Providence Steam Rollers

with "Wild Cat" Wilson here to take measure of Jackets

A new football machine with only six veterans as the nucleus has been built up by the Steam Roller of Providence and will show its wares against the Yellow Jackets today. Star players comprise the roster from ends to backfield and after the parts get to running together smoothly the management believes it will take any team on the gridiron into camp.

The club has a quartet of whirlwinds in George "Wildcat" Wilson, one of the greatest backs who ever came out of the Pacific Coast territory; Gus Sonneberg, a stocky little tackle who can do anything; Ed Lynch, former Catholic University captain and crackerjack defensive end, and Curly Oden, the little quarterback who is as fast as ever. Oden, who did not play in the opening game against the Giants when the latter won 8-0 has starred in every contest since then.

The six Roller veterans are Jim Laird, old Colgate fullback who is now holding down a guard position like a stone wall; Oden; John Spellman, former Brown tackle and Olympic champion wrestler who has been successfully converted into an end; Bull Lowe, Lafayette wingman who has returned to the Roller after an extended absence; Kozlowski and Bull Wesley, Alabama center.

The Roller's new coach and substitute quarterback, Jimmie Conzelman, brought the outstanding players of his last year's Detroit National League team with him to Providence. They are Sonnenberg; Jack Fleischman, speedy little guard from Purdue; Dinger Doane, fast charging fullback, Lynch and Haddon.

Other newcomers are Orland Smith 215-pound guard who won an All-American berth on Brown's undefeated "Iron Men" of last year; the Cronin brothers, Jack and Bill, speedy backs from Boston College; Bill Pritchard, star line-crasher of last year's Penn State team; and Pierrotti, big but fast center of Holy Cross.

Pritchard, who raised havoc with the Western forwards in the annual East vs. West game in Los Angeles last winter and Doane have sufficient power to pierce any line. Wilson is a triple threat star of the first order, and has no superior as a defensive back. Jack Cronin averages 60 yards as a punter.

President Joe Carr is now busy trying to patch up the schedule gaps brought on by Buffalo's withdrawal. Several switches in dates are now being mapped, and the revamped outline should be ready within a week.

Business appears to be booming in the National League. The Giants' game in New York attracted 19,000; over 20,000 spectators saw the Bears whip Cleveland, while Red Grange's team played to over 11,000 at Green Bay.

Not a single point after touchdown was made in the Cleveland-Bear game. This was an oddity, as Paddy Driscoll, Joie Sternamen, Benny Friedman are generally sure bets with their educated toes.

Giants Take Sting Out of Yellow Jackets in Double Header---13-0, 27-0

10,000 Jam Local Stadium and See Jackets Toppled from Fourth Place in Hard-Fought Battle—Drop Second Game at Polo Grounds Before 22,000.

Having felt the sting of the Yellow Jackets for four games straight in the last two years, Tim O'Mara's New York Giants came here last Saturday aching with revenge, bringing with them the greatest collection of grid stars ever to perform on one eleven. They came—they played—they conquered, crushing the local eleven 13-0. Their perfect teamwork, thrilling plays will long be remembered by those who witnessed the fray. The Jackets held them scoreless in the first half, although the Gothamites threatened at all times. In the third period, N. Y. recovered the ball on a misplay by the Jackets and took the ball to the 27-yard line. Passes and line-plays followed, Haggerty taking it over. McBride failed to kick the point. Their next score was the result of a 33-yard run by Haines, after receiving a forward from McBride. He was downed on the 2-yard line and White took it over, McBride adding the point.

Frankford opened up with a desperate aerial attack in the final period, which carried them to the 2-yard line, only to have a pass grounded over the goal line.

Shortly after the game ended.

On Sunday these two elevens went at it again at the Polo Grounds in New York.

Shortly after the game started, New York fumbled on their own 25-yard line and Frankford recovered, only to lose the ball on downs. Frankford threatened once again in the third period after Rogers run back a punt 40 yards to the Giants' 15-yard line.

Four touchdowns and three points after scores represented the Giants' margin of victory. "Mule" Wilson with two touchdowns, White and Haines with one each, and McBride with three placement kicks after touchdown accounted for the Giants' points.

In the third period the Jackets displayed a better attacking punch than at any time during the game. The back-field combination of Donohoe, Rogers, Molinet and Mercer, seemed to work better together.

Rogers flashed some fine open-field running and a general high-class game, but the Giants' line was impregnable when the Jackets penetrated deep into New York territory.

Connaughton and Ed. Weir made their presence felt by their wonderful defensive playing.

800 Loyal Rooters Journeyed to New York to Back the Jackets

Band and Bugle Corps Accompanied Team on Special Train. Bugle Corps Makes Big Hit

Eight hundred fans traveled to New York on Sunday on the special train for the game between the Yellow Jackets and the New York Giants at the Polo grounds. The Yellow Jacket Band and the Bugle Corps of Frankford Post 211 American Legion accompanied the team on the same train with the fans. The Hotel Pennsylvania was headquarters for the Frankford Delegation and the Bugle Corps and Band followed by the rooters marched from the Pennsylvania station to the hotel. Several musical numbers were rendered by both organizations in front of the hotel. The day was cloudy and sprinkled a little rain at times, not enough however to interfere with either the game or the comfort of the spectators. About 20,000 witnessed the game, the Giants having a band in their stand as well as Frankford. Prior to the game the Yellow Jacket Band together with the Bugle Corps marched around the field in formation and played several numbers during and after the march. The Bugle Corps gave a fine exhibition drill in the middle of the field, lending that touch of color so effective at the big college games. The drill brought forth very generous applause from the thousands of New Yorkers. Between the halves the Band and Bugle Corps again entertained. The Frankford rooters

demonstrated that they are real fans and even though the Yellow Jackets were defeated the Band played and the spectators cheered after the game as well as before. Early in the evening the Band and Bugle Corps rendered several selections in the lobby of the hotel.

The New York Giants apparently have become tired of being beaten by the Yellow Jackets both in Frankford and their own home city and this year have developed a wonderful team and practically completed this team and prepared it for the game with Frankford as in both contests they played wonderful football.

The addition of Clem Neacy and Ashmore seems to have "made" the Duluth club. Both these players were with Milwaukee last year. Neacy is a big rangy end while Ashmore, when going right, is the bone-crushing type of tackle.

The National League percentage table is due for another shake-up this week, as several important games are on tap. Fans around the circuit are pulling for Dayton to upset the Bears who still have an unmarred record.

Connaughton Says Players' Love of Competition Makes Games Interesting

"Competitive spirit is the foundation of all sport. With it, you can make a game interesting, hard fought and clean. Without it, athletic contests do not deserve the name."

"Pud" Connaughton made this statement. He was one of the guests of honor at the opening ceremonies of the Jewish Basket Ball League last Tuesday night. "Pud" was lured into the conversation because the relative qualities of professional and college football were being discussed.

"As I see it," Connaughton continued, "college spirit means absolutely nothing to nine-tenths of the players once they get out there on the field. From the first kick-off everything depends on themselves. If they love football—or any other form of athletics—for the competitive sport itself, then they will give the best that's in them. If they don't love the game thoroughly, then all the talk in the world on college spirit will mean nothing to the individual players.

"Last week Frankford played the New York Giants. Those two week-end games were the hardest I ever experienced. Why? Simply because each one of those New York players gave everything he had. Not one of them ever played a better game of football when he was in college.

"Professional football is harder than college football. No school team can hope for the collective group of stars the weakest league team can gather. All the pros are wise in the ways of the gridiron. And when they're giving their best, you've got the toughest job in the world on your hands to outplay them."

Many Upsets in Last Sunday's League Games

Chicago Bears Still in First Place

Cleveland bit the dust at the hands of the Bears, 14-12, after a ding-dong battle in which the officials were kept busy handing out penalties. The Bulldogs got off fast and scored a touchdown after only nine formations.

Chicago sport scribes gave Friedman, the Cleveland ace, a lot of ink for his passing ability. The former Wolverine was shooting 'em far and wide with bullet-like speed. He had the Bruins worried from first to last whistle.

Red Grange, who is laid up with an injured leg, sat on the bench at Green Bay last Sunday and saw his New York Yanks take a trimming at the hands of the Packers, 13-0. Both touchdowns were made in the first half.

Some sensational punting by Lewellen, the Packer star, paved the way for the Yanks' defeat. Lewellen's kicks were averaging over sixty yards and he often placed them out of bounds close to the New York goal line.

Ernie Nevers' Eskimos from Duluth came into their own at Pottsville on Sunday when they rode rough shod over the Maroons by a 27 to 0 score. The Northerners ran wild in the first half, during which they made all their markers.

Joe Rooney, lanky Duluth end, was the star of the combat as he was on the receiving end of three touchdown passes. Method, a plunging halfback, was responsible for the other score. Nevers added three extra points.

Some 6,500 spectators saw the Steamrollers take a 7-0 victory from Dayton at Providence. It was a gridiron thriller all the way, as both teams had an air attack which was functioning smoothly on "all eleven."

The only score of the game was made by Bill Pritchard, 'Roller fullback, in the third quarter. He plunged his way across the line after passes by Wilson and Ogden had put the ball in the shadow of the goal posts.

STAR JOINS JACKETS

Cliff Marker, of Penn State in 1925, and Canton Bulldogs in 1926, and with the New York Giants the early part of this season, reported this week, but was too late to pick up the plays in time to see action this Saturday. He tips the scales at 190 pounds and is an end.

Cleveland fans will get a treat as the Bulldogs will tangle with Duluth. Both these clubs made good use of the forward pass and the tossing duel between the two all-Americans, Nevers and Friedman, should be a dandy.

Capacity Crowd Expected*

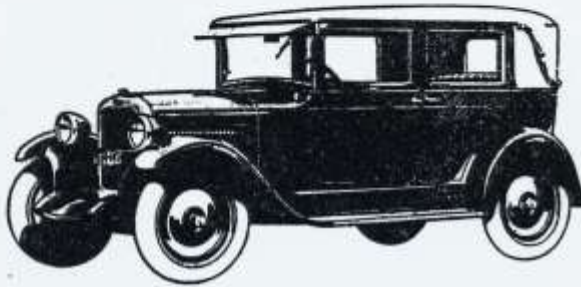
