New York Giants Hope to Lower Colors of Jackets for First Time Today

Have Only Scored Three Points on Local Eleven in Last Four Encounters. Both Teams Tie for Fourth Place. Hamer to Start. Moran Confident of Victory.

Up till last Saturday the Giants were 2 to 1 favorites to win over the Yellow Jackets, but last week's scores sort of changed the outlook and a great game is expected. Frankford, by its two crushing defeats handed Buffalo, jumped into a tie for fourth place, the Giants losing to Benny Friedman's Cleveland Panthers. Coach Potteiger will start his strongest line-up against the Jackets hoping to get a lead that the local eleven will be unable to beat. "Uncle Charlie" the Jacket coach has been drilling his men every day despite the rainy weather, perfecting several new plays and is confident that they will display even a greater brand of football than was shown last week, and capture the first game of the double header, and then repeat the victory at the Polo Grounds. "Tex" Hamer, star fullback of the Yellow Jackets will start the game, after several weeks' lay-off due to injuries.

The backfield of the Giants contains one of the greatest collection of grid stars ever assembled. "Tut" Imlay the Pacific Coast flash is at quarter, with Hinkey Haines, who needs no introduction, at left half, and Wycoff, last year with the Newark Bears in the American League at right half and Jack McBride the line-crashing fullback from Conshohocken. crashing fullback from Conshohocken.

Familiar faces on the line are Doc Alexander,

former Yellow Jacket star, Al Nesser the last of the fighting Nessers, and "Pete" Henry, the "drop-kicking fool," a veteran of the Canton Bulldogs.

The Giants believe they have a combination that will give them their first victory over the Jackets. Out of four starts with Frankford since being in the league, they have lost on each occasion—1925, 5-3, 14-0; 1926, 6-0, 6-0. On Sunday, the Yellow Jackets will travel to the Polo Grounds, New York, where they play

Jackets Stage Comeback Stinging Buffalo Bisons for 54-0 Win

Wilcox, Rogers, Mercer, Donohoe and Hap Moran Star in Terrific Onslaught to Win First League Victory. "Uncle Charlie" Moran Deserves Credit for Great Showing of the Local Eleven.

Entering the game last Saturday, tail-enders in the league, but with one week's tutoring at the hands of "Uncle Charlie" Moran, the Yellow Jackets displayed a brand of football that thrilled the 5,000 spectators from the opening of hostilities until the final whistle. The combination play of the Jackets worked so smoothly that the New York Staters were swept back and touchdowns were reeled off with startling regularity. Overhead, through the line and around the ends swarmed the Hornets in the greatest offensive ever seen in the local stadium. Even when "Uncle Charlie" made substitutions the Jackets rolled on and just to make a perfect average for all routes to the scoring column, Hap Moran booted two perfect placement kicks, both traveling 50 yards.

The Jacket defense, too, performed brilliantly. Connaughton, McGrath, Reed and Ed. Weir bowling over the Bison ball carriers at opportune moments.

Not once did the Buffalo eleven threaten the Frankford goal line. Buffalo gained only three first downs, two of these by means of the aerial route, while the Jackets made their yard-

age eleven times in straight football.

The first score came as a result of a long run by Hap Moran who received the kick-off and romped to Buffalo's 20-yard line, where he alternated with Wilcox in carrying the pigskin. Wilcox finally went over, Moran adding the extra point. After an exchange of kicks and a 13-yard gain by Homan, Moran kicked a field goal from the 39-yard line.

In the second period Donohoe romped 44 yards to the Bison's 6-yard line. Penalties forced the Jackets back and Moran booted his second field goal from the 38-yard line. Another exchange of punts and Donohoe this time tore off 60 yards and Wilcox gained the remaining distance, Moran adding the extra point. Substitutions were made in the Frankford line-up, and "Charlie" Rogers featuring in an aerial attack, in two passes carried the ball to the 2-yard line, Mercer scoring. Moran again added the extra point. On a penalty Buffalo kicked from the 20-yard line, and Rogers raced 45 yards to the Bison's 25-yard line. Mercer gained 6 and Rogers tore through for a touchdown. Moran again came through with a perfect average.





Jackets Again Buffalo the Bisons in Sunday Tilt—23-0

Defensive Play of Frankford Line Feature of the Game. Written Specially for the Program by "Charlie" Rogers, Halfback of the "Jackets."

That Coach Charlie Moran has put the sting in the Frankford Yellow Jackets was again thoroughly demonstrated last Sunday when the team crushed the Buffalo All-Americans under a lopsided score for the second consecutive day. The final reading of the verdict found the locals leading to the tune of 23 to 0.

Probably the outstanding feature of the contest was the remarkable defensive play of the Frankford line. Not a single first down was chalked up by the Bisons by rushing during the entire contest and only one first down was credited to them via the penalty route.

Several times during the fray Buffalo needed a scant yard to make a first down. Twice the rival quarterback called upon his fullback to carry the ball through the centre for the necessary distance on fourth down. In the first attempt "Pud" Connaughton, the man mountain of the Jackets hurled the Bison ball carrier for a two-yard loss, and on the other both Connaughton and Comstock broke through to ruin the offensive thrust.

Three touchdowns and a field goal, along with two successful tries for the point after touchdown, were garnered by the Yellow Jackets during the course of Sunday's game.

Hap Moran continued to display his prowess as a placement kicker by booting the pigskin between the uprights from a distance of forty-two yards. On Saturday, Hap had two placements over forty yards, so over the weekend it is believed by the critics that he set up a new record for long distance field goal kicking.

Moran also plunged through the Buffalo line for a touchdown and kicked two goals after touchdown. Ned Wilcox, who played a bangup game all during the contest, also contributed a score after the ball had been carried down to the six-yard line by a series of line-plunges. Ignacio Molinet crashed through the Buffalo line for the only other score of the game after Frankford opened up with a successful

At the close of the game the Buffalo eleven crumbled. Had the contest lasted a few minutes longer no doubt the score would have been almost doubled.







New York Giants Present Powerful Grid Machine

"Hinkey" Haines Again with Gothamites.

The New York Football Giant's machine of The New York Football Giant's machine of 1927 has been strengthened with five new parts. The new players are "Cal" Hubbard, formerly of Geneva and 1926 All-American end, who weighs 235 and stands 6.4; "Doug" Wyckoff, formerly of Georgia Tech and the greatest plunging back in the history of Southern football; "Fat" Henry, formerly of Washington and Jefferson and giant All-American tackle, and "Mule" Wilson, a new speed flash from Texas. from Texas.

The Polo Grounds' warriors are a team of real giants. Their forward line averages over two hundred pounds. Not in years has any advance line boasted as much tonnage, but the Red and Blue linesmen are unusually fast despite their bulk.

The complete roster of the Giants contains

The complete roster of the Giants contains the names of some of the game's greatest stars whose colorful exploits form an important chapter in the annals of the gridiron.

The Polo Grounds' eleven is coached by Earl Potteiger, who was in charge when the New Yorkers defeated 32 to 0 the Philadelphia Quakers, champions of the American League last season in a post-season game.

"Hinkey" Haines made his first bid for football fame as a member of Penn State's memorals.

ball fame as a member of Penn State's memorable backfield of Killinger, Wilson, Lightner and Haines. That backfield has had few equals and Haines was rewarded with All-American honors.

A college player's career is a short one, and after reciving his diploma Haines could not resist the temptation of turning professional in order to match his speed and skill with some of the country's best known stars.

Haines has materially improved in professional competition in which only super players can hope to shine. A ten-second man, "Hinkey" has so cleverly utilized his speed that last year he led the Giants in point scoring with seventeen touchdowns.

In action Haines is a whirlwind, shaking off expectant tacklers and neatly eluding others. While football is "Hinkey's" forte, he is an allround athlete, and for two years played baseball with the Yankees.

Haines is the son of a Pennsylvania minister and married the daughter of another preacher of the good book. Out of his football togs Haines is deceptive with his reserved manners and soft speech, but once on the gridiron-oh, boy! what a transformation.

Two former Lafayette stars are performing well in the backfield for the Pottsville Maroons.
"Dinty" Moore is doing everything asked of
him at quarterback while Frank Kirkleskie is a mighty good cowhide lugger.

Al Nesser with N. Y. Giants

"Pete" Henry and "Cal" Hubbard Also Newcomers with Giants.

In the cherished roll of honor of college heroes there is no mention of Al Nesser, for the very simple reason this brawny citizen never had the money or time to attend classes. What Nesser knows about football he taught himself and his knowledge of the game is amazing.

Al is the best known of the seven Nesser brothers of Columbus who came near forming an entire family team. The Nessers played in the Panhandle League throughout the Middle West, where a player believed he was well paid if he got ten dollars a game. And the Nessers did not flinch from playing three tough games in two days.

Al's fame extended East, and last season the big fellow was signed by the New York Giants. Refusing to wear a head gear, the newcomer was quickly spotted and his extraordinary playing soon made him a favorite with Polo Grounds' fans.

Nesser weighs 190 and is so tremendously strong that no opponent is able to consistently stop him. The big guard follows the ball like a hawk and is usually in the thick of the fight. Despite his hard playing the Giant's star is like oak. Nesser has to be almost totally disabled before he's willing to leave the battlefield.

"Cal" Hubbard—A Man Mountain
"Cal" Hubbard is a giant of giants. The
Giant's new star weighs 235 and stands 6.4.
He rears up on the gridiron like the Woolworth Building. Possessing such a huge frame

it is not surprising why many wonder how Hubbard can play an end position where speed is so necessary to check the growing tendency to kick and pass. Hubbard, however, is something of a physical freak, and those who figure the giant is slow should try to beat him down the field.

Little Geneva College made a national reputation in football last season, which was due chiefly to Hubbard, who was mentioned on many All-American teams. Geneva defeated Harvard, but it was mostly a single-handed performance by Hubbard that turned back the Crimson tide early in the 1926 season.

"Fat" Henry-A Man Mountain

At right tackle on the Giant's line is "Fat" Henry, who is quickly remembered as the man mountain who won All-American honors at Washington and Jefferson. Henry is big enough to hold down his entire side of the line. Weighing 255, the veteran crashes through opposing forwards like they were so much paper. And one of the amazing sights in football is to see Henry with all his tonnage beating his ends down the field under kicks.

Henry has been an outstanding star in the National League. He is playing his first season with the Giants. He played for many years with the Canton Bulldogs and is a deadly drop kicker as local fans will remember, when his toe deprived Frankford of a championship several years ago.



CONDENSED RULES

A FEW IMPORTANT RULES AND FACTS FOR YOUR GUIDANCE

When the referee starts the game by blowing his whistle no player on the kicking side can touch the ball on the ground without at once putting it in play by kicking it.

Should a player on the side in possession of the ball make a false start or otherwise draw his opponents offside, the ball, if snapped, shall not be regarded as in play or the scrimmage as

Before the ball is put in play the opponents cannot in any way interfere with the center, nor touch him or the ball.

The ball cannot be tossed or passed in the direction of the opponents' goal by a player on the side not putting the ball in play from scrimmage.

A player is put offside if the ball in play has been touched last by a man of his own team behind him. He cannot be called offside, however, if behind his own goal line or while holding the ball for a place kick.

No substitute or any other person not actually in the game is allowed to coach.

Members of this League are expected to conduct themselves as gentlemen and sportsmen. Any flagrant violation of this principle may subject the offending member to suspension or expulsion.

No member shall knowingly make false representations through advertising as to the personnel of his or a competitive team in an effort to deceive the public for his own financial betterment. The confidence of the public is to be desired above all else.

No member shall have a player on his team under an assumed name.

Tampering with players on College teams shall not be tolerated by this League. The same creates much unfavorable public sentiment against professional football, and is deplored and discouraged by this League. An adequate supply of football players who have completed their academic status exists and by confining ourselves to these men much favorable public sentiment will be ours.




