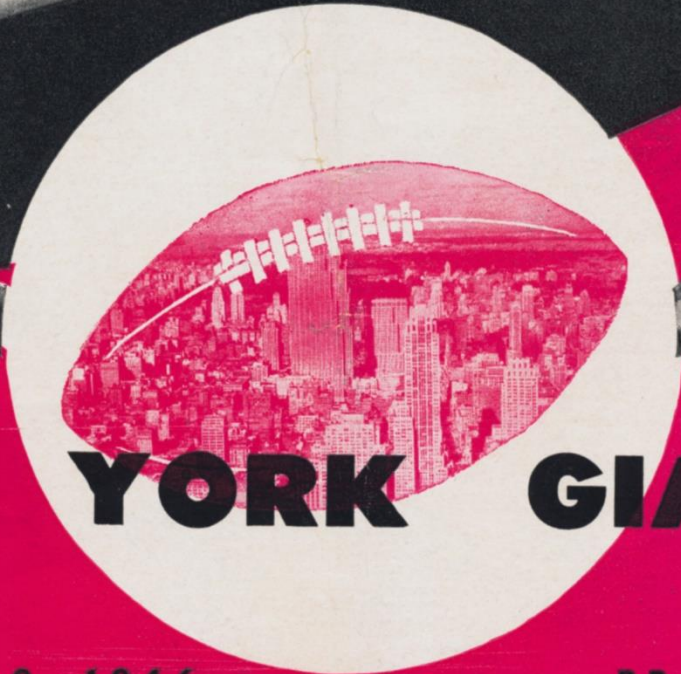

# NEW YORK *Giants*

In the event the New York Giants break away in stride from the 1946 National Football League starting barrier tonight and slap down the Yanks, do not quit on the Kopfmén.

Coach Steven Owen has a fine array of experienced pigskin chasers wearing Giant uniforms this season. The Giants have been in the league for more than two decades. Between them, Owner John V. Mara and Head Coach Owen have created a sound organization, which has developed winning clubs, which, in turn, have paid dividends.

Among the experts, who sat in on the Giants-Packers game last Friday night in the Polo Grounds were Head Coach Herb Kopf, Line Coach Johnny Dell Isola and General Manager Arthur G. Sampson, who are committed to Owner Ted Collins to bring Boston a winner in National Football League competition.

To say that the Yanks' "boss men" were shocked at the super brand of football displayed by the New Yorkers against Green Bay is an under-statement of facts.

On occasions, during the seven seasons Johnny Dell Isola played with the Giants, New York was represented by elevens, which compared favorably with the greatest aggregations the National Football League ever produced.

But, here is what Dell Isola told me early this week, "Steve Owen has a better club than any of the Giant elevens I played with from 1934 through 1940. He has a well balanced, hard hitting and powerful club. Of course, we went to New York to scout the Giants. Possibly, we didn't pay enough attention to the Packers. The Yanks are not scheduled to meet Green Bay, so we concentrated on the Giants. I hope that the Packers were not up to standard and that we over-estimated the Giants."

Head Coach Herb Kopf has a young and inexperienced squad entering for the 1946 National Football League campaign. It's the

Yanks' first real bid for favorable recognition in the pro ranks. They came into being during the war. So, they started from scratch. During their freshman year in the NFL, the Yanks were strictly on their own. The players turned over to them by other clubs would have had trouble making good semi pro teams in the pre war days.

In order to operate a year ago, Owner Ted Collins was obliged to merge with Brooklyn. But, that arrangement didn't "jell", for with one or two exceptions, the players under contract to Brooklyn failed to deliver when the chips were down.

With more than a dozen "freshmen", (many of whom assigned to key positions) on the squad, Coach Kopf realizes that the Yanks are going to make mistakes until they acquire the "feel" of NFL competition.

For about six weeks, Kopf has been driving his charges at top speed, he has installed a new offense—the "Three Way T". He has drilled his squad on fundamentals as well as advanced football. But, he realizes that there's no substitute for experience.

"I'm not making any predictions concerning the Yanks," declared Coach Kopf this week, "Other than to state that there will be few clubs in the league with as much team spirit. This is a great bunch, I have here. I've been pretty rough on them for six weeks but I haven't had a single gripe from any member of the current squad.

"We've improved since the Bears' game. How much, I don't know, at the moment. I'll be in a position to speak authoritatively on that subject after the game with the Giants.

"But, I can truthfully say that every man I send into the game against New York will give me the "old college try". Sure, they'll make mistakes. I expect them to, because of their lack of experience. But, they won't "dog it" and they'll fight it out to the final gun".

## Duke and Rudy Impress Kopf

The Boston Yanks searched the mid-west, had scouts down in the deep south and even hit the west coast in their quest for top flight football players, yet two unknowns, right in this area, are giving the Yanks highly publicized stars a real run for backfield jobs.

One of them, 'Duke' Abbruzzi, is a Rhode Island State pre-war halfback who has been little short of sensational in scrimmages to date while the other never went to college yet he's pushing both Johnny Grigas and Gary Famiglietti for the fullback job—he's Rudy Romboli from Everett High School.

Neither of these boys figured in the Yanks plans for this season. As a matter of fact, both were slated for the farm club, the Long Island Indians. However, they were given permission to report to the Yanks camp and the longer they stay around the more impressive they look.

Of course, Abbruzzi's showing is no surprise to Rhode Island fans. At little Warren High School and later at "State", he was a broken field marvel. In eight years of school and college competition, he was held scoreless only three times. But it was figured that four years in the service should have slowed him down. Evidently it didn't, for he's just about the fastest back the Yanks have right now.

Romboli was one of the greatest schoolboy fullbacks ever produced in this area, but the 215-pound griddler, having no college experience and only a year of overseas football since leaving Everett in 1941, was not considered to be polished enough for N. F. L. competition. His great plunging, though, and his vicious line backing has brought him to the fore.

## Boley Coming Into Own With The Yanks

Boley Danczewicz, the Lynn schoolboy sensation who went on to All-America fame at Notre Dame, is slowly coming into his own with the Boston Yanks.

Reporting two weeks late because of the All Star game, Danczewicz immediately ran into trouble at the Yanks camp in Danvers, for the version of the "T" he had learned at Notre Dame differed greatly from the Kopf interpretation.

The result was that for almost two weeks, Boley was hampered. He had to forget his Notre Dame habits and adopt new methods. Naturally, the changes did not come easily and he so concentrated on each step that his ball handling and passing suffered.

But Danczewicz is too good a football player to let a change in assignments keep him down long. Boley is starting to hand that ball off with the ease and perfection which highlighted his sleight of hand work at Notre Dame and he's pitching with great control.

Then to make matters all the more encouraging, Red Maley, who never played "T" before, has now learned the patterns, and the former Southern Methodist triple threat is now coming along.

Add Paul Governali, who is a "natural", and the Yanks have three quarterbacks who figure to be around a long while.

## Be Patient With Ex-GIs

Football and the returning service man will get along very well together if both remember not to expect too much immediately from the man who has been away from athletic training and body contact competition for a couple of seasons.

Time and patience are all that are needed to bring the stars of 1941 back into the limelight, Coaches George Halas of the Chicago Bears, himself a returning service man, and Curly Lambeau of the Green Bay Packers, have concluded.

"The fan will have to be patient with the old timer," Halas said, "and the old timer will have to curb his own enthusiasm. If he does not expect too much from himself at the start, we will be cheering the same old stars late in the race. It is a matter of conditioning and recovering poise and the looseness that was lost through absence from football for several seasons. But it can be and is being recovered by the returning players on the Bears' roster."

Lambeau, who experienced some of the problems of conditioning returning stars last season, expects football to fare better with returning service men than other sports.

"Most men rejoining National league teams," says the veteran Packer coach, "have been out of service for six to eight months, during which they have been able to undergo some readjustment. In other sports, former top notch stars have been asked to jump into the starting lineup a day or two after their discharge and were deprived of this readjustment period."

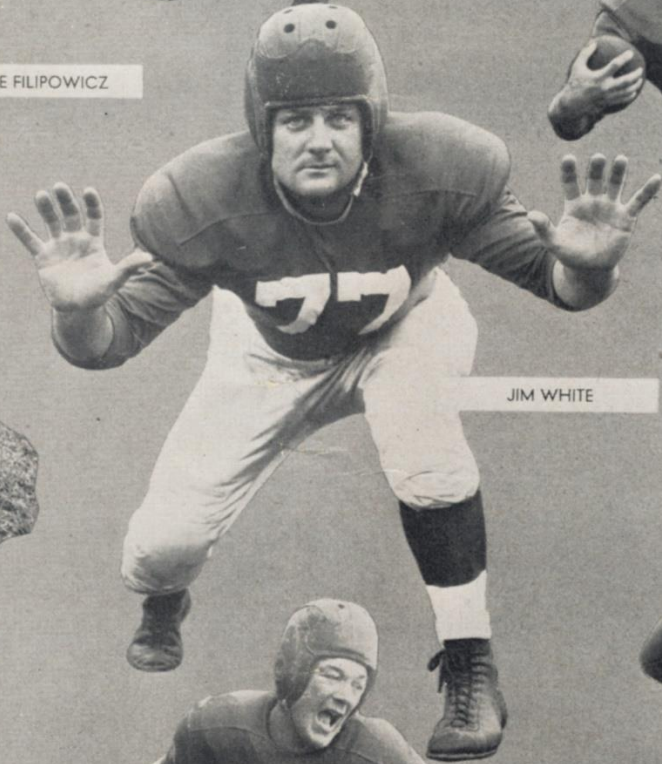

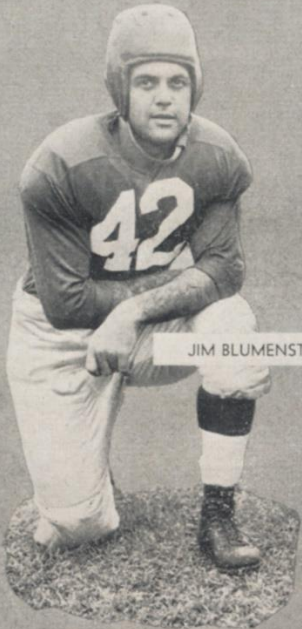

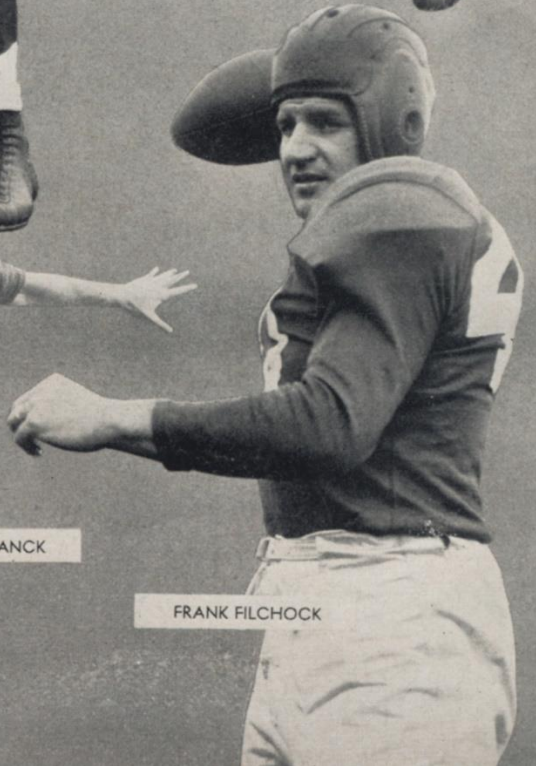

## DOING WHAT COMES NATURALLY

Joe Domnanovich, the South Bend outcast, has shown Herb Kopf, Boston Yanks grid mentor, why he was unanimously acclaimed All-America center while at the University of Alabama in 1942.

Returning to football after a three year service absence, the former Alabama great wisely worked himself back into grid shape slowly. He wasn't too impressive in scrimmages but the Yanks coach knowing his difficulties, let Joe get ready in his own way.

The news that Joe is picking up where he left off at Alabama, will bring no great glee in South Bend for as far as this Indiana town is concerned, Joe is a forgotten man.

At Riley High School in South Bend from 1933 through 1935, Joe was one of the finest schoolboy centers in the mid-west. It was taken for granted that he would attend Notre Dame.

Instead, Joe wound up at Alabama. As a result, the sports writer of one newspaper there and several of the town's biggest sports boosters cut Domnanovich cold and have never spoken to him from the day he made his decision.

The ironical twists that the man who talked him into attending Alabama was the Crimson Tide Coach, Frank Thomas—a Notre Dame man.

## "FAM" and "ROCK" STREAMLINED (?)

Football players are famed for their appetites but one would never know it from watching two of the Boston Yanks grid giants—Rocco (255) Canale and Gary (241) Fami-glietti toy with their meals.

When he reported, Fam hit the scales at 249 which was a 16 pound drop from the 265 he weighed last June. Now he's shed eight more and he's nearing his objective. It's punishment, too, for Fam skips lunch completely and restricts himself to two meals a day, but the effort is paying off for the Medford veteran has regained his speed and retained his power.

Rocco was 264 when he made his first appearance at St. John's Preparatory School and was proud of the fact that he lowered to 255, which 'Rock' considered his ideal playing weight. After his bruising encounter with the Bears, however, Canale was so completely exhausted that he changed his mind about his condition. Net result, Rocco is down to 248 for the Giants, which means that a few New York gridders are going to be in for a very rugged evening.

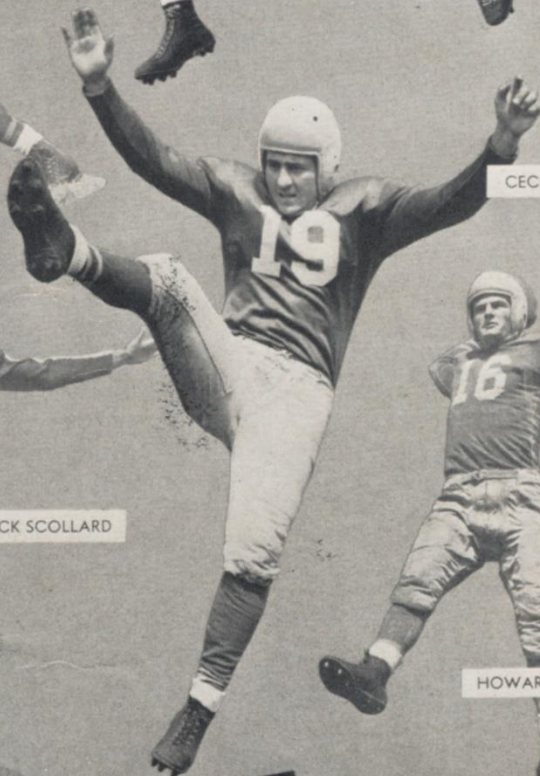

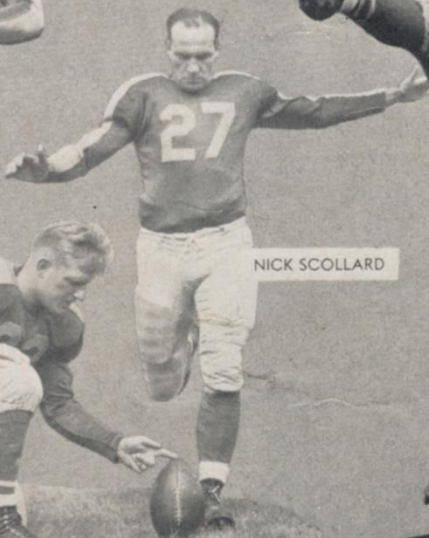

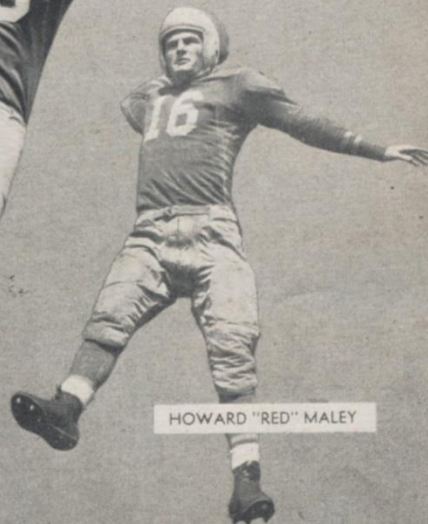

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# Dean, Johnson, Maley, Rugged Sons of Texas

Texas, known for its beautiful gals and long horned steers, is also the home of exceptional football players. All-America teams down through the years have always included at least one Texan, while the powerhouses in the National Football League are all well sprinkled with grid greats from the Lone Star State.

The Boston Yanks are no exception. On their roster are three Texans. Two may very well be regulars this season while the third is a star in the making who may be a year away from stampeding the league.

Most formidable of the trio is 250-pound Tom Dean, a tackle from Southern Methodist—he's big, he's rough and he's mean in competition. Then there's Cecil Johnson. He naturally made no All-America teams as the triple threat halfback at Paris Junior College in East Texas, but some of the All-America halfbacks on the Yanks squad may wind up behind the Paris Junior College ace. Howard "Red" Maley is the third member of the Lone Star invaders—he quarterbacked Southern Methodist last year and looms as a 'natural', but the "T" is new to him and it will take him a while to get acclimated.

Coming back to Dean, why he didn't make every All-America team in the country is something Matty Bell, S. M. U. coach, will never understand. Matty said he wouldn't swap Dean for any tackle in the country and that Tom was one of the greatest tackles he had ever coached or seen.

Yet Dean was overlooked for some reason. He came into his own, however, in the North-South game last December. A half dozen National Football League scouts were in the stands that day and the reports they sent in must have been good for six N. F. L. clubs have tried to trade with the Yanks for him.

Dean will remain right here in Boston and figures to open gaping holes through which Cecil Johnson will race for chunks of yardage. Johnson has everything to be a great halfback and he's proved his worth already.

Johnson is another case of a back hailing from an unknown little college and then making 'name' backs look like also rans in National League competition. "Cec" went to Brooklyn from Paris Junior College in 1943 and made the first club. He was a powerful runner, a real good booter, and ranked with the top eight in pass receiving.

In 1944, Johnson led the National Football League in kicking with a 42.6 average. He turned passer and completed 50% of his air shots. And he also did his share of running. Last year Johnson was in the Army as a physical instructor and he kept himself in top shape.

This brings us down to "Red" Maley. The slim 170-pound ex-marine came North with a great punting reputation and little else. He was the leading college booter in the nation last year. However, a little investigation brought a few interesting highlights to life. Maley has always been a great passer but his bullet flips were much too potent for the average college end to hold and for that reason he did little pitching in college.

"Red" was also a good runner but, due to a war time shortage of material, Coach Bell kept moving him to different backfield positions week after week and Maley never did get a chance to really roll from one spot. At the Yanks camps, however, the redhead has been very impressive. With ends who can hang on to his howitzers, he finds himself rated close to Paul Governali. In punting, he is No. 1 and in place kicking he is also top man. The "T," however, is new to him and he does lack experience. Because of this, he will probably be used primarily as a kicker this season but if ever a football player had "comer" labeled all over him, Maley is definitely that lad.
