Green Bay Packers on the Way

The high spot of the New York Giants home stand is on tap next Sunday when the Green Bay Packers invade the Polo Grounds for their annual game with the Owen outfit. The Packers come East this season with an even greater record than a year ago when they went on to win the National League championship.

Minus the services of Arnold (Flash) Herber and Bob Monnett, their two forward passing experts, the Packers dropped their first two games this fall. Since that time, however,

Monnett's passing. In fact Hinkle now tops the league in scoring and is enjoying the greatest year of his pro career and he has had some great years. Hinkle is a terror off tackle, a superior punter and smashing line backer.

Then, too, New Yorkers will get the first peek at another amazing ball player in Eddie Jankowski, recruit ball carrier from Wisconsin, who has been almost as dependable and valuable to Green Bay this fall as Hinkle in piling up needed yardage through the line. With

Herber and Monnett have been back in action much to the dismay of all opposition.

The Packers now boast a string of six consecutive wins, the longest streak of the season, in fact the longest of several seasons in the pro grid circuit. In rolling up that string of victories the Green Bay outfit has rolled up the astounding total of 168 points, and that performance was done against such opposition as the Chicago Cardinals, Detroit Lions, Chicago Bears and the strongest clubs of the circuit.

The Green Bay outfit comes here not dependent upon the tossing arm of Herber, which last year set a new record for the league. The power-house running of Clark Hinkle, former Bucknell star, is just as effective as Herber and

these two ball carriers to tighten the defense Herber and Monnett have been even more damaging than usual on their passes to Don Hutson, former Alabama all-America end who set a new league record in pass receiving last fall.

GREEN BAY LEADS IN OFFENSE

The Green Bay Packers, who meet the Giants here next Sunday, have been setting a sensational pace in scoring and ground gaining during the past six weeks. After a slow start the Packers have been irresistible of late rolling up 168 points in scoring six straight wins.

That is the toughest task the Giant defense has yet been called upon to face. New York continues to set a record making effort in holding opposing teams to low scores and with three shutouts has set something of a record by not having a touchdown scored upon it in the last four games. If they continue the present defensive pace the league record low total is within the grasp of the Polo Grounders. In 1934 the Cardinals had only 1578 yards made against them.

Washington with Slingin' Sam Baugh at the tossing end continues to be the best aerial squad of the circuit. The Redskins have completed 69 out of 158 passes for 43% average, while the league as a whole has seen 494 tosses out of 1318 completed for a 42% average, one per cent ahead of last year's record of 41% efficient.

KNOW PRO FOOTBALL

Complete records of all players and teams of the National Football League, the playing code and other pertinent information regarding pro football is contained in the National Football League Guide which can be obtained at all Spalding's stores and also in most other sporting goods stores.

THE NATIONAL FOOTBALL LEAGUE

Following are the major differences in rules between professional and college football games:

The goal posts are placed on the goal line.

The ball must be put in play at least 15 yards in from the sideline, being moved 15 yards in after any play that ends closer than 15 yards to the nearest sideline.

The penalty for clipping from behind is 25 yards.

The ball is NOT dead when a player slips or is thrown to the ground, the ball being in play until the whistle is blown.

Defensive linemen are allowed to use their hands on the head, face or bodies of offensive players.

Fumbles, except on punts or lateral passes, may be advanced. Punts and lateral pass fumbles may be advanced only after "possession and advance" has been established.

Substitutes may talk with teammates immediately upon entering the game.

A forward pass may be thrown from any spot behind the line of scrimmage.

On a forward pass followed by an illegal lateral pass (the second pass being forward instead of lateral or backward) the ball is put in play at a point 5 yards behind where the illegal pass was thrown.

On the kickoff the receiving team does NOT have to have five men within its 45 yard line.

The flying block and flying tackle are permitted.

Penalties within the ten-yard line are only half the distance to the goal line.
