LUKE JOHNSOS

Luke Johnsos, Hartley "Hunk" Anderson and John "Paddy" Driscoll are again collaborating to fashion the 1945 edition of the Chicago Bears and adding to the tradition that, with one exception only, the club has been directed by former Bear players during its quarter of a century in the major circuit.

As regards their tenure on the strategy board, Johnsos has put in the longest stretch. He started as assistant to George Halas in 1937 and served each following season with the exception of 1940.

Johnsos came to the Bears following graduation at Northwestern and played end for seven years being named on the all-league team in 1933.

Anderson, who played in the Bear line 'way back when, accepted the coaching position in 1940. Previously Hunk mentored at Notre Dame, his alma mater, North Carolina State, Michigan, Cincinnati and St. Louis in the collegiate field and for the Detroit Lions. He is regarded as the best line man in the game.

Driscoll joined the staff in 1941, following a long career as the coach at St. Mel

high school, Chicago, and Marquette university.

One of the all-time "greats" of the league, Paddy went from Northwestern to the Chicago Cardinals as player-coach in 190. After five seasons he played in the Bear backfield for three terms. It is unfortunate that no official records of his exploits are available but those who saw him in action will remember his speed, punting and drop-kicking ability.

Ralph Jones who took over the reins 1930-31-32, was the only non-playing Bear to hold the job.

The coaches list includes Comm. George Halas, Dutch Sternaman, Larry Walquist and Red Grange. Halas and Sternaman were player-coaches 1920-29. Halas resumed coaching in 1933 and went into the Navy during 1942 campaign. He played end and Dutch was a halfback. Both are Illini. Walquist, another Illinois man, was a Bear halfback 1922-31 and was made assistant coach in 1932. Grange joined the club near the close of the 1925 season, and was made assistant coach in 1935. He acted in that capacity through the 1939 season.

Adam Walsh, who in his first season as head coach of the Cleveland Rams has made the club a strong contender for western division laurels in the National Football League, never visioned a football coaching career when he was captain and center of Notre Dame's great 1924 team.

The ex-Irish leader, one of the first Mid-Western stars to gain a place on the All-America honor squads, visioned a career in the business world after he left Notre Dame. But fate plays strange pranks and shortly after his graduation, Walsh found himself head football mentor at Santa Clara U., then a small west coast school.

This was the beginning of a successful 20 year career as a college coach which was climaxed by his appointment as the Ram tutor in April of this year. After serving at Santa Clara, Walsh returned East where he coached at Yale and Harvard before being chosen head coach at Bowdoin, a school which previously had not been able to cheer about its football team for many years.

With Walsh's arrival at the Maine institution, there occurred a football renaissance during which the school gridiron squad won seven state titles in nine years. When Bowdoin dropped football because of the war, Walsh returned to Notre Dame in 1944 as assistant to Ed McKeever.


Walsh is the sort of coach who gains the

respect of his players by not asking them to do anything which he himself cannot perform. At the Rams' camp in Bowling Green, he led the squad through some strenuous calisthenics which made sideline fans marvel. As a disciple of the late Knute Rockne, Walsh, of course, familiarized himself with many of the coaching tactics that made the former Notre Dame coach a great teacher.

As his aides, Walsh has two National League veterans in Backfield Coach Bob Snyder and Line Coach George Trafton. Snyder, who played with the Rams in 1937 and 1938, was with the Bears from 1939 through 1943 with the exception of 1942 when he was backfield mentor at Notre Dame. The former Ohio University star retired after the 1943 season because of a serious spine injury which required a major operation.

Trafton, who like Walsh was a great center at Notre Dame, performed with the Bears from 1920 through 1932, being chosen all-National League center after eight of those seasons. In 1944, he coached the line of the Green Bay Packers who won the World's Football Title.

Red Conkright, a Ram Stalwart for several seasons, helped Trafton with the linemen in training camp, was restored to active duty for a while and more recently has resumed his duties as scout for Rams.





The Pro Whirl

Steve Van Buren, rapidly establishing himself as the greatest ball carrier since George McAfee, ran into first place among National Football league ground gainers last Sunday while his Philadelphia Eagle collegue were losing to Detroit.

The former L. S. U. star went 93 yards thru Detroit's defenses in ten attempts to jump from ninth place with a total of 163 yards gained in two games. Coupled with his three attempts in the Eagles' opener against the Chicago Cardinals a week ago, he now has carried the ball from scrimmage 13 times, an average of 12.5 yards yards per attempt.

While Van Buren was highlighting his performance with a 69 yard touchdown jaunt against Detroit, Sammy Baugh, the Rotan rancher, was turning in another of his many matchless performances against Pittsburgh to become No. 1 among National League passers. Baugh completed 18 out of 21 passes to lead Washington to a 14 to 0 victory. It was one of the veteran Baugh's best days as a major leaguer, and gave him a percentage of .604 for two games.

Although Cleveland prevented him from scoring any touchdowns, Don Hutson was successful enough against the rampaging Rams to take over his old place at the head of the passing receiving table. Seven passes moved him up from second to first with total for three games of 16, good for 323 yards and four touchdowns. He also retained his lead over scorers, adding two extra points to his total to give him 37 points against 27 for Ted Fritsch, Green Bay full back, who remained in second place.

Ken Strong, New York's veteran place kicking specialist, is off to a flying start toward a record in his specialty with four field goals in two games. Strong has missed only one attempt thus far this season.

Matriculated from North Carolina State U. with a degree in textile manufacturing, three football and basketball citations and two for baseball. Was captain of the cagers in 1937. Was born in Greenville, N. C., April 19, 1916 and attended the Parker prep school there. He stands 6 feet, 3 inches and weighs 218 pounds. Fourth season. Is called Warhorse.

ABE CROFT - End

Hobby is flying and business ambition is to direct manufacturing of some product that will serve the people. His favorite dish is that of the majority of his mates, steak, and favorite actor is Gable of the movies. 6 feet tall, 186 pounds.

ALBERT HOPTOWIT - Tackle
