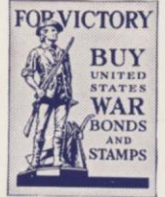

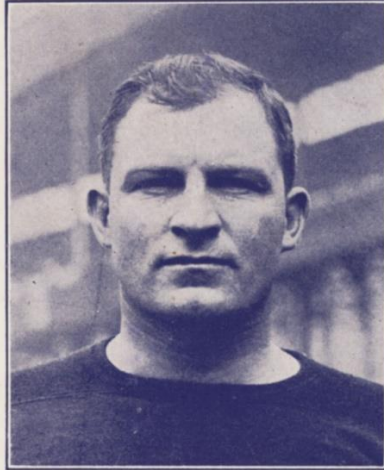

THERE have been all sorts of "days" in honor of members of the playing forces of the New York Giants. But not yet has there been an afternoon set aside for a gesture of appreciation to Steve Owen, coach of the football outfit. Let this, then, be Steve Owen Day. Though, as a matter of fact, it is Owen Day every day the Polo Grounds eleven gets into action.

It is particularly fitting that there be an Owen Day in the waning of this season, because if ever a manager and coach of a National League team had his hands full, Steve has this Fall.

If a coach of a club which makes it a habit to finish in the lower brackets has trouble,—well, he is used to it, and so are his clients. But Owen went into this season with the habitual standing of his team high and lustrous.

Against this background of brilliant achievement, Owen found himself running into difficulties right from the start. The war. It took men. It took them fast, and it took players who rated among the best the Giants—and the National League—had boasted in years.

It took young players, the very sinew and the very speed of the club. It took men like Eshmont and Franck. Other clubs, too, of course, were hit. But the Giants suffered the most severe blows. At least, so it looked to New York.

Owen had to rebuild with inexperienced players. Inexperience in so far as professional competition was concerned. Three years of outstanding performance on a great college eleven merely prepare a man for the playing of football as it is played by the pros.

Owen had to plug this gap, and make up for that loss, and with all his trouble, today has a really fine team. Those of you who saw the game with the Redskins last week know how it was touch and go, and how the Giants very easily could have won or tied, instead of losing 14 to 7.

Give a hand, then, to Stout Steve, a grand guy and a great football coach and handler of men. The years come in and the years roll out, but Owen keeps rolling along, high in the esteem of the football public in general, and the New York fans in particular.

Then, this is emphatically Steve Owen Day!

Brooklyn Dodgers, 17; Giants, 7.

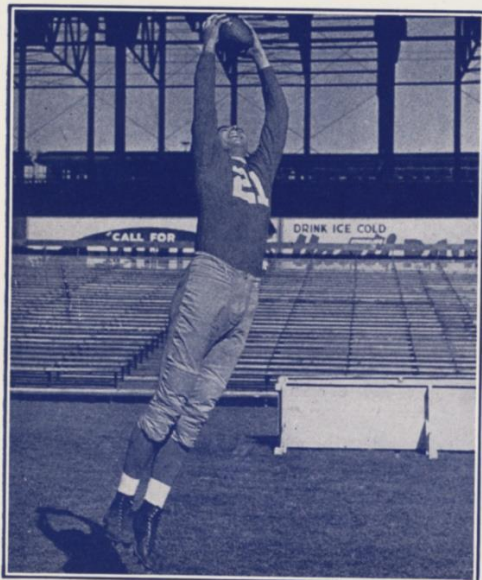
