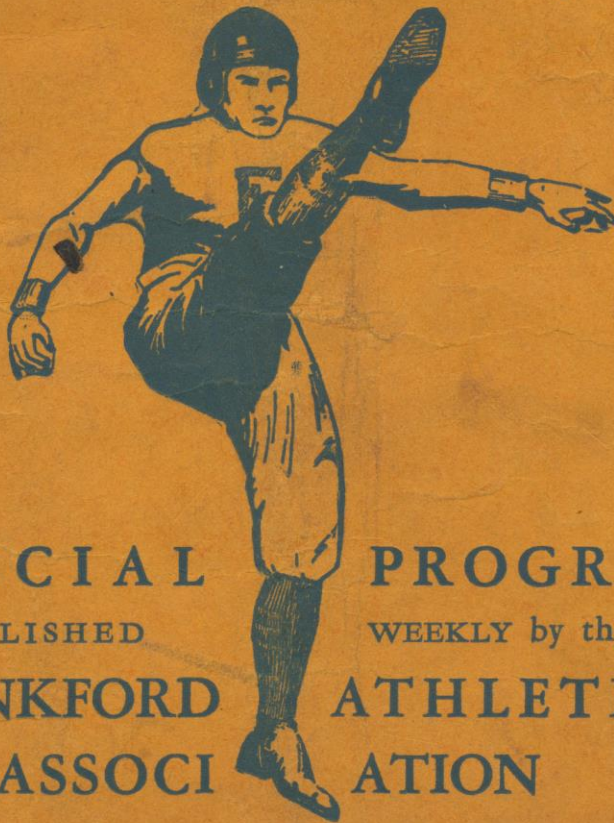

Pottsville and Frankford in Annual Grid Clash Today

Both Grid Rivals of Long Standing Fighting to Keep Out of Cellar. Charlie Rogers to Start at Quarter for Frankford. Kassal, Captain of Illinois Last Year Joins Jackets.

These two ancient rivals enter the game today bent on rendering a decisive victory. Both teams are at the bottom of the ladder in the league standing, but leagues are forgotten when these two elevens meet on the chalk-lined gridiron. Pottsville would rather beat Frankford than win the championship and as a result, point to this game as the biggest on their schedule. In the games played to date, Frankford has the edge in victories but Pottsville is credited with handing Frankford the worst defeat ever inflicted on the local eleven when two years ago they suffered a 49-0 reverse at the hands of the Maroons. Frankford has not forgotten this and are out for revenge, nothing pleasing them better than to use the up-Staters as a stepping stone out of the cellar.

Pottsville, like Frankford, has had tough sailing so far this season, but no matter what their past record is, they are always at their best against Frankford.

With the Maroons this year are Budd, a member of the Champion Yellow Jackets last season, the first to return here this season; "Pete" Henry, formerly of Canton and New York Giants, and the three line-crashing miners whose names are always mentioned when Pottsville is spoken of—Ernst, Latone and Wentz, all pro-grid veterans of the Maroons.

Uncle Charlie Moran, somewhat disheartened by the team record so far, has been drilling his men hard all the week, perfecting team-work and interference for the varied attack that he will launch against the miners.

Charlie Rogers has been calling signals all week and so well has he shown as a signal-caller that he is expected to start at quarter. He had a trial in the last quarter at Providence and the team never worked smoother.

A new-comer to the Yellow Jackets' squad who may see action today is Kassal, captain of Illinois last year. He is an end of exceptional ability.

"Whippet" Carr, quarterback of Buffalo this year is now with Pottsville and will make his second appearance here today.

Providence is making a jump to Chicago on Sunday to tangle with the Bears. The Rollers have a collection of all stars, headed by Wildcat Wilson and they should have enough class to force the Bruins to step along fast.

The N. Y. Giant management expects a capacity house at the Polo grounds on Sunday to see Nevers and his Eskimos perform. The "big Blonde" is a great drawing card with the gridiron enthusiasts in the vicinity of Broadway.

Providence Hands Frankford Fourth Defeat of Season---20-7

*"Wildcat" Wilson, Oden and Conzelman Play Bang-up Game for Steam Rollers.
Mercer Scores for Jackets.*

Frankford, still smarting from the two-game defeat at the hands of the New York Giants, entered the game last Saturday and displaying that championship form of yesteryear, put over a touchdown shortly after the start of the game. Mercer, carrying the brunt of the attack, bucked the line, threw aeriels and almost unaided carried the ball 45 yards to the goal line. His last thrust was a 10-yard slant off-tackle that yielded 6 points. He also kicked the goal. And then the Steam Rollers opened up an overhead offensive that resulted in three touchdowns. "Wildcat" Wilson was on the passing end with Conzelman, Oden and Lynch receiving. Conzelman scored first on a pass, Pritchard kicking the goal and tying the score. Wilson made the second touchdown on a tackle thrust from the 25-yard line. Sonnenberg added the point.

In the third period Conzelman and Lynch carried aeriels to the 15-yard line. Here the brainy Conzelman, the quarterback of the Rollers, tricked the Jackets on a punt formation and Oden skirted left end for the third six-pointer. The try for point was wild.

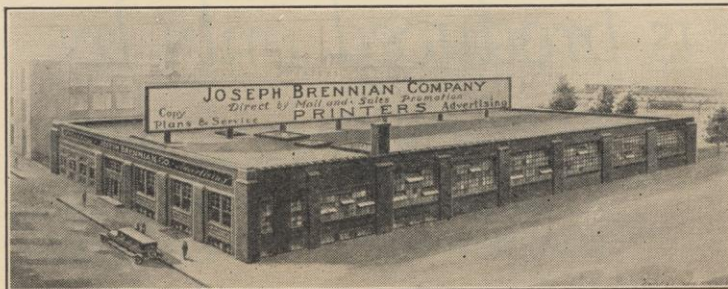
Several times the Jackets threatened the Providence goal line, especially in the last quarter, but lacked the punch to carry the pig-skin over the final chalk-mark.

Charlie Rogers played a bang-up game for Frankford, his runs thrilling the fans many times.

The Providence management is running a most valuable player contest. Purchasers of tickets to the games are entitled to a vote. Gus Sonnenberg, tackle, is leading the procession with Quarterback Curley Oden second up.

The Yanks are going to be mighty busy this coming week. Sunday they play in Cleveland; Tuesday, Grange's crew tackles the Bears in New York, while on Friday, the Yanks perform in Pottsville at an Armistice Day celebration.

Steam Rollers Again Crush Jackets in Sunday Fray---14-0

Lack of Scoring Punch and Poor Aerial Defense Cause Defeat of Frankford.

The overhead attack of the Providence Steam Rollers again featured last Sunday's contest. The New England eleven had an aerial game that almost rivalled that of the New York Giants in manufacturing touchdowns.

The local team thrice threatened to score in the closing moments of the contest after sustained marches down the field but on each occasion the "Rollers" intercepted passes just when a score appeared to be a certainty.

The game started off just as Saturday's contest, with a strong Jacket flavor. The locals marched right down to the ten-yard line on a series of forward passes and off-tackle thrusts that had the Providence secondary in a frenzy.

The advance was stopped by the officials when a Frankford back called, "signals off." The referee penalized Frankford five yards for delaying the game. With fifteen yards to go for a touchdown, two forward passes were attempted and when the second grounded across the goal line, Providence was given the ball on the twenty-yard line for a touchback.

No sooner did the "Rollers" get hold of the ball than they began to hurl forward and lateral passes in quick succession catching the Yellow Jacket secondary defense napping.

Jimmy Conzelman finally provided the climax by leaping high in the air for a pass and diving over the goal line for a touchdown.

During the remainder of the first half Frankford held Providence without gain but in the second half the "Rollers" again opened up with the overhead game. Oden, the diminutive half-back of the New England team, scored the second touchdown for Providence when he caught a pass and managed to shake loose several local tacklers.

Frankford used the Penn State offense in the two games last week and while the team didn't win either of the contests much more can be expected of it today.

The offense gained considerable ground but the boys lacked the punch to put the ball across the goal line when within scoring distance. During the past week Coach Charlie Moran has been putting the necessary punch in the plays to bring more scores.

The two Chicago Bear moguls are getting into the game again. Dutch Sternamen is taking a turn every now and then in the Bruins' backfield while George Halas is just as frisky as ever around his end of the line.

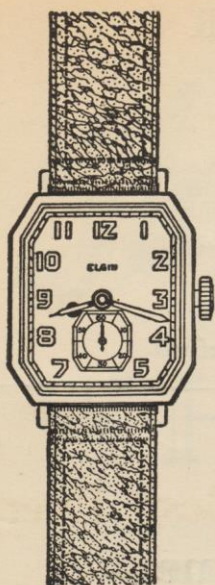

CONDENSED RULES

A FEW IMPORTANT RULES AND FACTS FOR YOUR GUIDANCE

When the referee starts the game by blowing his whistle no player on the kicking side can touch the ball on the ground without at once putting it in play by kicking it.

Should a player on the side in possession of the ball make a false start or otherwise draw his opponents offside, the ball, if snapped, shall not be regarded as in play or the scrimmage as started.

Before the ball is put in play the opponents cannot in any way interfere with the center, nor touch him or the ball.

The ball cannot be tossed or passed in the direction of the opponents' goal by a player on the side not putting the ball in play from scrimmage.

A player is put offside if the ball in play has been touched last by a man of his own team behind him. He cannot be called offside, however, if behind his own goal line or while holding the ball for a place kick.

No substitute or any other person not actually in the game is allowed to coach.

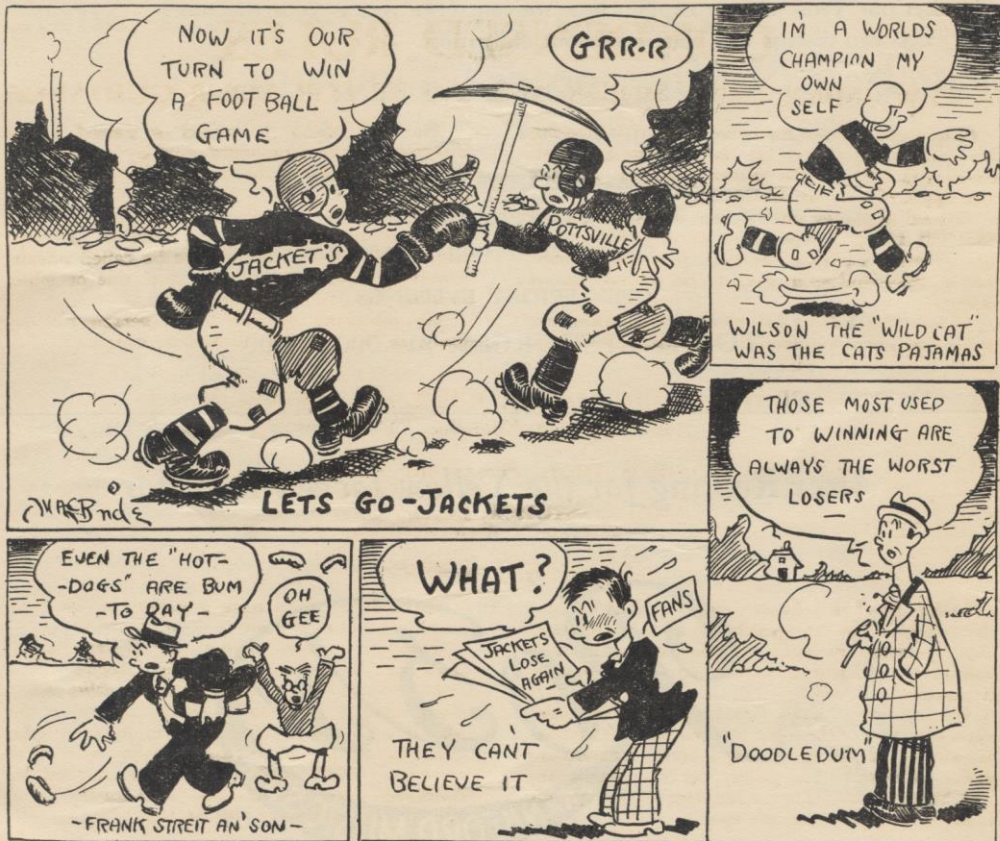

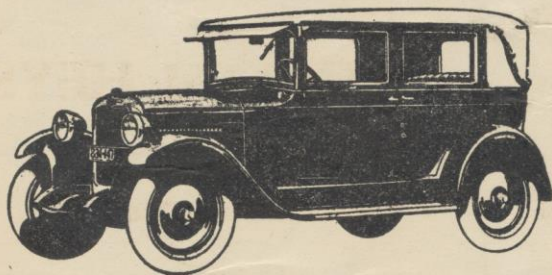
