

Detroit continued its dizzy clip by downing Milwaukee, 21-0, and took undisputed possession of first place with five victories, no defeats and two ties, for a perfect percentage.

Akron, which came east, tied with Detroit for the lead, dropped two games, one to Frankford and one to Pottsville, and tumbled down the ladder to drop into a tie with Providence for sixth place honors.

Pottsville moved up into third place by downing the Akron team, 21-0. The Maroons now have won five games and dropped one, Providence having taken their measure early in the

Frankford dropped from its proud perch right behind the lead to fourth place when it split even, winning from Akron and dropping the Sunday game at Chicago. The Jackets are right on the heels of Pottsville, on half a game away, and a victory today will send them ahead of the iMners.

Green Bay, by losing to the Cardinals, dropped a rung on the ladder to fifth place, being passed by the Cardinals and Pottsville.

History Repeats as Jackets Bow to Chicago Bears by 19-0 Score

CRIPPLED FRANKFORD TEAM UNABLE TO STEM FIERY ATTACK
OF JOE STERNAMAN AND HIS MATES

History repeated itself at Chicago last Sunday, the Chicago Bears again taking a fall out of Frankford, the final figures of the game being 19-0.

The tilt was played in a driving snowstorm, with the home team holding a big advantage over the battered Frankford eleven, which hopped a train for the Windy City immediately following the game with Akron here.

Two touchdowns were scored by the Bears in the initial period of play. Joe Sternaman, as usual, was a tough egg for the Jackets to stop. His runback of a punt to Frankford's twenty-yard line set the stage for the first touchdown of the game, Walquist carrying the ball over. Joe kicked the goal.

Joe was conspicuous in the second touchdown, too. He heaved a thirty-yard pass to Mohart, the big halfback never stopping until he had crossed the line. The third and final touchdown was scored by Ed Sternaman after Mullen had placed the ball within scoring range by grabbing a pass from Sternaman. A pass, Mohart to Mullen, put the ball on the two-yard line and Ed Sternaman rushed it

The Jackets battled gamely but at no time appeared to have a real chance to overcome

the big margin of the Bears. Guy Chamberlin, end and coach, and Charley Harms, right tackle, were unable to make the trip because of injuries received in the Akron game, and their absence hurt the play of the local eleven.

Chicago gets the victory, but the schedule should be credited with an assist. The pep and vim that carried Frankford to victory on Saturday was sapped out of the men by the game here and the long train ride to the western Metropolis.

Hamer was back at fullback and the former Penn captain gave a fine exhibition of football. Stockton, Sullivan, Fitzke and Homan, the other backs used in the game, fought hard throughout but were unable to stem the Chicago avalanche.

The defeat at Chicago dropped the Jackets from second to fourth place and allowed Green Bay and Pottsville to step ahead of Frankford in the league race, with Detroit continuing to head the procession.


