#### INDIVIDUAL RECORDS

Two of the greatest forward passers of the country face each other here today when Arnold (Flash) Herber, Green Bay ace, starts throwing the leather against Harry Newman, the Giants' aerial star. Herber has a slight edge on Newman according to league statistics in completed passes. Herber has completed 35 in 85 tosses for a 41 per cent average to gain 435 yards. Newman has gained more yardage, 610 yards, but has completed only 31 passes. Glenn Presnell, Portsmouth star, has also completed 31 tosses but has gained only 554 yards on his aerials.

Ken Strong, Giant scoring ace, is tied for the lead in the individual race with Presnell. They both have tallied 55 points. Buckets Goldenberg, Jewish fullback of the Green Bay squad, is fourth in point getting with 42 points, two less than Jim Musick of Boston.

In the past week Newman fell to fourth place among the ground gainers as Presnell pulled his total up to 419 yards, to Newman's 393 yards. Cliff Battles has a big lead on his teammate, Musick, in the race for leading honors. Battles has piled up the remarkable total of 695 yards, to 564 for Musick.

Roy Grove, former Michigan State quarterback now with the Packers, is one of the three leading pass receivers of the circuit. Grove, Bill Hewitt of the Bears, and Paul Moss, Purdue All-American now with Pittsburgh, have each caught thirteen tosses. Moss, who faces the Giants here next Sunday in the last home game of the season, has gained the most yardage, however, with 263 yards.

#### SCHOOLBOY KICKING CONTESTS

Five Bronx schools will be represented today in the scholastic drop-kicking contest sponsored by the New York Giants between the halves. The winner will qualify for the final competition next Sunday against five other sectional winners. Dominick Cafaro or Bob Stevenson, of DeWitt Clinton; George Hutchinson or Paul Screvani, of Monroe; Boris Lyons, of Evander; Tom Chase, of Roosevelt, and Andrew Brogan, of Morris, are the Bronx competitors.

Those who have qualified for the final of the Brickley Trophy contest are Frank Goodell, of Curtis; Martin Remore, of Fort Lee; Dave Hertzson, of Far Rockaway; Robert Brossmer, of Riverdale, and Jack Moller, of Mt. Vernon. Moller and Brossmer kicked five goals out of five trials in winning their sectional trials.

In all instances other than in the exceptions noted herein the rules of the National Intercollegiate Athletic Association are to be followed.

#### KICK-OFF AND FREE KICK

- 1. The receiving team may line in any position beyond the ten yard restraining line.
- 2. It is permissible for the kicking team to use a natural tee made from the soil in the immediate vicinity of the point of kick-off.

#### FLYING BLOCK AND TACKLE

The flying block and flying tackle are permitted.

#### FORWARD PASS

The passer may pass the ball from any point behind the line of scrimmage.

#### TIME OUT

Officials must notify the captain of each team when time has been out three (3) times-and no penalty is to be imposed for additional time out unless such notice has been given.

#### DEAD BALL

In Rule 7—Section 7—Article (1a) of the Intercollegiate rules omit the words "when any portion of his person except his hands or feet touches the ground."

#### PERSONAL FOULS

Use of hands-in Rule 10-Section 2-Article 1-Item 2 of the Intercollegiate Rules, omit the words "players on defense may not strike the opponent on the head, neck, or face with the palms of their hands."

#### CLIPPING

The penalty for clipping shall be 25 yardsofficials shall enforce this rule to the letter.

#### GOAL POST

The goal posts shall be placed on the goal-line instead of ten yards beyond.

divergent types of play according to league statistics.


The Packers have thrown the most fowards, 143, and because
of the amazing accuracy of Arnold (Flash) Herber, have completed
the most, 63, for an average of 44%. Brooklyn has completed 55
in 120 for an average of 45% but has played three less games.
On defense, the Packers are tied with Portsmouth for honors.
The Packers have yielded only 1,571 yards in ten games, the
Spartans 1,408 in nine. Only the New York Giants have a better
record in making points, the Giants having scored 170 to 148 for
the Wisconsin eleven. Boston continues to stand out as the
offensive leader with 2,385 yards gained in ten games.


