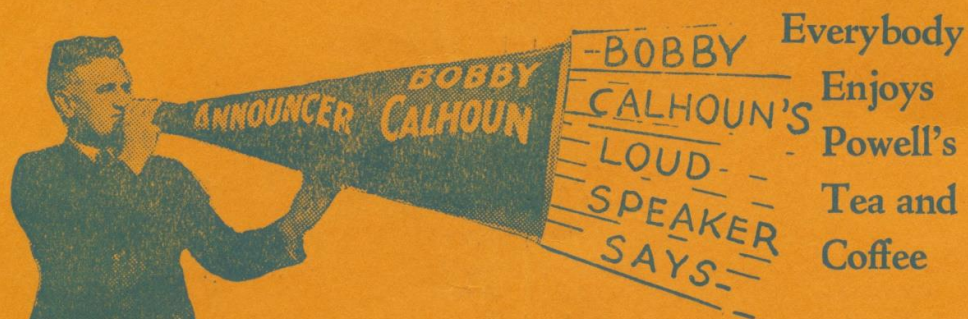

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Pere Marquette Has Won 61 Games, Lost 9 and Tied 11

Since Organization in 1919

The name of Knute Rockne is a byword in college football circles. His fame has spread far and wide over this broad land, but few followers of the noted grid mentor know that he was a famous pro grid star.

After graduating from Notre Dame, Rockne joined the Canton Bulldogs with Jim Thorpe, Guyon, Calac and other noted stars in the backfield. Naturally Rockne played end and his team mate on the other side of the line was none other than Tom Whalen, of Georgetown University.

Whalen also has been a successful college coach, having directed the elevens of Indiana University and Washington University. In the summer time he turns to baseball and has just piloted the Lynn team to the championship of the New England League. Several neighborhood boys played on the Lynn team this summer by the way.

The boys from the land of Cod have won 61 games, lost 9 and tied 11 since they were organized in 1919. They have registered 1,254 points against 193 for the opposition.

The Jackets have their work cut out for them with such players as Swede Johnson, giant Vermont fullback and Cy Wentworth in the backfield. Johnson also has played with the Boston Bulldogs in the American League and the Chicago Bears in the National League. Wentworth was with both the New York Giants and Providence Steam Rollers.

In Billy O'Leary, former Old Point Comfort, Va., back the team has the greatest halfback in or out of college in New England. He is called the Red Grange of the East by the Boston papers.

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Jackets Vanquish Dayton Jinx to Win Opening Game Played on Muddy Field

The Yellow Jackets tore into the Triangles on a muddy gridiron and splashed their way to a 6-0 victory to prove the Triangles no longer are any hoodoo.

It was a mighty fine local opening. The boys showed some real football for this early stage of the race and proved conclusively they will be in the thick of the fight and to a finish.

One thing the Jackets showed they possess; fight. And that is 50 per cent of the battle. They fought all the way and that was the reason the Triangles didn't have much of a show.

It seems the Jackets didn't make a mistake when they signed Wally Diehl. The former Bucknell line cracker gave a great account of himself. When he hits the line something is sure to bend.

At Bucknell, Diehl had a fine reputation. But here with that splendid Frankford line to pave the way for him, Diehl will make himself known as a fierce plunger. That fellow has the goods and should be welcomed warmly by Frankford fans.

When Cy Kassel recovered a fumble in the fourth period deep in Dayton territory there was nothing for the Jackets to do but send Diehl at the line. Naturally they did this and the ex-Bucknell star didn't stop until he crossed the final chalk mark.

He hit the line once and gained seven yards. He hit it three more times and when the referee untangled the human mass of wreckage Diehl was found to be buried nose deep into the earth, but the ball was over that final chalk mark.

Charlie Rogers, the great flash, was hand-capped by the muddy condition of the grid-

The outstanding player from a local standpoint is Gibby Welch, who gained fame at Pitt last year. The Panthers, it will be recalled gained some notable triumphs and invariably Welch was the outstanding figure. His wonderful running was responsible for a 21-13 win over Nebraska and while Pitt was beaten at Pasadena in the Tournament of Roses game by Stanford 7-6,

In the game at Providence, Sunday, Welch grabbed a pass Wilson to Conzelman, on his own 38-yard line and raced the remainder of the distance to the goal line for the Yankees' only score.

Some wonderful college players are in the Yanks' lineup, and they threaten trouble for the other teams once they get working together. Besides Welch the backfield includes Kelly, Pritchard, Molenda. Fans should get their tickets early for the Yankees still are a good drawing card as can be attested by the Providence officials, for they drew a big crowd last Sunday even though the game was played in the rain.

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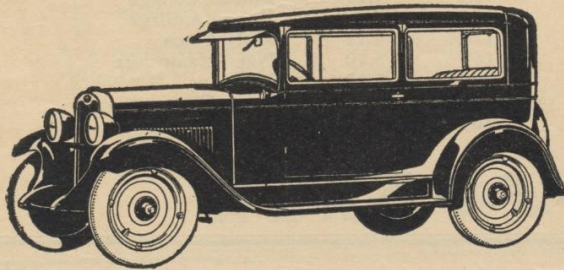
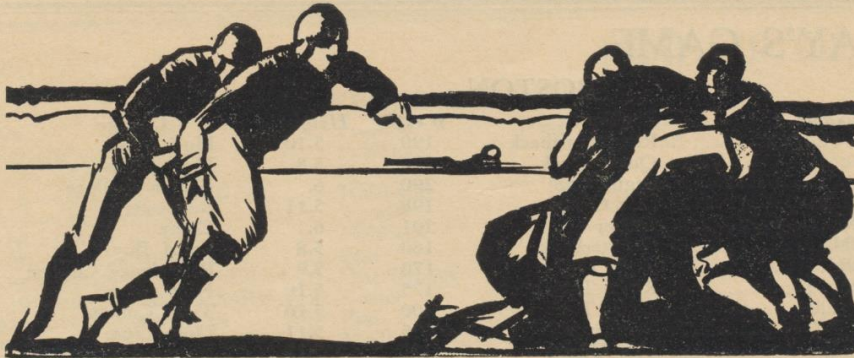

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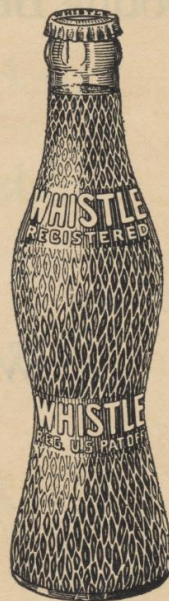
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Dayton Back Here Saturday, October 20; Millville Game Is Changed to October 27

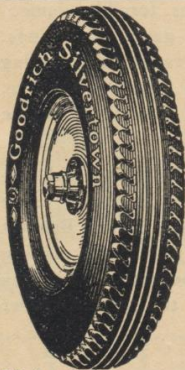
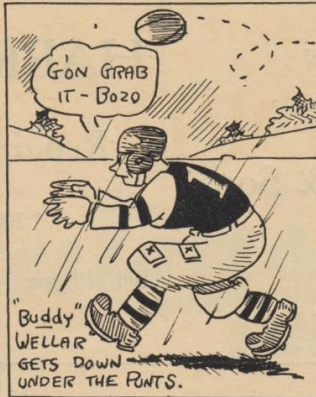
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News of the League

Pottsville fans are satisfied with the showing of the Miners in the game with the Giants. The attendance was more than surprising.

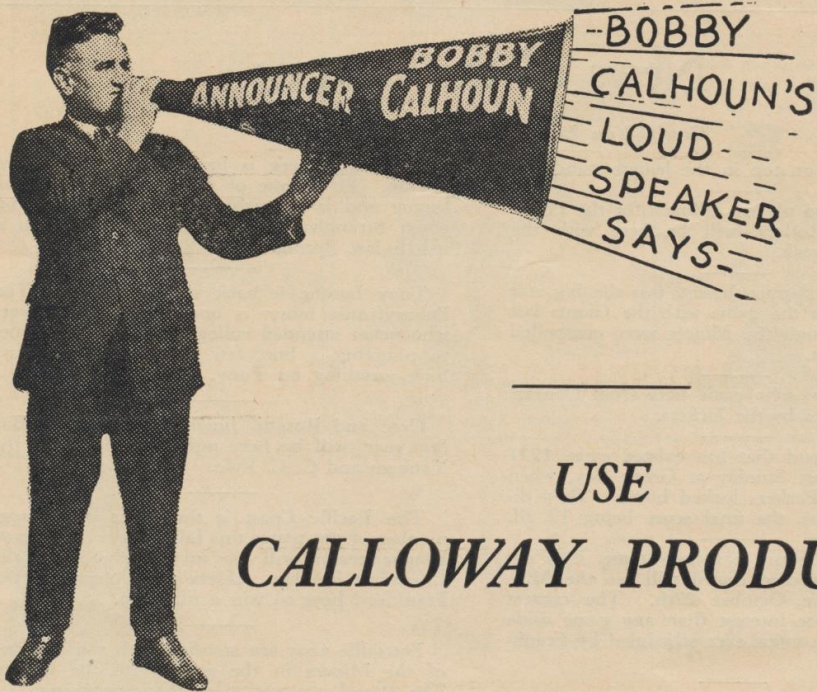
The new halfback with the team today is Dutch Hoffman, who formerly played with the University of West Virginia. He weighs 187 pounds and has a reputation as a great blocking back.

The Chicago Bears, who defeated the Cards last week, were only able to secure a 12-12 tie with Green Bay. Frankford last Sunday defeated the Packers, 19-9.

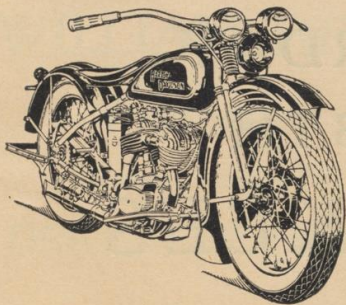
While the Hornets just managed to defeat the Triangles by a single touchdown, the victory was very sweet for Coach Ed. Weir, as the Dayton team long has been the jinx to Frankford and the same jinx seemed to be having a field day on Saturday until near the close of the game.

Pottsville opened the season at home yesterday, losing to the New York Giants, 12-6. The Giants made all their points in the first half, Tony Plansky making the initial score in the first period and Al Bloodgood getting the touchdown in the second period after racing 95 yards through the entire Pottsville eleven.

Moran Stars

Hap Moran, former Yellow Jacket, was the spark that started the lone Pottsville tally in the third quarter. He was the center of a number of short passes, Ernst finally getting the ball and running 25 yards to cross the Giants' goal line. Bruce Caldwell, former Yale star, played part of the game for the winners, but proved of little use, being stopped every time by the Maroons.

The Providence Steam Rollers got off to a good start and smothered the New York Yankees, 20-7. 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SEEING IS BELIEVING

Whenever a poor season or contest happens it is entirely human to come back with, "Wait until next time." This could have been said at the end of last season and also at the start of this year.

Possibly some of the fans thought they would stay away this Fall and the early sale of season tickets was not a record breaker. As reports came in about practices and then the two games away from home—Orange and Green Bay—the interest picked up. The ticket sale jumped as Saturday afternoon approached. Despite the weather Saturday, and it was as bad a day as any ever occurring during football season, the fans turned out.

The attendance was close to four thousand. When that many people sit for two hours and more in the rain it shows interest, real vital interest. If the day had been fine, a record opening-day attendance would have resulted. Under the conditions it was remarkable.

The four thousand were repaid, however. They saw something. Not a game filled with thrills, the weather would not permit that but they saw mid-season performance on the opening day. A well oiled machined working smoothly, everyone in position, every player ready, every man functioning.

Some of the players showed brilliantly but there was no evidence of individual effort to be spectacular, all were playing together. It was real team-work. The plays that gained ground were run back of perfect interference while the break up of the opponents' interference was splendid.

It was not an easy win but a closely contested struggle, just as all Dayton games are. This was one of the deciding factors in bringing Dayton back again on October 20th. That game will be interesting and have more punch if the day is clear and the field dry.

With Dayton scheduled for October 20th, the Millville game has been moved back to the following Saturday, October 27th. The first two games were no setups, Orange has a good team and Green Bay always shows a strong front. Winning on the home grounds of this latter organization meant real playing ability and Saturday's contest demonstrated what is in the wood this year. The Boston game this Saturday while not a League game, gives promise of a real battle as this team looks mighty strong.

There will be improvement as the season progresses but the boys are off to a good start and the outlook at this time is brighter than in previous years.

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
