Bill Paschal, Giant of the Week With Touchdown against Steelers

BILL PASCHAL is the Giant of the Week. And for a very satisfactory reason. It was William who carried over the touchdown which climaxed the winning 39-yard drive against the Pittsburgh Steelers last Sunday.

Of course, football is a game of eleven men, and rarely is it given to one man to achieve a victory all by himself.

So, while Paschal is the Giant of the Week, there are plenty of posies to be distributed to other members of the Polo Grounds cast, with some stress on Flinging Frankie Filchock, whose passes were so lethal against

Bill Dudley & Co., and George Franck, a pretty fair country runner.

THIS is Paschal's fourth season with the Giants. He came to them after a short college gridiron career with Georgia Tech. He is 24, weighs 200 and is a six footer.

Paschal took the National League ground gaining title in 1943 and 1944. The first year with 12 touchdowns and 572 yards, the next season with nine touchdowns and 737 yards.

Paschal was born in Atlanta, but now makes his home in New York. Married, and has two children.

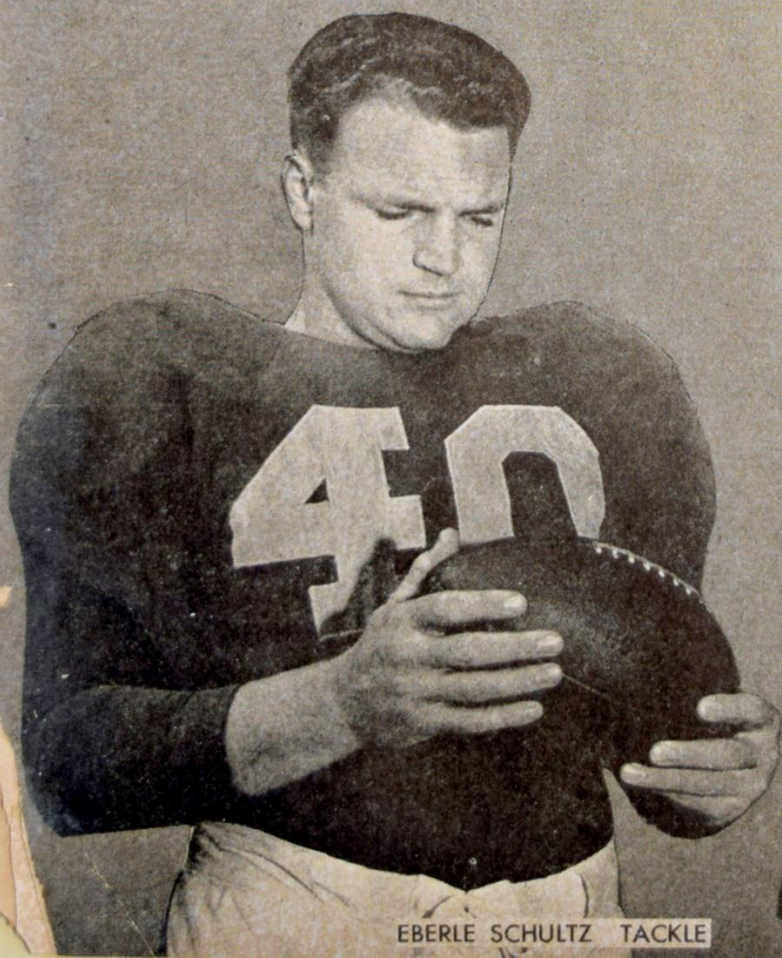

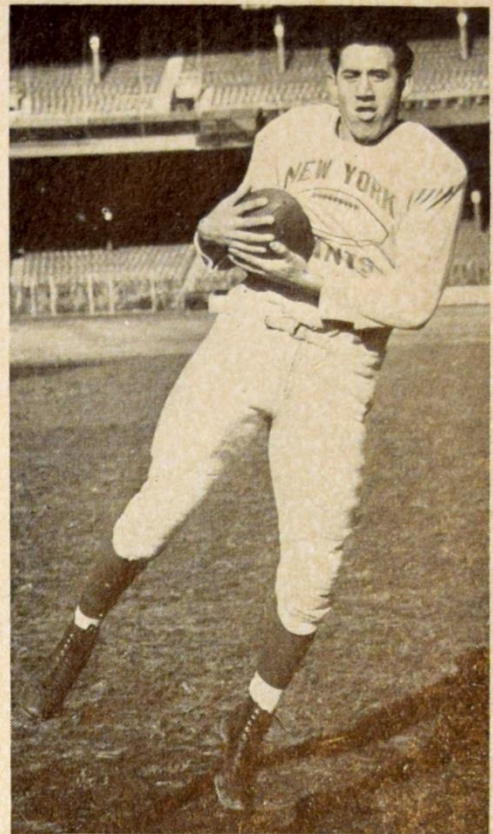

Giants Have Their Eyes On Big Playoff Here with Bears



GIANTS on top in the East, Bears on top in the West, and things apparently shaping up for a big National League championship playoff at the Polo Grounds. That was the situation as this afternoon's schedule got under way in the old circuit.

The Giants maintained their lead in the

Eastern half last Sunday with a brilliant 7-0 victory over the Steelers, while the Bears had the Western title sewed up and were waiting for the Eastern picture to resolve itself.

It will be recollected that the Giants and the Bears met for the championship in 1933, 1934 and 1941.

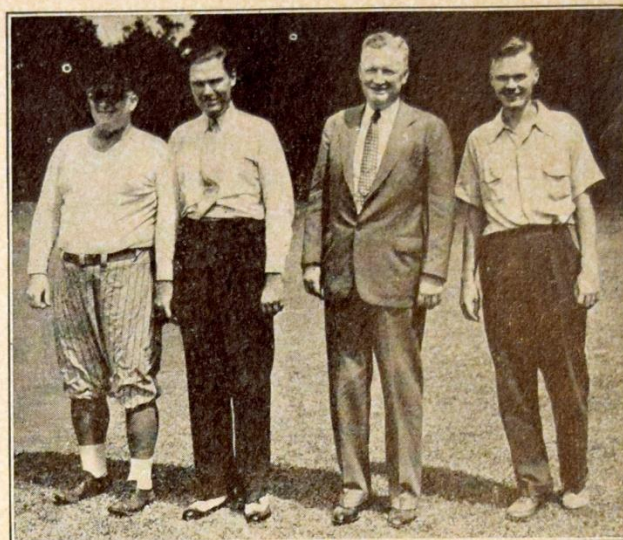

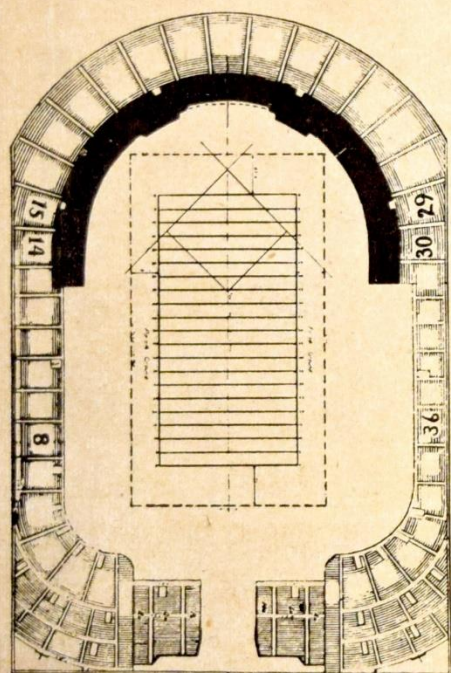

POLO GROUNDS SECTION CHARTS

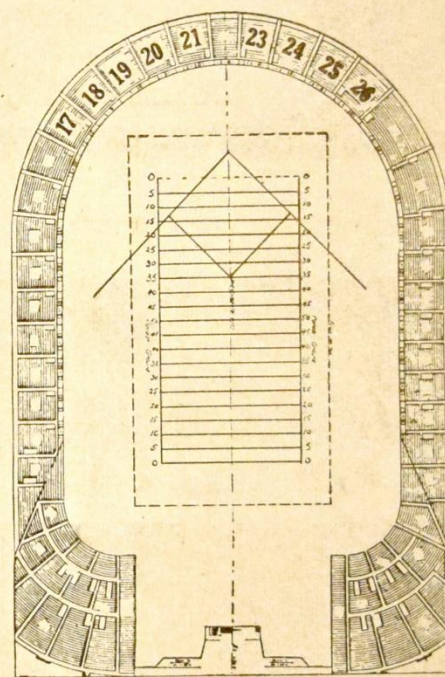

THERE are not many coaches who can maintain a winning edge over Stout Steve Owen of the Giants in National League competition. Owen's eminent soundness as a teacher and director was stressed last Sunday, when the Polo Grounders stopped the Steelers and Bill Dudley.

The Giants' battle with the Rams from Los Angeles today marks the fifth phase of a rival-

ry which has not lasted very long, but has been very vigorous, just the same.

It will be recollected that the Rams played in Cleveland before they came to Los Angeles this year.
