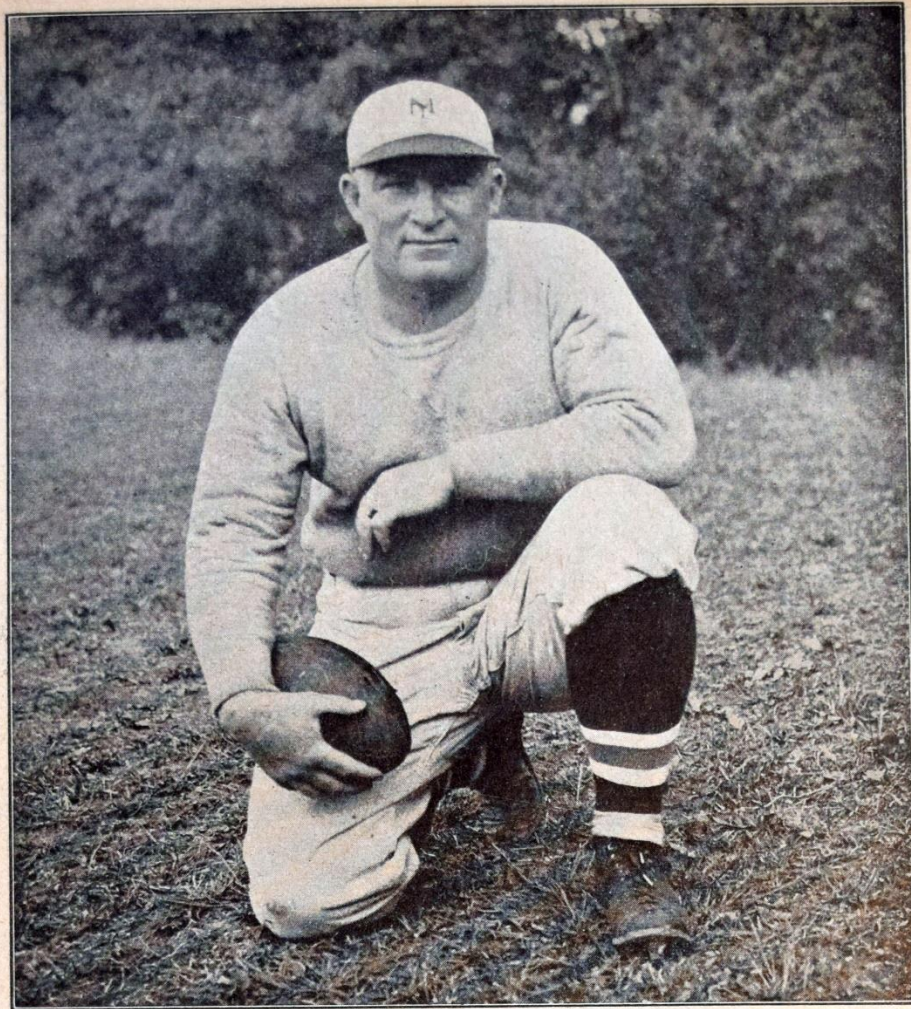

Tribute to a Coach

LAST Sunday the Giants defeated the Lions from Detroit, 35 to 14. The dope was that the contest would turn out just the other way. But the local outfit, confronted with the danger of its fifth consecutive setback, tore into the Lions with a vigor that elated the fans and astonished all the experts.

Junior Hovius played great football that afternoon. So did Frank Liebel. So did Joe Sulaitis.

But behind it all was the directing genius of the greatest professional football coach in the country, Steve Owen.

Behind it all was not only the technical genius of this man Owen, but his inspirational influence, his moral force.

To lift the Giants from the defeat by the Eagles to the heights they attained against the Lions, all in one week, was the achievement of a super-coach.

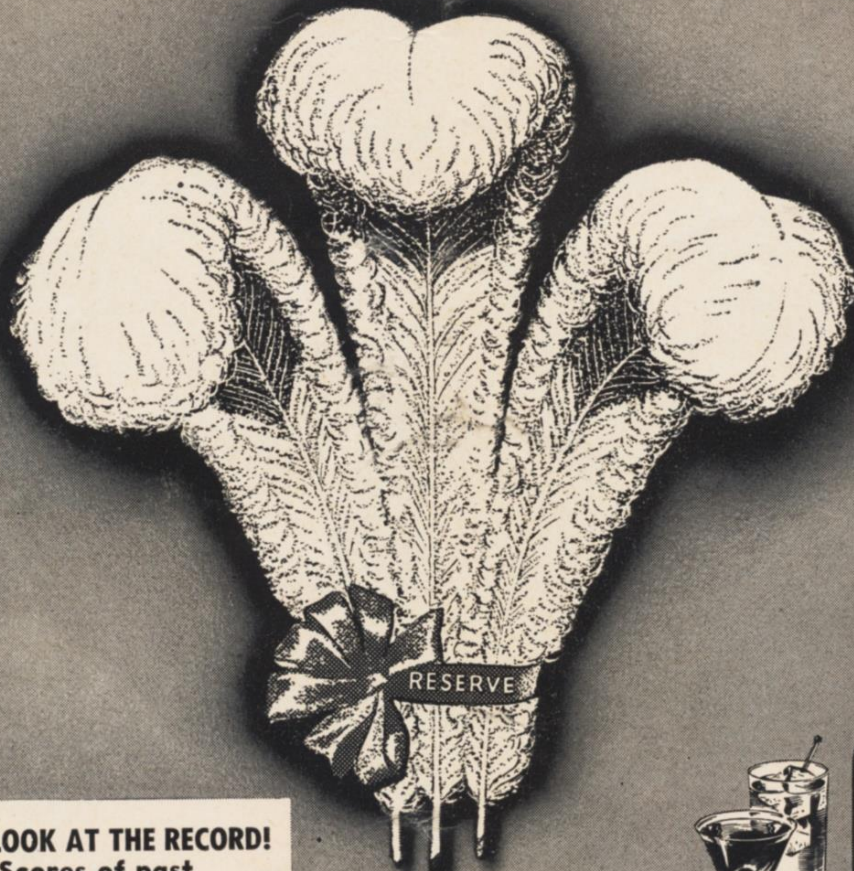
Here is Cuff the Kicker

WARD CUFF, one of the grandest football players in the history of the Giants—and the National League—is 31, but he still is at it.

No oldtimer just getting by is this man Cuff. He puts out every time he takes the field, still a vibrant factor in the doings of Steve Owen's outfit. Here is the veteran's history:

Marquette, 1935-37. Ninth season with Giants. Thirty-one, six feet one inch. Weight 196. One of the National League's greatest all-time backs. Giants' all-time high scorer with 319 points representing 20 touchdowns, 100 extra points, 33 field goals. Two years won the league's field-goal kicking championship although he never kicked in college. Cuff is the best all-round athlete on the New York squad. His accomplishments range from ping-pong to fishing. Married. Two children. Home—Milwaukee. Plans to make physical education and coaching his life's work.

Mel Hein Rates Designation as Football's All-Time Superman

★ ★ ★

MEL HEIN deserves to be ranked as football's all-time No. 1 superman. The New York Giants' famed pivot is that good. Mel's record is unmatched in the game's long history. Outstanding in highschool, All-America at Washington State, ten years selected the top center in the National League, Hein long ago set the model for playing his position.

The New York center never made a poor pass. Intuitively, Mel was at the right place at the right time. Especially on the defense where his deployment was simply uncanny. A natural leader, the Pacific Coast giant always furnished inspirational strength to his team mates.

Hein's ironman achievements are even more phenomenal than his playing record. Now thirty-six, the big blond has performed the amazing total of twenty-two seasons on the gridiron, fourteen in the National League, four each in college and highschool. He never missed a game. Durable Mel had time out only twice in his career. The first time was 1938 when a head injury forced him out in the first half, but the grizzled veteran came back to help stem a late Green Bay challenge for victory. Mel's ironman feats are particularly impressive because football is the most rugged of contact contests.

Six feet, four inches, Hein always weighed about 232 pounds with the Giants. He was tremendously strong, needed only to stick out his powerful right arm to stop many enemy ball carriers dead in their tracks. A tireless practice worker, Mel never refused the many who sought his advice.

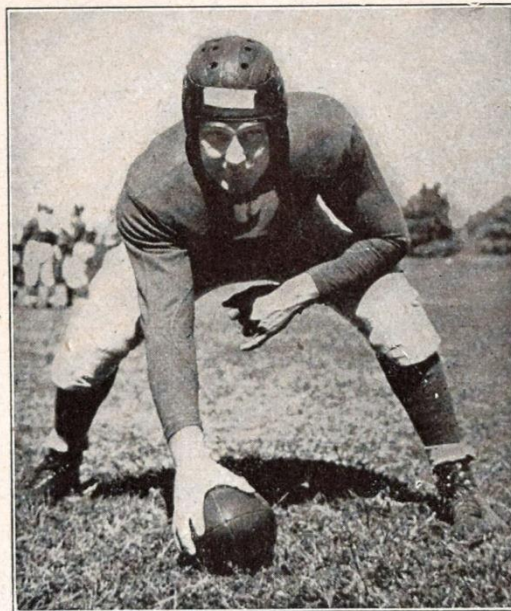
The veteran's biggest thrill came on Dec. 1, 1940 when over 50,000 admiring fans attended Mel Hein Day at the Polo Grounds.

His biggest accomplishment was being named the National League's leading center eight consecutive years, 1932-'39.

Of the thousands of plays in which he was a participant Hein describes this one as the most unusual: It was the 1933 Giants-Bears game in Chicago. Mel passed the ball to Ken Strong, who started an end run. Seeing he was going to be tackled, Strong lateraled to Harry Newman. Newman faded back and forward passed to Strong, who had kept

on going down the field. Strong carried over for a touchdown.

Hein was born in Redding, Calif. He married a classmate at Washington State. They honeymooned across the continent in a small car purchased from money advanced by the Giants to enable Mel to report for his first pro practice. The Heins have two children.

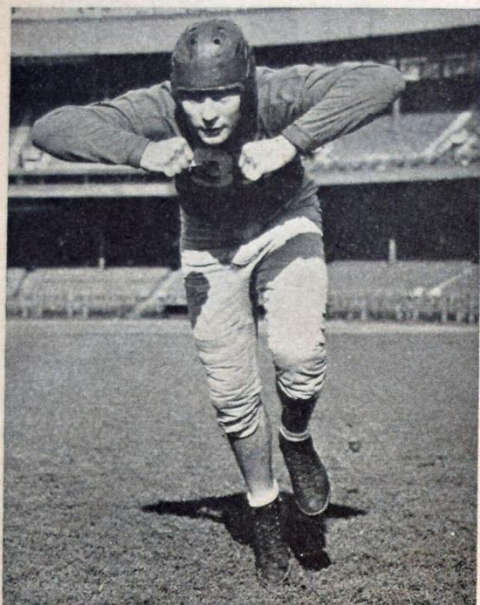

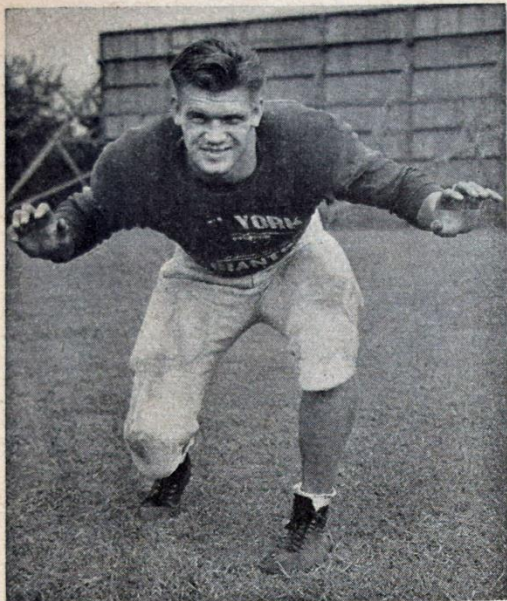

AL BLOZIS

BIG Al Blozis, genial, tremendous on the gridiron, a favorite with New York football fans, and Jack Lummus, not quite so well known but a grand guy, just the same, lost their lives in the war. They were fine Giants, dandy fellows, and their memory is to be perpetuated in memorials right here at the Polo Grounds. Plaques telling of their deeds will be unveiled at the Eagles' game next Sunday.

Blozis died in the Vosges Mountains in France, Lummus on Iwo Jima.

Blozis joined the Giants in 1942 after winning fame in football and as the world's champion shot putter at Georgetown. Big Al (he weighed 250 and stood 6:6) did well in his freshman year with the pros. In his second he won all-league tackle honors.

After the 1943 gridiron campaign the North Bergen, N. J. giant got into the Army the hard way. He had been turned down several times because of his size. After winning his gold bars, Al received special per-

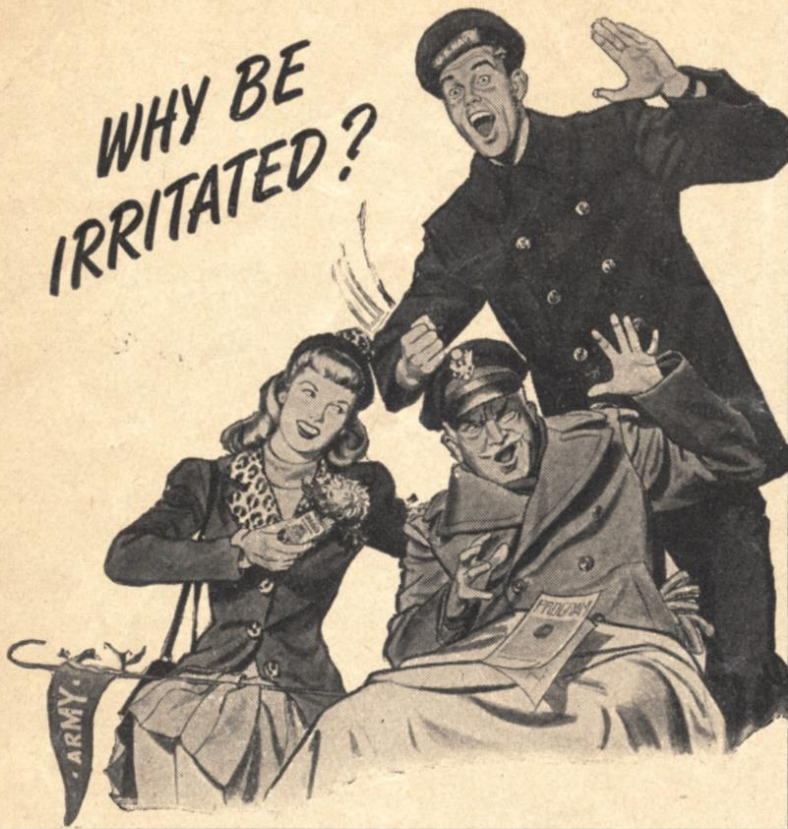
mission to play with the Giants the last three 1944 games. His gridiron farewell was December 17 when the Giants opposed the Green Bay Packers for the title. Two days later Al was on his way to the front.

1st Lt. Lummus was killed in an infantry-tank attack which broke one of the Japs' final and most stubborn lines of resistance on Iwo Jima.

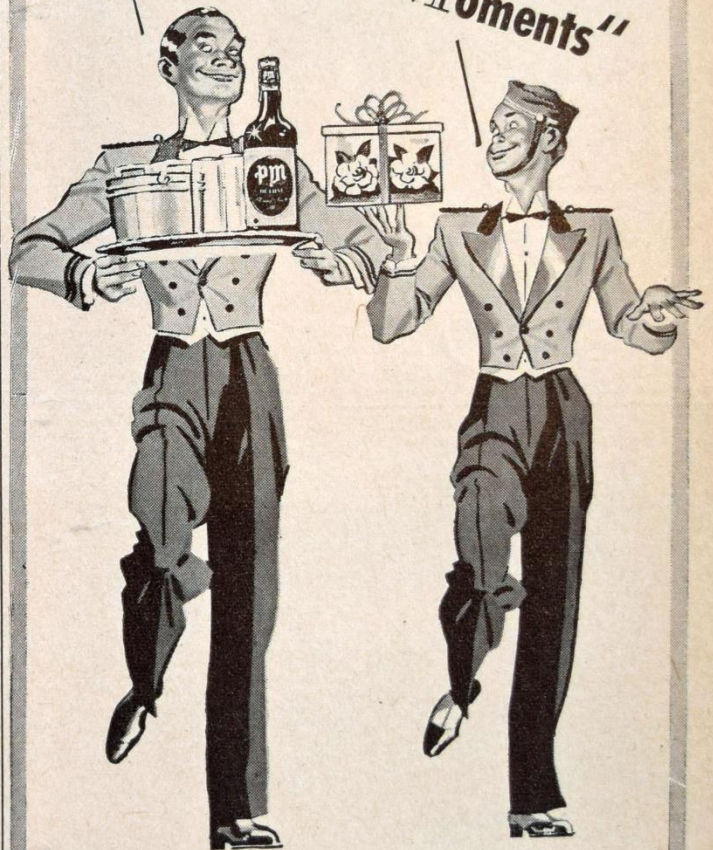

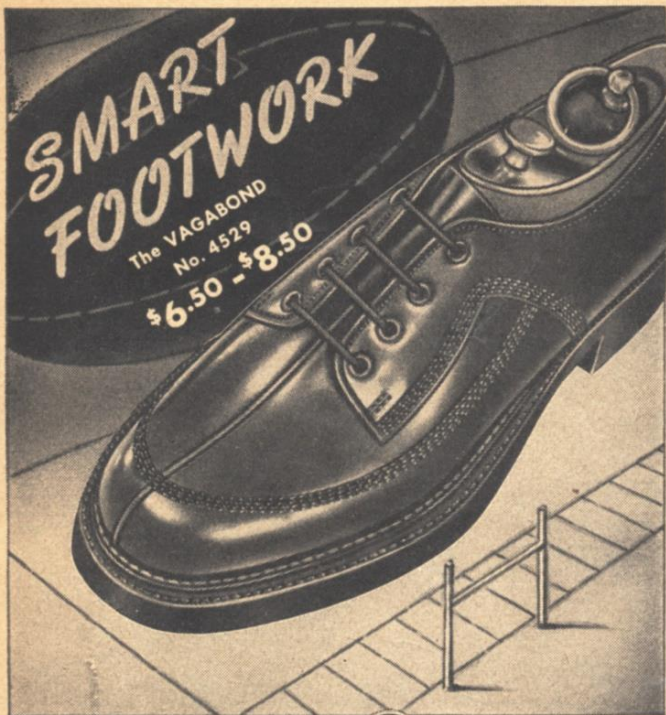

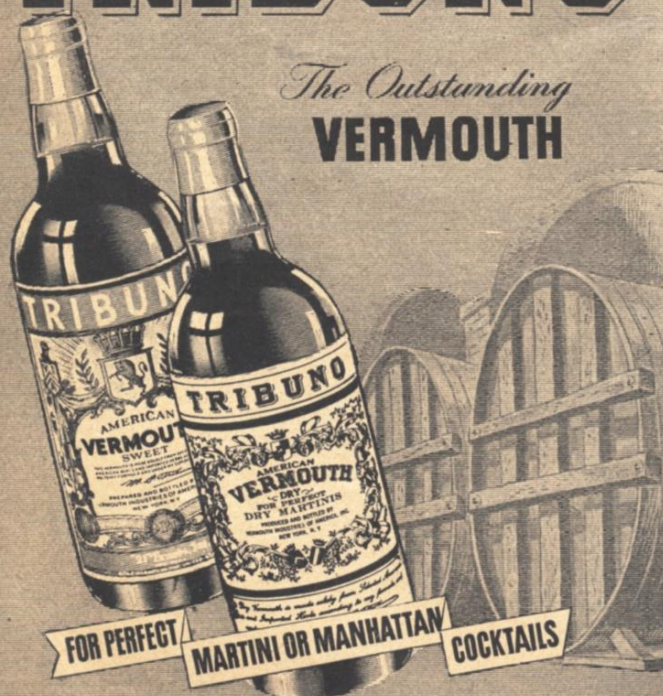

Washington and Cleveland Top Standings in National League



THE Giants last week not only did themselves proud, but did the Cleveland Rams a favor as Owen's men kicked the Lions out of parity with the Rams at the top of the Western division of the National League.

Cleveland's record is marred by only one defeat, the October 28 setback in Philadelphia, 28 to 14. Before the defeat by New York, Detroit lost to Green Bay.

The Redskins have come to the end of the November campaign with only one setback—the 28 to 20 defeat by the Brooklyn-Boston Yanks on October 7.

With Philadelphia and Washington yet to be met, the Giants are going to have something to say about the Eastern leadership even if they cannot achieve it themselves.
