The newcomer is Calligaro, a husky back from Wisconsin. Calligaro has worked right into the Owen scheme, and has done even better than Stout Steve had expected.

Barker is the young man from Arkansas, a 195 pounder who joined National League forces for the 1942 season, and has done mighty well.

Avedisian is a 205 pound guard who arrived in Harlem from Providence. Playing for a small college, Chuck got comparatively little notice in the public prints. But Steve had spied him out, and Avedisian certainly has lived up to all the high hopes held out for him by his coach.

Calligaro is one of ten new players among the Giants. The other nine are Bill Petrilas, back; Johnny Weiss, end; Arnie Herber, who was with the Packers for 11 years before coming here, Howie Livingston, the sensational back from California, Hap Sivell, former Brooklyn guard, Herb Kane, tackle, Keith Beebe, Occidental back, Frankie Damiani, Manhattan tackle, and Rollie Caranci, Colorado tackle.
