near Indian Territory. He resides in New York the year 'round except for scouting trips and a holiday visit back to the southwest. The Giants head coach attended Phillips University at Enid where he also was a baseball player and wrestler.

He completed his college grid career in 1921 and after one year as line coach at Phillips joined the Kansas City Cowboys and came to New York when that outfit was taken over intact by the Giants management. Steve was all-tackle four years and ranks with the league's all-time greatest tacklers.

Steve captained the Giants 1927 championship team that had only 20 points scored against it and is accepted as the best of many powerful Maramen elevens.

Bill, like Steve, was a top ranking Giant forward. He coached the Giants former Jersey City farm team, winning two American Association championships in three years. Last year he joined the Polo Grounds coaching staff as line mentor. In the off-season Bill deals in horses and mules in the west and always has a batch of funny stories to tell.
