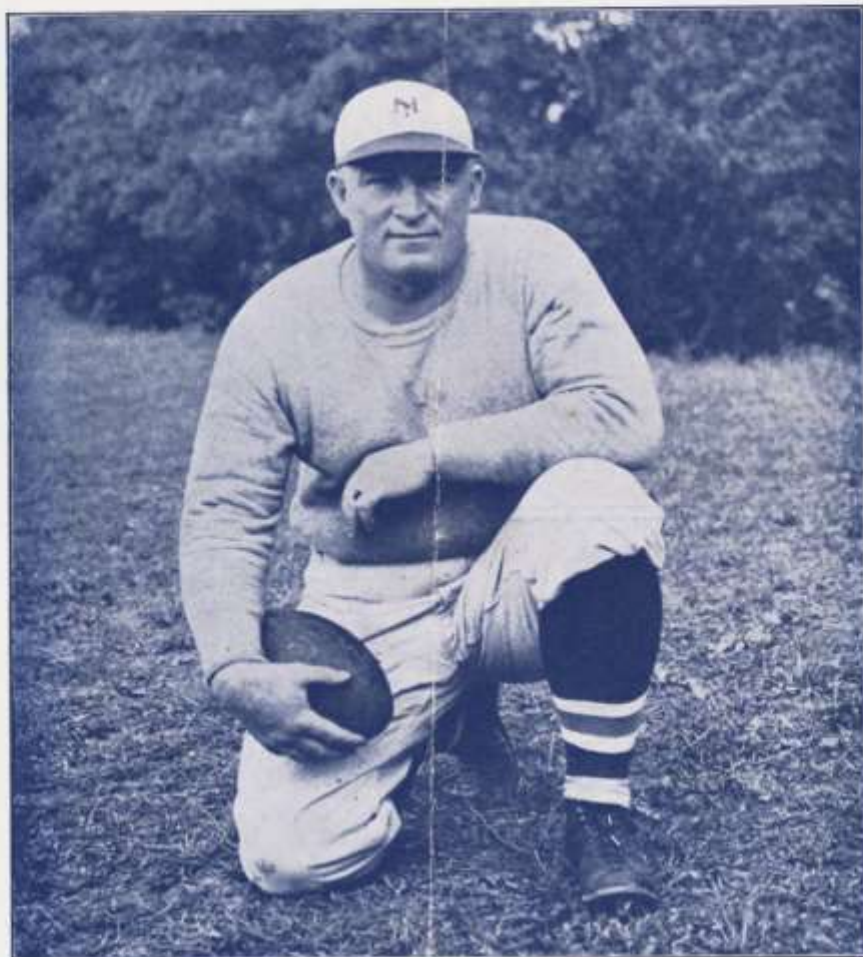

THE FOURTEENTH SEASON

The New York Football Giants tonight inaugurate their fourteenth National League season in the Polo Grounds. Boasting a squad that has the advantage of not being so inexperienced as that of last fall the 1938 edition of the Giants has high hopes of bringing the Eastern and League crown back to New York.

It is no easy task facing the Giants however for the other teams of the league have improved along with the New York eleven and the players know it will be no easy task for them to crash through.

There will be six more regular league games in the Polo Grounds and two on the road. The Giants are away next Sunday in Washington against the championship Redskins and on Thanksgiving Day in Ebbets Field against the Dodgers.

You will see tonight the five newcomers to Giant ranks. Nello "Flash" Falaschi, blocking quarterback; Feets Barnum, husky running, kicking and passing back from West Virginia Wesleyan; Hugh Wolfe, equally husky runner; and two new tackles—Frank Cope of Santa Clara and John Mellus of Villanova, make up the rookie talent. They all measure up to the high standards set by the 14 second year men who so capably earned their varsity chevrons as rookies last fall.

The Giants have their first chance to revenge an unexpected setback when they return to the Polo Grounds a week from next Sunday to meet those surprising Philadelphia Eagles. Next Sunday in Washington the Giants have a vivid memory of an unhappy afternoon last December to carry onto the field with them against the Redskins.

Following the Eagles into the Polo Grounds will be the Brooklyn Dodgers, Chicago Cardinals, Cleveland Rams, Green Bay Packers and Washington Redskins, so the path to the title is no easy one for New York.

EASTERN PLAYERS LEAD

Eastern division players of the National Football League commanded an unprecedented predominance for individual honors in the third week of play. The early season performance of two first all-league team stars and one from the second team is all that deprived the Eastern Division gridirers from a clean-sweep of the nineteen top-ranking posts.

Gaynell Tinsley, Chicago Cardinal end, jumped from fifth to first in pass receiving; Clarke Hinkle, Green Bay fullback, remained in a first place tie for field goal honors; and Don Hutson, Green Bay end, was in a five-way tie for second in scoring. Tinsley and Hinkle were the first all-league selections a year ago, while Hutson made the second team.

The sixteen other top-ranking posts went to Eastern Division players. The first four places in ground gaining went to Max Krause, Washington, 266 yards; Dick Riffe, Philadelphia, 131 yards; Whizzer White, Pittsburgh, 117 yards; and Dave Smulter, Philadelphia, 113 yards.

Another clean sweep was registered in forward passing. Of players participating in two or more games, Ed Danowski, New York, had the best average with 18 out of 29 tosses for 62 percent; Frank Pflueck of the Pirates completed the most—22; and Bill Hartman, Washington, has gained the most yards on his aerials—294.

Andy Farfas, Washington recruit from Detroit U., took the scoring lead with 19 points. His point after touchdown gave him a one point margin over Hutson; White; Krause; and Jay Arnold and Joe Carter, both of Philadelphia. Hinkle is tied with Bill Reissig, and Ralph Kerecheval, both of Brooklyn, for field goal honors with two successful placements. Tinsley has caught 13 passes, three more than Charlie Malone, Washington, and Carter.

GIANTS BEST PASSERS

In a closely contested race for passing honors, four teams in the National Football League have completed 56% of their aerials. The New York Giants have ousted the Washington Redskins for leadership in the third week of play. Washington, however, has ousted old Philadelphia for the scoring lead and retained its advantage for ground gaining laurels.

The Chicago Cardinals and Green Bay Packers have also completed half their aerials, boosting the entire league average to 44.6% which is 6.3% better than the record set in 1927. In less than one-fourth the present season, National League teams have already completed nearly one-half the total number of successful passes of 1927.

New York has completed 22 out of 39 for 56% and the Redskins 30 out of 54 for 55%. The Cardinals' 32 out of 62 tosses is 1% better than Green Bay's 22 out of 44.

Increased yardage on passes has also elevated the league average for ground gaining with Washington holding a slight lead over the Cleveland Browns, 317 yards per game to 296. The Giants are third with a 281 average. The Redskins have tallied 19 points as against 64 for the Eagles and 54 for the Packers.

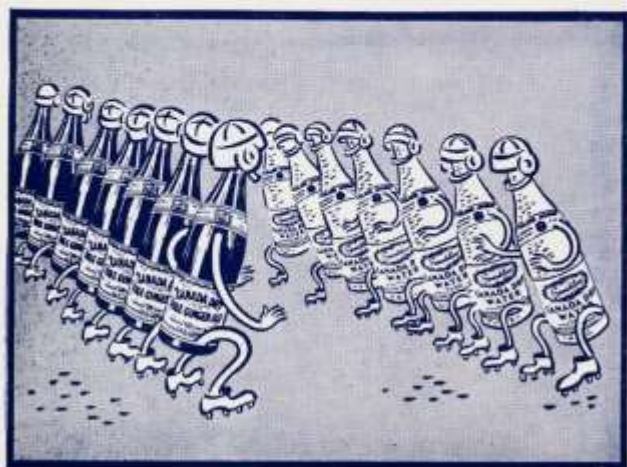

PRO RULES

There are differences in rules for games played in the National Football League and under intercollegiate rules. We would like to call your attention to these major differences:

1. The goal posts are on the goal line (not ten yards back).
2. Forward passes are permitted from any point to the line of scrimmage (not thrown from five yards behind line).
3. The penalty for a forward pass thrown beyond the line of scrimmage is loss of down and five yards from the spot such pass is made.
4. A forward pass on fourth down is not a touchback if it goes over the goal line providing the pass originated outside the 20-yard line. In other words if the pass was thrown from the 25-yard line on fourth down it reverts to the defending team at that point.
5. On a kickoff the receiving team is not required to have five players within five yards of the restraining line. Kickers are permitted to use tees in making kickoffs.
6. The penalty for clipping is 25 yards (not 15).
7. The ball is not dead when the runner touches the ground unless definitely in the grasp of an opponent and all forward progress stopped.
8. Substitutes may talk to teammates immediately on entering game.
9. Any two players of either team may re-enter the game once in the fourth quarter.
10. When a penalty is inflicted inside the 10-yard line it shall be only half the distance to the goal line.

SOAR TOPS GIANTS

Hank Soar has a slight edge in ground gaining over his running mates, Tuffy Leemans and Feets Barnum, in the race for leadership in ground gaining among the New York Giants. Barnum, West Virginia Wesleyan rookie, who is making his league debut before local fans tonight, was top gainer for the Giants against the Eagles a week ago and showed just a trace of what local fans can expect from him before the season is over. There is only three yards difference between the three Giant backs.

Ed Danowski has made a sensational start for the 1938 season. The former Fordham ace is top passer of the league with 18 completions in 29 attempts to gain 247 yards without an interception. Not only is he passing well but he is running the ball effectively as his gain of 28 yards in nine attempts for two games indicates.

Leland Shaffer is topping the Giant pass catches with five snared in two games for 48 yards. Two touchdowns on the receiving end against the Pirates three weeks ago make him high scorer too.

WHITE LEADS PIRATES

Byron "Whizzer" White, Rhodes Scholar star of the Pirates, is the leading ground gainer of the Pittsburgh eleven with 117 yards in 53 attempts. Scrapper Farrell, unheralded fullback from Muhlenberg, is not far behind White with 73 yards in 25 attempts averaging about three yards per plunge.

Frank Filchuck, recruit passer from Indiana, is the leading flinger of the Pirates with 22 completed in 51 attempts to gain 287 yards. White has shown proficiency in the few passes he has tossed too by completing three out of seven attempts.

Eggs Manske, fiery Pirate end who starred for the Bears and Eagles in the Polo Grounds, is the top pass snatcher of the Pittsburgh team with eight catches, one of them scoring against the Giants in Pittsburgh. White is also near the top in this department with seven catches, good for 88 yards. The former Colorado all-American tops his mates in scoring too with three touchdowns for 18 points.

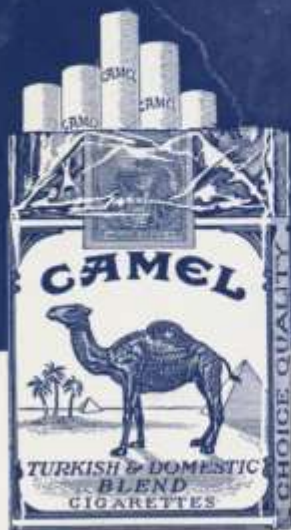
