STOP THOSE REDSKINS

That is the task now confronting the New York Giants and it is not going to be any easy job either. The Giants must beat the defending champions if they hope to gain the playoff for the National Football League title and the Ed Thorp Memorial Trophy.

New York must win from the Dodgers on Thursday over at Ebbets Field and then go on to turn back the Redskins invasion on Sunday, December 4.

Few who saw the struggle here last fall when the Washington eleven took the Eastern crown in that memorable, 49 to 14, struggle will want to miss this renewal. Certainly the Giant players haven't forgotten that defeat and though it was partially atoned for in Washington earlier this fall the title is the objective and both teams will be at their peak for this one.

The rivalry between the Giants and the Redskins since Ray Flaherty took over the helm of the Marshall forces has been intense. The present clash, carrying with it title import, will be just as tough a battle, no doubt. Of equal importance to New York, too, is that struggle over at Ebbets Field on next Thursday.

The manner in which the Dodgers rallied in the second half against the Giants here earlier this fall indicates that this will also be a tough battle. Certainly the Brooklyn eleven on its home field is a far tougher nut to crack than it is here, as the 13-13 tie which the Giants just managed to get over there last fall indicates. The Dodgers are not out of the title scramble yet, either, so it behooves New York to win that one.

The invasion of the Redskins a week from next Sunday will give Polo Grounds fans their first look at some of the sensa-

tional rookie backs who have been helping keep the champions in the title race. Bill Hartman, former Georgia back, has been an outstanding passer on several occasions when Sammy Baugh was out of action. His tosses very nearly upset the Giants in the closing minutes down in Washington last month. Andy Farkas

is certainly one of the most dangerous runners in the league and his place as fourth best ground gainer of the circuit speaks volumes for the former Detroit U. star's ability to lug the apple.

Automatic Karamatic, another rookie sensation from Gonzaga, has also been a prominent figure in several Redskins victories and gave the Giants a lot of trouble, too.

Needless to say stopping Washington still means that the Giants must check Sammy

Baugh. It was Sammy's brilliant passing that proved their undoing last season and Slingin' Sam is still the most feared man on the championship team. Tex Malone's great pass catching is still a potent factor too and has put him among the leading receivers once more and no one who saw him score what proved the deciding touchdown last fall can forget how Ed Justice can gather in those aerials either.

All in all this is the one game that you shouldn't miss all season. And we advise you to get your reserved seats EARLY. More than 20,000 people are expected to come from Washington alone so don't delay getting your seats. The ticket sale opens next Friday, Nov. 25, in the New York Giants office, 11 West 42nd Street. DANOWSKI TOPS PASSERS

Clarke Hinkle, Green Bay Packers all-league fullback for the past two years and leading scorer of the country with Hunknell in 1929, became the scoring leader of the National Football League during the past week, outting his teammate, Don Hutson, 58 points to 57. Hutson, however, regained honors as the leading pass receiver with a total of 32 catches.

Bill Shepherd, Detroit halfback, continues to lead the ground gainers, boosting his total to 443 yards. Ed Danowski, New York Giants halfback, paces the forward passers with 59 completions in 99 tosses for 717 yards and a 59% efficiency average.

Danowski has already completed two more passes than his previous best year, when he completed 57 to lead the league in 1935. He has also raised his lifetime efficiency from 48% to 50%, an amazing performance for five seasons. Sammy Baugh, Washington, and Jack Robbins of the Cardinals are now tied for second in passing. Baugh has completed 54 out of 108 for 50%, and Robbins 52 out of 97 for 53%.

Scraper Farrell of Brooklyn is second in ground gaining with 388 yards and Cecil Isbell, Green Bay, is third with 377. Ralph Kerecheval, Brooklyn, took undisputed possession of field goal honors, having boosted his total to 5. Regis Monahan, Detroit, and Ward Cuff, New York, are tied for second with 4 each.

PACKERS TIE RECORD

The Green Bay Packers has tied its own National Football League scoring record of 220 points in an eleven-game season and still has today's game. The Giants are the best defensive team with shutouts over the last two opponents and only 69 points tallied against them all season. They have also held the opposition to an average of only 178 yards a game.

Green Bay is second in ground gaining with an average of 270 yards a game, closing up on the Washington Redskins, who continue to lead with an average gain of 280 yards a game. The Giants are third in ground gaining with a 265 average.

The Chicago Bears are second in scoring with 163 points, and New York overtook Washington for third place, 136 points to 133 for the Redskins. The Chicago Cardinals rose from fourth to second in forward passing, having completed 99 out of 211 for a 46% average. The Giants continue to lead with 74 completions in 141 tosses for 52%. Washington is third with 90 out of 198 for 45%.

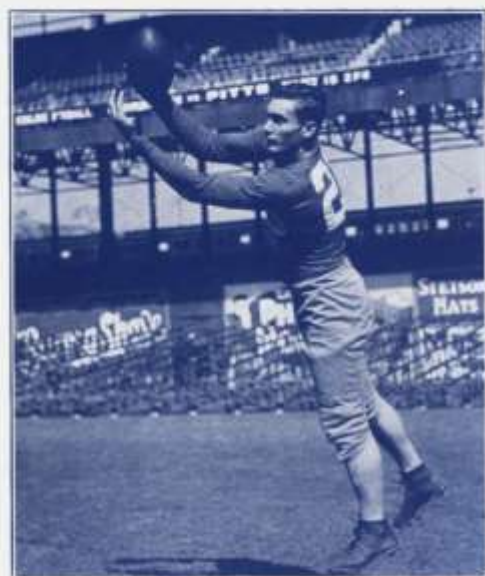

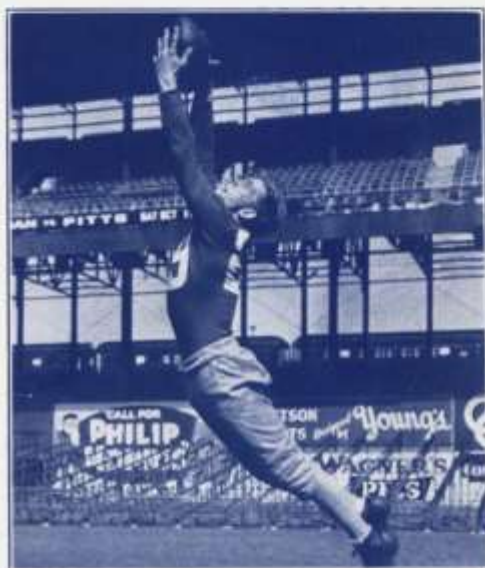

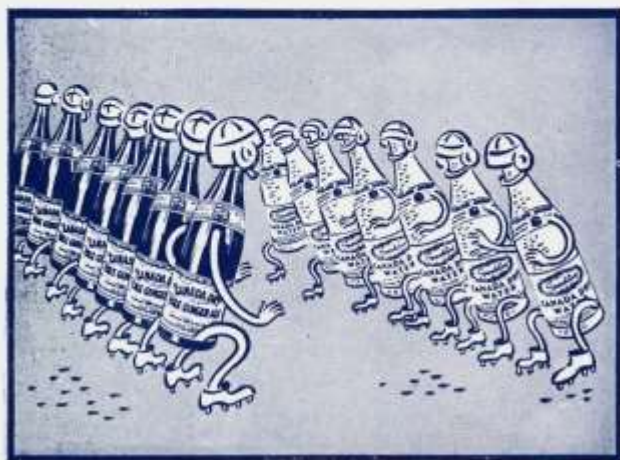

PRO RULES

There are differences in rules for games played in the National Football League and under intercollegiate rules. We would like to call your attention to these major differences:

1. The goal posts are on the goal line (not ten yards back).
2. Forward passes are permitted from any point to the line of scrimmage (not thrown from five yards behind line).
3. The penalty for a forward pass thrown beyond the line of scrimmage is loss of down and five yards from the spot such pass is made.
4. A forward pass on fourth down is not a touchback if it goes over the goal line providing the pass originated outside the 20-yard line. In other words if the pass was thrown from the 25-yard line on fourth down it reverts to the defending team at that point.
5. On a kickoff the receiving team is not required to have five players within five yards of the restraining line. Kickers are permitted to use tees in making kickoffs.
6. The penalty for clipping is 25 yards (not 15).
7. The ball is not dead when the runner touches the ground unless definitely in the grasp of an opponent and all forward progress stopped.
8. Substitutes may talk to teammates immediately on entering game.
9. Any two players of either team may re-enter the game once in the fourth quarter.
10. When a penalty is inflicted inside the 10-yard line it shall be only half the distance to the goal line.

HANK SOAR LEADS GIANTS

Hank Soar is still top ground gainer for the New York Giants, but Tuffy Leemans is keeping pace with the former Providence College star. Soar has gained 304 yards to Leeman's 248. Ed Danowski is not only the leading passer of the Giants and the National League, but he has also climbed to third best among the ball carriers by picking up 198 yards in 39 attempts, almost five yards per attempt.

The Green Bay Packers count heavily upon Cecil Isbell, recruit back from Purdue, in their rushing game. Isbell tops the Packers in rushing with 377 yards in 65 attempts, more than a hundred yards ahead of Clarke Hinkle, all-league fullback, and Joe Laws, his running mate at halfback. Isbell is also the leading Green Bay passer with 32 completions in 72 attempts.

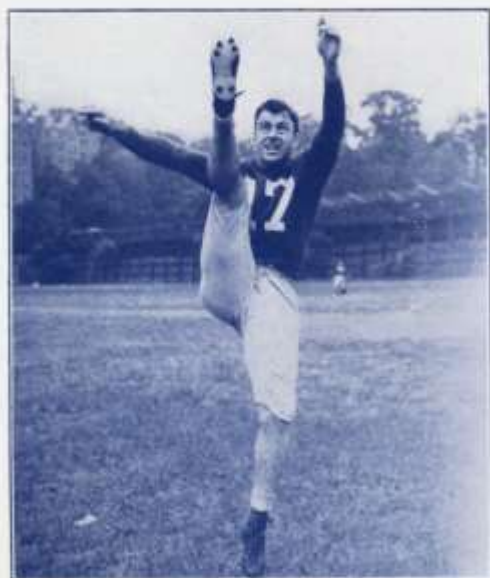

The New York Football Giants have established an annual trophy to be known as the Leonard Grant Memorial to be won outright by a schoolboy football player of the metropolitan area each year.

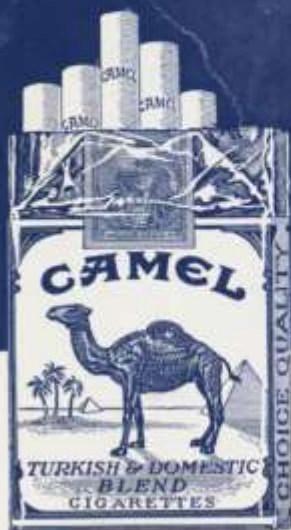
