

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Mel Hein -- Ten Years a Giant

His Day -- December 1

T is with a great deal of pleasure that the New York Giants are able to announce Sunday, December 1, as Mel Hein Day in the Polo Grounds. The Brooklyn Dodgers game

on that day will mark the end of Mel Hein's tenth year in a Giant uniform.

There doesn't seem to have been any slackening in play by the Giant field captain this year and Mel still receives our vote as the best center in the league—the eighth straight season he has been nominated for that honor.

Nothing in modern or ancient football can compare to the record compiled by the New York leader. Playing in the toughest competition ever assembled Hein has more than held his own each year

against the onslaught of younger talent and still he holds his position as top ranking alltime center of football.

Honors are not new to Mel for he received the Gruen award as the league's outstanding player and sportsman in 1938, and the following fall he was honored similarly with the Joe F. Carr Memorial Award when the Giants participated in the Chicago All-Star game.

This day, two weeks hence however, should

be a memorable one for Mel Hein and his many friends and supporters through the past ten years. Adopting the suggestion contained in Dan Parker's and Bob Considine's column some enthusiastic Giants fans, who have missed few games, have formed a representative committee and ask that you join them in making this a real tribute from the fans and spectators as well as from the New York Giants.

Herman Bergasse of 60 Beaver Street, New York, heads the committee which hopes to make De-

cember 1, 1940, a memorable one for Captain Mel Hein. If you concur in their sentiments the Mel Hein Day Committee suggests that you add your contribution to those which have already been made. All contributions no matter how small will help to make this tribute to Hein a real success.

GIANTS TOP IN DEFENSE

The Washington Redskins, who play here next Sunday, established two new National Football League one-game passing records against Brooklyn a week ago with 25 completions for 312 yards. This brought their total for the season to 118 completions in 195 tosses for 60% efficiency, the highest number of completions in that club's history and only 9 away from the league record of 127 made by Cleveland last year.

Philadelphia regained second place in passing over Green Bay during the week with 98 out of 238. Green Bay has 91 out of 218. Both have a 41% average. Washington remains the best offensive team with 2670 yards gained and 218 points. Green Bay with 2525 yards and 172 points and the Bears with 2210 yards and 157 points are second and third in ground gaining and scoring.

Opponents have gained only 1458 yards against the Giants, completed 35% of their passes against the Cardinals and scored only 91 points against Brooklyn, making these clubs the best defensive units.

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Sammy Baugh on Way to Record

SAMMY BAUGH, sensational Washington Redskins passer who will toss his aerial bombshells against the New York Giants in the Polo Grounds next Sunday, is well on his way to new passing records.

Against the Brooklyn Dodgers last Sunday Baugh completed 23 passes to break the single game standard set a year ago by Davey O'Brien. At his present pace he will easily set three new season records too. The Redskins star flinger has completed 91 of 140 passes for 1208 yards and 11 touchdowns. This represents an efficiency mark of 68%, a truly remarkable achievement and some-

os%, a truly remarkable achievement and some-thing to give Coach Steve Owen of the Giants plenty of headaches all next week. Eddie Miller, midget Giant back, is second to Baugh in aerial effectiveness with 35 completions in 71 attempts for 555 yards, while Cecil Isbell of Green Bay and Sid Luckman of the Bears are tied for third place. for third place.
In addition to Baugh's passing honors the Red-

skins star is the top punter of the circuit with a 48-yard average and his runback of 84 yards on

48-yard average and his runback of 84 yards on intercepted passes is the best in the league.

Whizzer White of the Detroit Lions is still top ground gainer of the circuit but Tuffy Leemans after a two week absence because of injury is now back in second place. Leemans gained 101 yards against the Rams last Sunday and now has 340 yards to White's 409 yards.

Leemans on Top Again

Tuffy Leemans came back to action last Sunday with a rush and as a result has passed Walt Nielsen for top ground gaining honors among the Giant backs. Tuffy now has 340 yards to Nielsen's 269 yards, with Eddie Miller also in the 200 yard class.

Miller is the top passer among the Giants by a wide margin having completed 35 in 71 for almost a 50% average. His tosses have gained 505 yards and the little quarterback will have a chance to better this mark next week when he returns to action. It is doubtful if his injured leg will permit him to see much

action against the Packers.

Leland Shaffer has tied Ward Cuff for pass catching honors and since Cuff is through for the season is apt to lead in that department, while Cuff's five field goals and his 36 points are so far ahead of his teammates that there is not much danger of him being eclipsed. It will, however, seriously interfere with Cuff's hope of being top field goal booter of the circuit for the third straight year.

Hutson and Hinkle Tops

Don Hutson, brilliant pass catching end, is top man of the Green Bay football team in scoring and pass catching while Clarke Hinkle, veteran fullback, is tops in ground gaining and field goal booting. Cecil Isbell and Arnie Herber take care of most of the passing in better than creditable fashion.

Hutson with 35 catches is only six behind his season's record total of 41 catches in 1937, and his 41 points scored is topped by only two players in the league, Dick Todd and Jimmy Johnston of Washington, who have scored one point more or 42 points.

Hinkle with 244 yards gained has averaged better than three yards per attempt and has booted five field goals in eight attempts which effort ties Ward Cuff's mark at present.

Difference in Rules Between Professional and Collegiate Football

The National Football League Rules Committee has made several changes in the rules for 1940, the most important of which reduces the penalty for clipping from 25 yards to 15 yards. Another important change prevents a team, incurring a penalty, from being penalized more than half the distance to the goal when the penalty is enforced in the field of play.

In professional football, the goal posts are on the goal lines; in collegiate, ten yards back of the goals on the end lines.

In professional football, passes may be thrown from any point behind the line of scrimmage. In collegiate football, they must be thrown from any point at least five yards behind the line of scrimmage.

Professional football does not recognize the "dead ball" rule. In collegiate football if any portion of the ball-carrier's body, excepting his hands or feet, touches the ground the ball is dead at that point. This is not so in professional football.

In professional football the defensive team may recover and advance the ball on fumbles, except where a backward pass has been attempted, or a punt is being received.

Flying blocks and flying tackles are permitted in the professional game.

Professional substitute players may communicate with their team mates immediately upon entering the game. College players must wait one play before communicating.

In professional football no penalty can be more than half the distance to the goal, instead of to the one-yard line.

In professional football defensive players are permitted wider latitude in the use of open hands on opposing players' necks and head without penalty. This rule prohibits striking but does allow the use of hands to force offensive blockers off balance.

In professional football a team is allowed to substitute in the fourth quarter only at the most three players who have previously played in the same quarter. This is not allowed under college rules.

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
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
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
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
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
