ANDY FARKAS

Five feet ten and one-half inches in height, 190 pounds in weight and 23 years old, Andy Farkas, the Redskins' ace ball carrier is today probably the No. 1 favorite of Washington's professional football fans. Andy

was the Redskins' leading scorer in 1938 with 37 points and their leading ground gainer with 316 yards. Is the most colorful player in the Washington lineup. He has a peculiar gallop when running and rips and tears for every possible inch of ground. Has a great knack of feinting tacklers out of position, his change of pace and hip-swing-

ing maneuvers making would-be tacklers appear almost foolish at times. When he carries the ball he acts as though his life depended on his gaining a bit of yardage—he tries that hard. He likes to toss aside his head-

gear when the action gets hot. Has been going great guns so far this season, sharing most of the ball-carrying duties with Frank Filchock. Got his college grid background at the University of Detroit where he copped all Midwest honors in 1937, and was picked for the East-West game and later the Chicago All-Star game.

PRO RULES

There are differences in rules for games played in the National Football League and under intercollegiate rules. We would like to call your attention to these major differences:

1. The goal posts are on the goal line (not ten yards back).
2. Forward passes are permitted from any point to the line of scrimmage (not thrown from five yards behind line).
3. The penalty for a forward pass thrown beyond the line of scrimmage is loss of down and five yards from the spot such pass is made.
4. A forward pass on fourth down is not a touchback if it goes over the goal line providing the pass originated outside the 20-yard line. In other words if the pass was thrown from the 25-yard line on fourth down it reverts to the defending team at that point.
5. On a kickoff the receiving team is not required to have five players within five yards

of the restraining line. Kickers are permitted to use tees in making kickoffs.

6. The penalty for clipping is 25 yards (not 15).

7. The ball is not dead when the runner touches the ground unless definitely in the grasp of an opponent and all forward progress stopped.

8. Substitutes may talk to teammates immediately on entering game.

9. Any two players of either team may re-enter the game once in the fourth quarter.

10. When a penalty is inflicted inside the 10-yard line it shall be only half the distance to the goal line.

11. A fumbled ball which strikes the ground may be advanced by an opponent when he recovers it.

12. On out of bounds kickoffs the ball is put in play on the 45-yard line (not the 35-yard line).

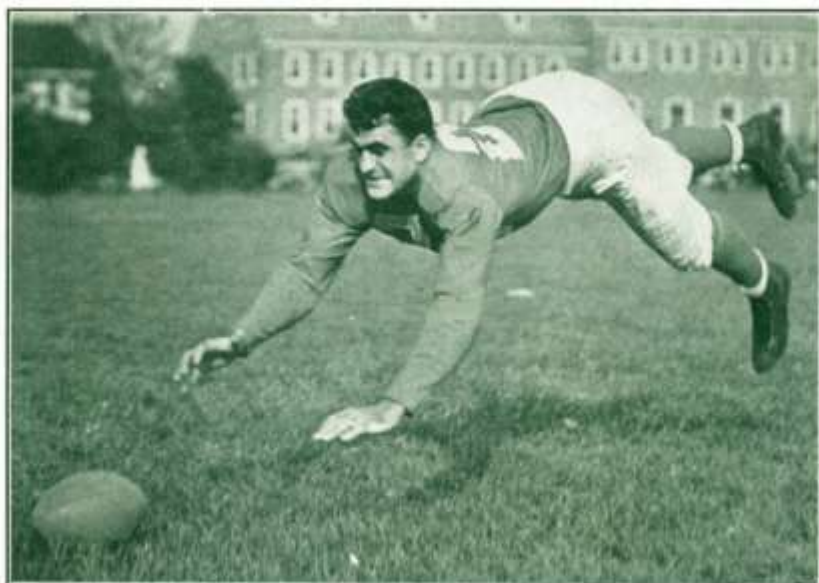

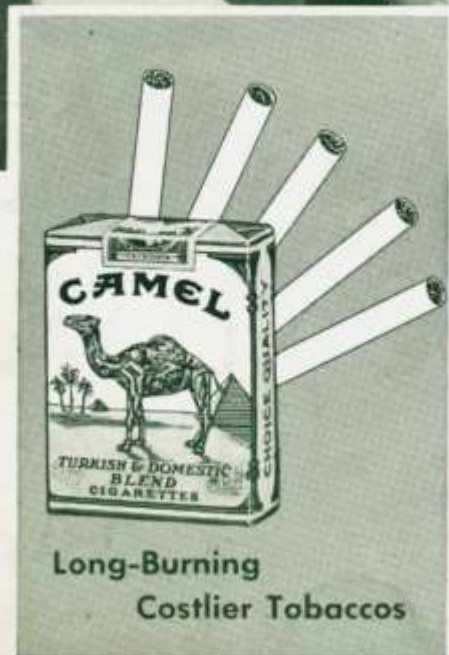
The Redskins are packed with scoring dynamite this season as demonstrated by the 127 points they've rolled up so far against 65 for the opposition.
