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THE 1938 SEASON OF THE NATIONAL FOOTBALL LEAGUE comes to a close today marking the end of the most successful chapter in the history of professional football with bigger crowds and we think better competition.

It is the aim of the club owners in the National League to strive to merit your patronage by continuing to improve the caliber of competition and take any further steps which tend to increase the popularity of the game for the spectators.

This is the close of the fourteenth season for the New York Giants and the windup of the eighteenth season in the National League for Green Bay, one of the original members.

No major sport in the United States has shown such a growth in popular appeal in such a short time and we trust that the game will continue to merit your approval.

Every team in the league is bending its efforts to strengthen its squad and for that reason we feel confident the type of football played by National League teams is constantly improving.

One of the greatest achievements in sports is being recognized today in the awarding of the Gruen Trophy as the outstanding player of professional football to Mel Hein, captain and center of the New York Giants. President Joe F. Carr of the National League will make the presentation of this trophy before the start of the game today and it will be a fitting tribute to one of football's all-time greats, a player who has made the all-league team for the past five years and will probably be recognized again this season for the sixth consecutive time with this distinction.

The rule changes initiated by the professional league such as allowing forward passing from any point behind the line of scrimmage; of moving the ball in fifteen yards from the sidelines; of replacing the goal posts to the goal line; of permitting players to run with recovered fumbles; and other minor differences were effected for the purpose of increasing the offensive possibilities of football. We think no football fan is interested in scoreless or any kind of tie games and pride ourselves on the scarcity of deadlocks since these changes were instituted.

The growth of the game in popularity has brought disappointment to some fans in not being able to secure seats in the desirable locations. Please remember next fall that it costs you nothing extra to reserve your seats for every game and then you are sure of the same seat no matter what the crowd.

This year for the first time the championship team of the National League will play a team composed of professional stars assembled on one squad. This game is to be contested in the Los Angeles Coliseum under the sponsorship of the Los Angeles Times. Balloting is now in progress to pick the players for the all-star pro team which will face the winner of today's titular contest.

For your convenience a ballot is printed in the back page of this program. Why not cast a vote for your favorites remembering that league rules prohibit more than three players from a single team competing on the all-star aggregation. Name your team and mail it to the Los Angeles Times.

## SIX NEW RECORDS SET

Six National Football League team records were shattered during the 1938 season, according to final statistics announced today. Three new marks were established for team forward passing, and one for team scoring. The other two standards were for total league scoring and total league forward passing.

The Green Bay Packers, winners of the Western championship, retained titles in ground gaining and scoring with 3,037 yards gained and 223 points. The Packers scoring total breaks their own 1937 eleven game mark of 220 points.

The Chicago Cardinals displaced the Washington Redskins as the forward passing champions, although Washington tied them with 114 completions for a new league mark. The Cardinals threw 240 for a 47.5 per cent average while Washington threw 248 for a 45.9 per cent average.

The New York Giants, Eastern Division winners, set a new league efficiency mark with 91 completions out of 186 for 48.9 per cent. The old mark was 46.7 per cent, made by Brooklyn in 1933. Green Bay completed the same number of passes as New York, but threw 210, to finish among the leaders.

The Giants took the defensive titles shared last year by Detroit and Chicago Bears, allowing opponents only 79 points and 2,029 yards. Detroit allowed opponents 2,102 yards in 1937 and Chicago Bears had 100 points scored against them last season.

Every team in the league, with the exception of Green Bay, completed more passes than they did last season and as a result there were 824 completions out of 2,030 tosses for the entire league, an efficiency of 40.5 per cent, and a new record. The old mark made last year was 594 passes out of 1,543 for 38.5 per cent. Last year's league mark of 1,424 points scored by the ten teams was also broken this season when 1,484 points were tallied.

# DANOWSKI SETS TWO RECORDS

Three new individual National Football League records were established and two tied as all five of the 1937 titleholders were displaced in 1938. Ed Danowski, New York Giants and former Fordham ace, established new passing efficiency marks for a single season and improved his lifetime record, in recapturing the forward passing leadership he held in 1935.

Gaynell Tinsley, former L. S. U. end, now with the Chicago Cardinals, shared in breaking the record for the longest gain on a forward pass with a 98 yard gain on a pass from Dougal Russell, and also tied the mark for number of passes caught, with 41. Don Hutson, Green Bay Packers end, tied his own mark for most touchdowns in one season, with nine.

Danowski recaptured his title from Sammy Baugh, Washington. He completed 70 out of 129 for an efficiency mark of 54.2 per cent, breaking his own efficiency mark of 50.4 per cent made in 1935. He also improved his lifetime National League efficiency mark from 48.3 per cent to 49.8 per cent, having completed 255 passes out of 512 thrown in five seasons.

Baugh, who played two less games than Danowski, completed 63 passes, the same number as Ace Parker, Brooklyn, but had an efficiency of 49.2 per cent as compared with 42.5 per cent for Parker. Parker's 865 yards gained on the throwing end of passes was the highest of the season.

Whizzer White, Colorado U. Rhodes Scholar All-America, playing his first and last season of major league football, was the only recruit to capture a title in 1938. He gained 567 yards in 152 attempts to take the ground gaining championship held last year by Cliff Battles, Washington, who retired to coach at Columbia University this season.

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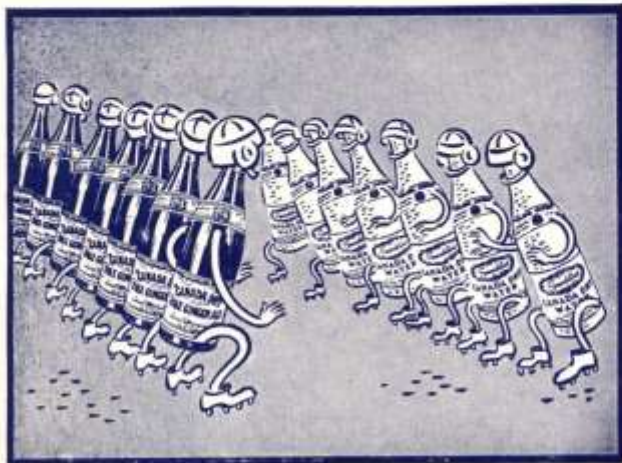
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## PRO RULES

There are differences in rules for games played in the National Football League and under intercollegiate rules. We would like to call your attention to these major differences:

1. The goal posts are on the goal line (not ten yards back).
2. Forward passes are permitted from any point to the line of scrimmage (not thrown from five yards behind line).
3. The penalty for a forward pass thrown beyond the line of scrimmage is loss of down and five yards from the spot such pass is made.
4. A forward pass on fourth down is not a touchback if it goes over the goal line providing the pass originated outside the 20-yard line. In other words if the pass was thrown from the 25-yard line on fourth down it reverts to the defending team at that point.
5. On a kickoff the receiving team is not required to have five players within five yards of the restraining line. Kickers are permitted to use tees in making kickoffs.
6. The penalty for clipping is 25 yards (not 15).
7. The ball is not dead when the runner touches the ground unless definitely in the grasp of an opponent and all forward progress stopped.
8. Substitutes may talk to teammates immediately on entering game.
9. Any two players of either team may re-enter the game once in the fourth quarter.
10. When a penalty is inflicted inside the 10-yard line it shall be only half the distance to the goal line.





# LEEMANS, ISBELL BEST GAINERS

THERE is little to choose between Tuffy Leemans, ace ball carrier for the New York Giants, and Cecil Isbell, who holds the same role on the Green Bay eleven, in comparing the two prior to the clash between the Eastern and Western titleholders.

Leemans has gained 463 yards to 445 for the Packer rookie but Isbell has a five-yard average as compared to Leemans' average of four yards. Hank Soar, who shares running honors with Leemans in the Giant attack, has gained 401 yards, some 100 more than Clarke Hinkle, Green Bay's all-league fullback.

Danowski holds a decided edge in forward passing as compared to Cecil Isbell, Bob Monnett and Arnie Herber. The Giant flinger has completed 70 in 129 for 848 yards. Monnett is the most consistent of the Packer tossers for he has completed 31 of 57.

Ward Cuff holds the edge in field goal kicking over Hinkle and Tiny Engebretsen having kicked five in nine attempts. In pass catching no Giant can begin to compare with Don Hutson, all-league end, who has snared 32 passes even though he missed the last game of the season two weeks ago. His teammate, Hinkle, has scored one more point, however, and so leads him 58 to 57 in final individual point making records for 1938.
